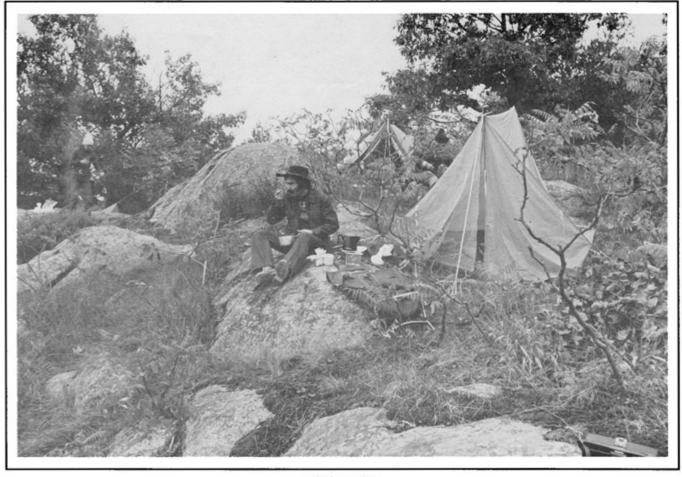

Lyme Disease

A July article in the Globe and Mail headlined "Lyme disease carrier heads north", states that birds, animals and people carry these tiny, blood-sucking parasites north, and that the disease is spreading at an alarming rate. More than 200 cases have been reported in Ontario alone.

If untreated, the bacterium called a spirochete can play havoc with muscles, nerves and joints and can lead to arthritis and neurological disorders. The most obvious sign of infection is a bull's-eye rash radiating from the site of the tick bite. Muscle, joint pains, fever and fatigue can also develop.

Wearing long pants that can tuck into socks, and checking for ticks after hiking, especially behind the ears, arms, knees and on the back, is recommended.

If left untreated by antibiotics, Lyme disease can damage joints, causing arthritis, and can injure the nervous system and the brain.

IN REMEMBRANCE

Richard Cross

I went to the woods because I wished to live deliberately, to front only the essential facts of life, and see if I could not learn what it had to teach, and not, when I came to die, discover that I had not lived.

Henry David Thoreau (1817-1862)

These words from Walden were chosen by Richard C. Cross to introduce his Preface to the First Edition of the Rideau Trail Association Guidebook in 1987. and are an evocation of what nature meant to him. Richard Cross, an avid hiker, canoeist, camper and RTA member, died unexpectedly on June 13, 1998. Richard came to Perth in 1979 as minister of First Baptist Church, and was very prominent in the community. In the 1980's, he was active in the Rideau Trail Association, both in the Central Club and as Co-chairman, with Pearl Peterkin, of the Guidebook Committee for the First Edition of the RTA Guidebook. Pearl recalls how Richard enthusiastically brought his experience and ideas as a Bruce Trail hiker to the work of the Committee, and in her opinion, we have Richard Cross to thank for having the Guidebook in its present format.

With wife Mary, Richard particularly loved hiking in the Gatineaus, and it can be said that he was indeed a true disciple of Thoreau. He had been looking forward to his retirement and to becoming active again in the Rideau Trail Association. He will be missed, not only by his family and many friends but by the entire community of Perth, to which he gave so much.

Highlights of RTA Board Meeting 25 July 1998 Submitted by Allan Tattersall

Cataraqui Trail

Chairman of the Cataraqui Trail Board of Management, Jeff Wimperis, has replied to the RTA Board letter expressing RTA expectations vis-a-vis RT continuing our historic unhindered access to relevant sections of the Cataraqui Trail. Hiking representatives Jim Blain and Don Coulter are both on the Trail Development committee. The Flooding problem in the vicinity of Stonehouse Lake is being dealt with as a first priority. A washout has been filled in and five new culverts installed; two more remain to be installed which will hopefully provide a long term solution to this problem. The RTA Board voted unanimously to forward the final two thousand dollars of our commitment (totalling five thousand), stating our desire that the money be used to help defray the costs of the final two culverts in this common section of trail.

While the resolution of signage standards remains an outstanding issue, members should be aware that RT signs have already been installed at each junction of the Rideau Trail with the Cataraqui Trail between Maple Leaf Road and Indian Lake Road.

