Promouvoir, encourager et organiser des randonnées pédestres responsables et des activités similaires tout en gérant le réseau du Sentier Rideau.



Keep track of the details of your hikes, whenever you did them: Date, start and end point of the hike and the leader's name. Send questions or claims to the RTA by phone, or you can email the appropriate club contact.

Getting Involved

It's a busy organization, volunteers are always welcome. Please contact those listed on (page 3) indicating your volunteer interest such as co-leading hikes, supporting your club's committees, working on the Trail maintenance or any other interest you may have.

What Will the Outing be Like?

The three main factors in rating an outing are Effort Intensity, Technical Challenge and Pace Intensity. For each, Moderate is defined this way:

Effort Intensity: similar to walking on a hilly forest trail **Technical Challenge**: similar to needing careful footing

Pace Intensity: steady, with periodic breaks and allowance for unplanned breaks

The Levels serve to summarize that detail.

Level 1: All parameters are "Low" or up to one parameter may be moderate. The least difficult type of outing.

Level 2: At least 2 parameters are "Moderate" and no more than one parameter is "High". An outing with mid-range difficulty.

Level 3: At least 2 parameters are "High" or at least 1 parameter is "Very High". The most difficult type of outing.



What are Gaiters

For some of the new hikers on the trail you have probable seen some of our members wearing funny looking leg warmers, and you think you have travelled back in time to the 80's and your last aerobics class, but they are more than what you think.

The whole purpose of gaiters is to protect your feet and lower leg from moisture or debris while on a hike or walk.



Most often, gaiters will be used as a shield against moisture – this can be rain, mud or snow. They stop your feet, ankles, and lower leg from being vulnerable. Aside from protection against moisture, gaiters can also stop mud and debris, such as stones, thorns, or branches from entering your boots.

Basically, with a pair of gaiters, you'll have a welcomed extra layer of defence to prevent anything from getting into your socks, boots, or trouser legs.

You don't have to wear these but they are a great way to protect your legs from the ever present Ticks on the trail.

WHAT3WORDS (W3W) being used by the RTA

You don't get much for free these days and if you do there are always drawbacks. Not this time, what3words is free and never needs to be updated. It is a quick and simple way to find, share and save exact locations. They have divided the world into 3m squares and given each square a unique combination of three words. what3words addresses are easy to say, to share and are as accurate as GPS coordinates, 51.520847, -0.19552100 would be /// filled.count.soap in what3words

Enter a place name or street address into the search bar and choose the result.

Switch to satellite mode and zoom in to see the grid. Tap on a square to see the what3words address.

It is so precise it can guide to a parked car in a large parking lot, or locate you in the middle of the lake, or somewhere in the bush, maps can't do that.

Many 911 and other emergency service has been using W3W and many more across the country and world.

what3words supports over 50 languages with more being added all the time

They convert 3-word addresses to GPS coordinates and vice versa GPS coordinates to three-word addresses.

It comes in an Android and iOS flavour and can be used to provide offline functionality for any app. what3words is a great navigation program, it will not call 911 for you but it will surely bring emergency services to your exact location fast.

It is with heavy heart and great sadness that the family announces the death of Don Sherwin at home in Perth on November 29, 2023, in his 93rd year. Don was born May 16, 1931, in Guelph, Ontario, the younger son of William Fletcher Sherwin and Vera Winnifred House. Survived by his loving wife and best friend, Christina Charlotta McGuire of Perth, Ontario, daughters Nancy Jean Sherwin of Port Dover, Ontario and Wendy Ann Owens (John) of Constance Bay, Ontario, granddaughters Katherine and Jennifer Owens, and his brother Bill's extensive family in Ontario and Alberta.

Predeceased by his firtt wife, Esther Mildred Belton (1931 -1989), son Donald James "Jamie" (1958 – 989) and his brother William Webster Sherwin (1927 – 2021). In 1940, the family moved to St. Catherines, Ontario, where Don attended high school. He then studied at the University of Toronto, where he graduated in 1953 with a degree in geological engineering. For the next 35 years, Don pursued a career as a petroleum geologist, assuming positions of increasing responsibility, first in the Alberta oil patch with Chevron Canada, later with the federal government Department of Energy, Mines and Resources in Ottawa, in the regulation and evaluation of industry offshore and northern oil and gas exploration programs, and finally with the Canada-Newfoundland/Labrador Offshore Petroleum Board in St. John's.



