After Kingston, the Trail swung up through open fields and old railbeds. We crossed Frontenac Provincial Park, and




then headed north through jagged hills.



3.1 km reroute between waypoints 14B and 14C

Landowner to the rescue

January 2021 began a period of change for the Rideau Trail north of Burritt's Rapids. A scenic part of the Trail between waypoints 14B and 14C leading to the Stoney Steps had just been permanently closed due to a landowner's concerns about increased foot traffic during the pandemic, and safety during hunting season. This required an immediate reroute that resulted in an undesirable road-walk along Paden and Dwyer Hill Roads between the Marlborough Forest and Burritt's Rapids.

Access to the Stoney Steps would no longer be part of the through Trail. Local users of the Trail were also concerned. This portion of the Trail was a community favourite.

Representatives of the RTA began discussions with Brad and Renée Smith, residents of the area for almost 60 years and supporters of the Rideau Trail since its inception. Part of the Trail already passed over their land, on the east side of the Brassils Creek.

From there, the Trail had to reach Paden Road on the west side of the Creek. It could not be easily bridged, but it was possible to route the Trail on the west side, from Paden Road to the Stoney Steps. From there, a new path could connect again to Dwyer Hill Road, thereby minimizing the amount of highway walking. The reroute created a scenic year-round passage for hikers.

The Rideau Trail would not be possible without the cooperation and generosity of landowners like the Smiths. We couldn't do it without you! Thank you.



End to End Badges

Rideau Trail members can earn up to five end-to-end badges by hiking the entire Rideau Trail or major sections of it. These made in Canada badges are free, but recipients must be members of the Rideau Trail Association.

The badges described below can be earned by hiking sections over a span of a few days, months, or a few years. Hikers should keep track of where they hiked, when, and with whom, and provide this information when they apply for their badge.

The original and the winter end-to-end badges for the entire Trail are presented with a certificate, suitable for framing. The badges are mailed shortly after hikers submit their claim. Traditionally, the recipients are recognized at the Association's Annual General Meeting.



End-to-End Badge

Hike the entire Rideau Trail between Kingston and Ottawa: 320+ km*.



Winter ("Snowflake") End-to-End Badge

For a real challenge, hike, snowshoe and/or ski the entire Rideau Trail during the months of January and February to earn this coveted badge.



Kingston Club's End-to-End Badge

Kingston's waterfront to Lally Homestead at Murphys Point Provincial Park (RT 09B, map 9): 150 km.



Central Club's End-to-End Badge

Between Lally Homestead and Rosedale, just outside Smiths Falls. (RT 12F, map 12): 65 km.



Ottawa Club's End-to-End Badge

Between Rosedale, and the Rideau Canal Ottawa Locks near Parliament Hill (map 19): 110 km.

* The Trail's exact distance can vary, as the route is improved.

Levels of Difficulty

FROM THE RIDEAU TRAIL ASSOCIATION GUIDE FOR LEADERS

Hiking

Level 1 Well-defined trails, gentle inclines. Hiking boots not required but trails may be wet. Suitable for beginners. Recommended for newcomers to club activities.

Level 2 Generally on trail. May be hilly with some light bushwhacking and rough spots. Boots recommended.

Level 3 Rough terrain, one or more places with extensive bushwhacking, steep sections, long climbs and descents, rock scrambling, beaver dams or other obstacles. Boots and level 2 experience are essential. Long pants and sleeves are recommended.

Speed

Slow: 2-3km/hr Moderate: 3-4km/hr Fast: 4-5km/hr

Very fast: 5km/hr or greater

Cycling

Level 1 Few hills, broad roads or bike paths, little traffic. Participants must have some cycling experience.

Level 2 Some hills, some traffic, participants should be fit and experienced.

Level 3 Long hills and narrow roads. An excellent level of fitness and cycling experience is essential.

Canoeing

Level 1 Slow-moving sheltered water with no portages. Level 2 Larger expanses of water, level 1 experience required.

Level 3 Canoeing in areas with larger expanses of water and Portages.

The hike levels are based on mainly terrain difficulty or similar criteria, not on distance. Slight adjustment to the level may be made if a trip has exceptional endurance requirements (for example, a very long trip in easy terrain may change from Level 1 to Level 2 for this reason). If a particular trip has special requirements, this should be explained in the event description.

Tick Talk

DOES YOUR DOCTOR KNOW YOU ARE A HIKER?
PAT STRANBERG'S TALE TELLS US HOW IMPORTANT
THAT COULD BE.

With tick season upon us I thought I would tell you about my experience with Lyme disease. Around Thanksgiving of 2020, we went on a hike and did not find any ticks on me. Then I started to feel like I was getting the flu: aches, chills, and extremely tired. For about a week I was sleeping about 18 hours a day. Although I had markings on my abdomen, arm and legs, they were not bullseye shaped.

Without that characteristic shape, I didn't think this might be Lyme. I did get tested for Covid and was negative. Following the week of flu, I was able to get around with little energy and had trouble catching my breath. The doctor sent me for x-rays for pneumonia, results were negative.

For the next four months my energy level was very low. I wanted to work on the Winter E2E, but I could only cover short sections at a time.

After hearing about someone with similar symptoms being diagnose with Lyme, I asked my doctor for a test. The results of the test showed as positive for Lyme and I ended up on antibiotics for a month. Fortunately, I have recovered and my energy levels are back to normal.