In 1988, Don retired to Ottawa. After his son Jamie and wife Esther unexpectedly died in late 1989, Don moved to the Perth area west of Ottawa, where he built a new home on Bennett Lake. In 1994, Don met fellow hiker and Navy Lieutenant Christina McGuire of Ottawa. They were married in April 1995 in an all-night chapel in Las Vegas, to begin a new life of adventure, travel, andcompanionship. Over the next 25 years the couple visited 95 countries by land, sea, and air,including hikes in the Himalayas, Alps, Andes, Rockies and mountains in England, Wales, and Ireland.

Don's hobbies, other than traveling and hiking, included volunteer work and quiet philanthropy, genealogy, canoeing, camping, cottaging, sailing, skiing, singing, and dancing. respect for all. Superhero as a husband, and as a father.

In memory of Don, please take a moment, or perhaps a few moments, to reflect on the blessings of the world around us: the sun, the water, the trees, and the rocks he loved so much.

The 8 hikes will be offered as an Association organized event again starting mid-June 2024. Watch the Calendar.



Acknowledging the contribution of a RTA Kingston Member

If you are hiking along the Rideau Trail through Gould Lake CA; across Frontenac PP; or through the Murphy's Point PP wilderness section, you will cross a number of superbly-built new structures. Our RTA Kingston Trail Maintenance and Construction team, in the company of the RTA Trails Coordinator and an eager group of volunteers, have been hard at work constructing new footbridge/boardwalks. These new structures not only serve to improve the hiking experience for all who traverse these sections, but this new construction work also addresses safety concerns that many of us have had in regards to wetland crossings consisting of slippery tree limbs or logs laid parallel across a wet, muddy section. In other places hikers were forced to hop, skip, and jump through wet crossings. These new structures represent a huge improvement, but there is a backstory. A benefactor involved, and we will let Dr. Nag introduce herself:

I am a Rideau Trail Association, Life member.

I was very active with trail activities in the 1980's and early 90's serving as the Hike Co-ordinator for the Kingston Club (1985-90), and Chairperson of the Kingston Club (1987-90). I attended Board Meetings, and also maintained a section of the trail for a while. I received the Outstanding Member award in 1992.

It was in my watch that the Slide Lake Loop, which the MNR were going to close, became jointly maintained by the RTA and Frontenac Park and this happened following meetings between Chuck Mathieson (Ministry of Natural Resources), Ray Forester (President, RTA) and myself.

In Fall of 2014, I walked the Slide Lake Loop (anticlockwise), maybe for the last time. It was well maintained for the most part. A couple of times after leaving the ridge on the West side I wandered off the trail since markers were not easily visible. The last swamp just before the Slide Lake Junction needs some kind of bridge. The water level was low so I was able to cross on the logs thrown across.

Also, during my term as [Kingston] Chair, several building projects were planned and undertaken. The first boardwalk at Gould Lake was built in 1987 with a bequest from Marian Webb. The honorable Flora McDonald of Kingston & the Islands came to Gould Lake to open the boardwalk which was named the Marian Webb Boardwalk. Stanley Douglas built a poster board at Gould Lake with a grant obtained from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Harry Gardner built the shelter at Skycroft which had a similar design to the lean-tos which Harry frequented while hiking in Maine. The shelter opened in September 1988 by Ray Forester, was named the Allan and Ellen Bonwill shelter to honor the Bonwills who were the landowners and long term friends of the Kingston Club. Some of these structures have been rebuilt stronger and better in the recent past. I also initiated the placement of plaques at Elevator Bay in Kingston and at Foley Mountain. The latter to mark the official opening of the Rideau Trail in 1971.

I am writing to pledge [a donation] for construction work/trail maintenance in the Kingston Club section of the [Rideau] trail.

Levels of Difficulty (Spring/Summer)

FROM THE RIDEAU TRAIL ASSOCIATION GUIDE FOR LEADERS Hiking

Level 1 Well-defined trails, gentle inclines. Hiking boots not required but trails may be wet. Suitable for beginners. Recommended for newcomers to club activities.

Level 2 Generally on trail. May be hilly with some light off trail and rough spots. Boots recommended.

Level 3 Rough terrain, one or more places with extensive off trail steep sections, long climbs and descents, rock scrambling, beaver dams or other obstacles. Boots and level 2 experience are essential. Long pants and sleeves are recommended.

Speed

Slow: 2-3 km/hr, Moderate: 3-4 km/hr, Fast: 4-5 km/hr, Very fast: 5 km/hr or greater

Cycling

Level 1 Few hills, broad roads or bike paths, little traffic. Participants must have some cycling experience.

Level 2 Some hills, some traffic, participants should be fit and experienced.

Level 3 Long hills and narrow roads. An excellent level of fitness and cycling experience is essential.

Canoeing

Level 1 Slow-moving sheltered water with no portages.

Level 2 Larger expanses of water, level 1 experience required.

Level 3 Canoeing in areas with larger expanses of water and Portages.

The hike levels are based on mainly terrain difficulty or similar criteria, not on distance. Slight adjustment to the level may be made if a trip has exceptional endurance requirements (for example, a very long trip in easy terrain may change from Level 1 to Level 2 for this reason). If a particular trip has special requirements, this should be explained in the event description.

MARBLE ROCK BOARDWALK PROJECT by Jim Lorimer

In 2018 the Ottawa Club funded, built, and installed on the Rideau Trail a 608' pressure-treated wood boardwalk south of Paden Road. The cost to build this boardwalk was a significant expense for the Ottawa Club.

Unfortunately in 2022, the Rideau Trail had to be re-routed away from this area and as a result, this recently built and perfectly good boardwalk was left high and dry.

The RTA decided to reuse this boardwalk on other sections of the Rideau Trail. Both the Kingston and Ottawa Clubs had areas of trail that required boardwalks, so sections of the Paden Road boardwalk were allotted to each club.

The boardwalk the Ottawa Club installed at Paden Road is similar in design to the example shown on page 19

of the RTA Trail Maintenance Handbook. With this design, a boardwalk section comprises a 24"(wide) x 6" (deep) x 16' (long) pressure-treated wood frame with three 2" x 8" x 16' pressure-treated decking boards. The advantage of this design is a modular plan with ease of construction and portability. The design is also relatively easy to disassemble, allowing for the relocation of the boardwalk to other sites. Where should the Kingston Club reinstall its allotment of the Paden Road boardwalk?

The Marble Rock Conservation Area (MRCA) "blue" hiking trails were planned and developed by members of the RTA in partnership with the Cataraqui Region Conservation Authority (CRCA). The Kingston Club has been maintaining the MRCA trails for public use since 2003. Located in the MRCA is a 200' boardwalk that was built using locally cut logs and has deteriorated badly and is now unsafe to use.



The RTA decided that the boardwalk in the MRCA would be a suitable location to install the repurposed Paden Road boardwalk. An interesting fact about the Marble Rock Conservation Area is that it is part of the UNESCO Frontenac Arch Biosphere Region.

In August 2023 RTA Trail Coordinator Alan Smith, Kingston Club Maintenance Coordinator Stan Huff, and Kingston Club Construction Coordinator James Lorimer met with Tom Beaubiah, CRCA Conservation Lands Manager, and Cole Spence, CRCA operations, to discuss cooperating on a MRCA boardwalk replacement project . The Kingston Club agreed to provide the labor and the boardwalk for the project while the CRCA



agreed to transport the boardwalk from Paden Road to the Gananoque Lake Road/ MRCA access trail junction using their truck and heavy-duty trailer. The CRCA also agreed to provide an ATV and trailer to transport the boardwalk sections from the Gananoque Lake Road/ MRCA access trail to the "blue" hiking trail/ MRCA access trail junction within the MRCA. This use of the CRCA's ATV would reduce the amount of hand-carrying of the boardwalk by Kingston Club volunteers to a minimum.

RTA Trail Coordinator Alan Smith contacted a landowner of private property east of MRCA and received permission to temporarily use an ATV trail on his property to access the MRCA "blue" hiking trail. This provided an easier and shorter distance for Kingston Club volunteers who would have to hand-carry the boardwalk sections to the boardwalk site. The alternative option was to unload the boardwalk sections at the main MRCA parking lot and hand-carry the boardwalk over much more rugged terrain and a longer distance to the boardwalk site. Even using hiking poles, care is required to hike this section due to its ruggedness and steep climbs. It would be appreciably more unsafe while carrying heavy boardwalk sections. Before the Kingston Club could use the ATV access trail on the landowner's property it had to be cleared of thick overgrowth that included an abundance of nasty prickly ash. Cole Spence of the CRCA operated their brushcutter and cut a trail wide enough to allow a CRCA ATV to access.