If after a hike you start to feel like you are getting the flu, and are very tired, I recommend you ask to get tested for Lyme as a precaution.



Things to know, before leaving for an outing

What to Bring

Bring lunch or a snack, water and footwear that is suitable for the outing. Many outings are 'rain or shine', so be prepared for weather changes.

It's advisable to bring ID, emergency contact information, and where it's relevant, a list of your medications.

In season, other items include a hat, insect repellent and treatment, sunscreen, handwarmers, spare mitts and hat.

Note

Hiking boots are recommended for hikes rated at Level 2 or higher. A **high level of fitness** is required for Level 3 outings.

Please review the Participant's Responsibilities and definitions used by the Rideau Trail. At their discretion, leaders may refuse to accept someone who does not have proper equipment or clothing.

Carpooling and Fees

Be at the meeting place at least 15 minutes before the departure time. Where a gas share is indicated, it is a suggested, voluntary contribution. Fees for parking and entry to parks are shared among the driver and passengers.

Yellow Box Replaced

Was it stolen or missing? What was it, and why was it yellow? There are too many questions, and why would we care?

For hikers who venture off the road-trails of Gatineau Park, 'Yellow Box' means a pleasant trail on the top of the Escarpment that is a challenge to reach.


It is of particular significance because it is one of the trails that Gatineau Park has identified for a change to official status as a Park trail. Phase 4 of the Park's strategy focuses on the unofficial (but well used) trails in the Eardley

Plateau part of the park.

Hiking the East Coast Trail

From St. John's to Brigus South BY BILL OTTNEY

It is a foggy August 2, 2017 and we are in the company of a Bruce Trail group who plan to spend the next eight days hiking south along the Atlantic coastline from Fort Amherst Trailhead to a yet-confirmed destination. Not having hiked for a few weeks, Gunhild and I find that the steep 150 m (500') ascent from Fort Amherst Road is truly a workout.

Moments earlier, Bill Bernardy of Brown Rabbit Cabins in Tors Cove had dropped our group off, with plans to retrieve us at Cape Spear, some 15.3 km distant. After our morning wakeup climb to the summit, our group pauses briefly near Cistern to take in the view on this soon-to-be beautiful day. Looking due East over the Atlantic Ocean, the spouts of feeding humpback and minke whales can be seen in the



distance. Ahead of us, the trail continues south along the rim of a steep bluff until it descends to the shoreline at Whitty's Rock some 5 km distant. The views become immense as the morning fog continues to burn off.

We all have our Bucket Lists. Until today, we had never considered the ECT as a Bucket List entry. No problem, there is nothing wrong with a quick add to the list. In fact, we loved hiking The Rock so much that we returned again in 2021. Newfoundland offers an almost endless list of attributes: Its ancient geology, its deep-rooted history as a destination for the first European explorers, its rugged topography, its unspoiled panoramic vistas, its abundant sea life, wildflowers galore, trailside wild berry patches, and of equal importance its people who add to the uniqueness of this place in grand measure. National Geographic

Traveller refers to Newfoundland as a place of "stunning natural and cultural integrity".

Picking a favourite hike along the East Coast Trail is a challenge, as there are so many gems. Three hikes immediately come to mind though: from Signal Hill trailhead down through The Battery to the Terry Fox memorial, followed up with a walking tour/pub stop in St. John's; or from Witless Bay trailhead to Tors Cove; and our personal favourite from Cape Spear Trailhead to Maddox Cove/Petty Harbour, described here.

First of all, although most hikes offer some relatively easy sections, there are no "cakewalk" hikes on the East Coast Trail. Using Frontenac PP as a benchmark which I will set at a difficulty Level 3 due to its rugged topography, most ECT hikes would rank as a 4+. The trail is more rugged, the elevation changes are significantly greater, resulting in longer climbs and descents. There are rock-strewn sections of trail which demand a slower pace and in many places the boardwalks are in need of repair due to a shortage of trail maintenance volunteers.

Channel into St. John's Harbour from Signal Hill

Cape Spear is Canada's easternmost point of land (52.63°W). The Trail follows a plateau 90 m (295') above the shoreline, so expect some r emarkable unobstructed views along this 5 km section. On the inland side, you will have a commanding view of the massive Cape Marsh. At The Basket, the trail then wanders southeast following a long boardwalk which crosses the many marsh drainage streams. Exiting the boardwalk, the difficulty level cranks up a few notches as the trail follows the rugged undulating coastline.

At Herring Cove, the trail jogs off into the forest before reaching Second Stairs ("This shouldn't be allowed"- hiker from BC) which is a massive

stack of huge boulders. There is no defined path down Second Stairs but

all that is required was to pick a path and descend into the rocky ravine. In 600 m, you have the opportunity to climb out of the ravine on First Stairs which are basically a bookend. The rocky trail traverses a couple smaller sets of "stairs" before breaking out of the forest at Deep Cove. From here on, the difficulty level gradually diminishes until you reach Maddox Cove trailhead. If you choose to walk into Petty Harbour, there is a good pub in the village. A cold beer with a side of cod bites or cod tongues are always a great way to end a hike.


I mentioned that we went again, last year. Gunhild and I are already considering a third trip. Such is the magnetism of Newfoundland.