The Kingston Club decided to make use of surplus Paden Road boardwalk sections to extend the MRCA boardwalk south a further 64 feet to cover additional swampy ground. The total boardwalk length was now 272'. This required seventeen 16' boardwalk sections with fifty-one 2" x 8" x 16' decking boards. At this time the Kingston Club also decided to replace a footbridge built with locally cut logs located below the MRCA cement dam with a proper footbridge using a section of the Paden Road boardwalk.

Another two boardwalk sections will be required and installed in the Gould Lake Conservation Area, and are currently stored at the CRCA workshop. All told the Kingston Club took a total of 20 sections of the Paden Road boardwalk leaving 18 sections for the Ottawa Club to use.

The Paden Road boardwalk was located on low-lying and swampy ground, which mandated using cedar stumps to keep the boardwalk off the ground. However, the Marble Rock location with its Canadian Shield terrain provided a sufficient supply of stone to construct stone piers on which the boardwalk could rest. Throughout several Kingston Club work parties, volunteers cleared and marked a new route for the new boardwalk beside the old one. The work parties also gathered a large quantity of stone to be used in the construction of the stone piers and placed it nearby.



With the MRCA access trail cleared of overgrowth and the boardwalk site cleared and marked the process of transporting the boardwalk from Paden Road to MRCA could begin.

An Ottawa Club work party then got to work and after five hours of hard work completely disassembled the boardwalk and stacked it beside Paden Road. The lumber in the boardwalk was quite valuable so there was some urgency in getting it loaded and transported to Kingston.

A major event of the MRCA boardwalk replacement project occurred on 11 October 2023 when a Kingston Club work party along with Peter Weir and Ian Campbell of the Ottawa Club loaded twenty sections of the Paden Road boardwalk onto a CRCA truck and trailer at Paden Road. Cole Spence of the CRCA assisted with the loading and transported the boardwalk back to the CRCA workshop on 164 1 Perth Road in Kingston.



The boardwalk sections were then unloaded from the trailer, pressure washed, and reloaded onto the trailer. On 14 October, a Kingston Club work party began offloading the boardwalk from the CRCA truck and heavy-duty trailer at the Gananoque Lake Road/ MRCA access trail and began transporting it to the "blue" hiking trail/ MRCA access trail junction within the MRCA. The CRCA provided their ATV and trailer to assist in transporting the boardwalk sections. A small glitch required that some of the boardwalk pieces had to be carried from Gananoque Lake Road, however at the end of the day all the boardwalk had been transported to the "blue" hiking trail/ MRCA access trail junction.

Now began the labour-intensive process of carrying the boardwalk from the "blue" hiking trail/ MRCA access trail j unction to the boardwalk site. This required several work parties to complete. The 24" x 6" x 16' boardwalk frames were very heavy and required the use of the stronger Kingston Club volunteers to carry. Thank you to RTA Trail Coordinator Alan Smith and his partner, Gananoque volunteer fire department member Chris Perry for carrying most of the boardwalk frames. The 2" x 8" x 16' decking boards were easily carried by the rest of the Kingston Club work party volunteers.

Kingston Club work parties began building the stone piers as soon as the boardwalk frames were delivered. In total 18 stone piers were required on which the 17 boardwalk sections would rest. To build a stone pier, a 4' x 4' layer of geotextile fabric was laid at the pier locations, then a layer of galvanized wire mesh was placed on the

fabric. Then stones were placed on the galvanized wire mesh with the flat sides facing down, then further stones were placed in such a manner that the weight of the stone pier would be distributed over the entire sheet of geotextile fabric. Then a 2" x 6" x 3' pressure-treated wood sill plate was placed on the stone and the boardwalk would rest on the sill. The tricky part is to ensure that the sill plate is level. This process often required different combinations of stones to get it right. Sometimes the use of a 5lb sledge was needed to make adjustments.

Each stone pier required approximately 20 cu ft of stone, in total 360 cu ft of stone was required to build all 18 piers. That large amount of stone ensured that Kingston Club volunteers were working non-stop transporting stone using wheelbarrows from the stone pile at the end of the boardwalk to the pier locations. On Friday 3 November, Kingston Club Maintenance Coordinator Stan Huff organized the argest Kingston Club work party to date, consisting of 16 volunteers. This work party carried the remainder of the boardwalk to the boardwalk site and installed the decking. Perhaps the largest volunteer turnout was also because Tim Horton's coffee and donuts were provided for our lunch break.

Thank you to Kingston Club secretary Lynn Essau and Kingston Club Outings Coordinator Karin McInnis for delivering hot Tim Horton's coffee and donuts to the MRCA boardwalk site.

Installing the boardwalk sections was an easy task, just a matter of placing the boardwalk frames on the sill plates and attaching them to the next frame using nuts and bolts through predrilled bolt holes. The final task was to attach the 51 decking boards to the boardwalk frames. At the end of the afternoon, the boardwalk was ready for its first hiker.

The MRCA boardwalk replacement was a large project with volunteers from all three RTA clubs involved.

The Ottawa Club provided 11 volunteers with a total of 66 volunteer hours.

The Kingston Club provided 29 different volunteers with a total of 550 volunteer hours. 15 Kingston Club work parties were required to complete the project from start to finish.

EVOLVING RTA GOVERNANCE AND OPERATIONS

Most RTA members are familiar with the Ontario Not-for-profit Corporations Act (ONCA) legislation that drove some changes to our Articles of Incorporation and our Bylaws last fall. In addition to the actual legislation, there were many recommendations provided by the various agencies who provided guidance and assistance. Essentially, the guidance provided was to "View the ONCA transition not just as a legal requirement but as an opportunity to learn about your current rules and alternatives, and ask fundamental questions about whether your governance makes sense for you."

In keeping with this guidance, over the past year our Board completed an extensive review of what the RTA is, where we should be going. These efforts have resulted in a number of products and outcomes:

⇒ New wording of the RTA Mission (the new wording remains consistent with the goals and purposes as originally outlined). A survey completed by Directors on the RTA in the future, coupled with the creation of an ad hoc committee to determine the wording of an appropriate vision statement. The new mission and vision statement are as follows:

Mission: To promote, encourage and conduct responsible hiking and similar self-propelled activities while stewarding the Rideau Trail network.

Vision: A community of engaged hikers, a legacy of enduring trails.

- ⇒ A detailed review was completed of the differences in responsibilities and authorities between the Board, Directors, Officers and general volunteers. Somewhat simplified descriptions are provided below:
 - ⇒ The RTA Board is responsible for the long-term health of the Association, high level policies and oversight of RTA operations. The Board consists of 8 Directors who are elected annually, plus 1 (club selected) per Club, plus the immediate past Chair (as per our new Bylaw 4).
 - ⇒ Officers are senior managers, responsible for aspects (as assigned by the Board) of of daily operations. They are appointed by the Board (less Club Chairs who are elected by their own Club).
 - ⇒ Association Volunteers (the many, many, people that provide voluntary assistance in all manner of ways).
- ⇒ Several structural and reporting options were developed and assessed by the Board. Based upon the assessment results and discussion, the Board decided to further develop an option where RTA officers are organized using a functionally based, "committee" type structure, with each committee lead reporting back to the Board. Adopting such a structure will require a fair amount of administrative effort to ensure that all of the Terms of References and Job Descriptions are in place. These need to be in place and received Board formal approval at the April Board Meeting. The backup, should the work not be completed/accepted by the Board, will be to continue next year with the new aspects of Bylaw 4, but no real change to structure or reporting lines.

The Board will continue to provide high level direction for all aspects of the Association, but day-to-day operations are conducted through the four functional area committees. Day-to-day coordination with functional area coordinators/ committee leads can be done by the President, but all committees report back to the Board. All of the day-to-day operational committees (the ones shown in green) will either have members/representatives from each Club or will liaise with each Club. This is really no change from past practices in the areas of Trail Coordination and Marketing and Communications. Board level committees are coordinated, as and when required, by the Chair, but they all report directly to the Board. With some Directors not fully engaged in daily RTA business, the intent is to put greater effort into the three Board level committees (the ones with an orange background), as well as any others that might be created.

<u>Clubs</u>. There is no real change to how Clubs determine their Executive or conduct their business. Club Chairs are considered Association Officers and oversee all aspects of Club level activities and responsibilities. Each Club has one representative who serves as a Director on the Board. That individual can be the Club Chair, or it can be a different person – it is up to the Club to determine (for example, the Club Chair might also be a Director by virtue of another position. In such cases the Club may wish to choose a separate representative to be a Director/Club Representative on the Board). Clubs should have representatives on the main committees or sub-committees.

When Do Changes Take Effect?

The Board will review the development of the proposed structure at our April meeting. Provided that the Board gives approval, then the intent is to start operating under this structure following the elections at the AGM June 1st.