Rideau Trail Guidebook

The 5th (1998) Edition of the guidebook is available and has been produced under budget. John Howarth of the Ottawa Club has produced a reverse text (direction Ottawa to Kingston) which is presently being reviewed by club executives. Once approved it is intended to produce a limited quantity of the reverse text as a guidebook supplement which will be sold at cost to test the market.

Members should also note that Bob Chadwick, Bill Grant, John Howarth and Don Sherwin have been nominated to the Task Force to review and recommend changes to the text, format, maps, binding, presentation and other matters pertaining to the production of subsequent edition(s). Members are encouraged to express their views to the above nominees or to the guidebook editors, Linda Hayes, and Jerry Hinderks.

Reimbursement of Mileage Expenses

The Board approved a policy permitting reimbursement of mileage expense to members despatched on Association business at a rate not to exceed 20 cents per kilometer. Individuals must make application for reimbursement and may request a charitable donation receipt in lieu of actual reimbursement. Further, Clubs are also authorized to reimburse members for travel expenses at the above rate for such things as major maintenance or construction projects.

Administration of this financial activity will be left to the Club executive to define; but the funding must be budgeted and shown as a separate expense item in Club budgets.

Strategic Issues - Bass Lake Forum

The Board has completed a review of the strategic issues determined at the Bass Lake Forum under the aegis of former chair Betty McIvor. In reviewing this paper and the subsequent action plan it was noted that all the issues have either been satisfactorily completed or remain on going activities at either club or association level. Specific issues under active consideration at Board level are: membership/recruitment (membership continues to shrink); guidebook issued (as noted above); organizational structure (policy development - pertains to relationships with outside organizations such as Hike Ontario, Ontario Trail Council etc.); public relations/communication (task force to review and recommend); funding strategy (no change until the requirement of a major change in direction is perceived).

Insurance Coverage

A review of our present insurance has been completed which shows the need to update our inventory or equipment for adequate coverage and the need to add Director liability coverage to comply with the Constitution and bylaws. Prior to renewal, due in October, a further comparison will be conducted of the costs and implications of changing to the group policy offered through association with Trans Canada Trail which require a solid association with either Hike Ontario or the Ontario Trails Council.

HIKES ARE GRADED WITH THE FOLLOWING LEVELS

- 1 Suitable for beginners. Well defined trails, gental inclines. Hiking boots not required, but trails may be very wet.
- 2 Generally on trail. May include hills, some rough spots or obstacles. Boots recommended.
- 3 Rough terrain, difficult hiking. Boots, Level 2 experience, and a high level of fitness essential. Long pants and sleeves recommended.

Rideau Trail - Ottawa Club Fall Activities

The activities described below take place as scheduled regardless of weather. The RENDEZVOUS POINT is at the ENTRANCE to the parking lot at the corner of BOOTH AND ALBERT STREETS in Ottawa, UNLESS OTHERWISE STATED, at the departure time indicated. Parking at Booth and Albert is courtesy of ALLPark.

Transportation is by pooling of private cars. Passengers generally donate to the driver's gas costs on a voluntary basis. Eastern Gatineau Park is \$3; western Gatineau Park is \$4;Ottawa-Carleton region is \$3; otherwise the payment increases on crossing county lines, e.g. Kingston would be \$6. Hikers should bring a lunch, drinking water, sun and insect protection and should wear appropriate footwear and clothing. Any parking fee is shared between drivers and passengers.

Participants Responsibilities

Participants are expected to choose a trip suitable to their physical abilities and skill level. They should inform their leader, at the start, of any health problems or of any existing or potential difficulties with their equipment. Each participant will respect all financial obligations The volunteer leaders will expect the support and cooperation of each group member. Parents and guardians are expected to supervise their own children.

Please excercise caution on all trails, even where these have been cleared since the ice storm, because of residual hazards such as branches hung in trees overhead

Level 3 - Rough terrain. One or more of extensive bushwacking, (where permitted) steep sections, long climbs and descents, beaver dams or other obstacles, rock scrambling. Boots, level 2 experience, and a high level of fitness essential. Long pants and sleeves recommended.

Cycling:

Level 1 - Few hills, broad roads or bike paths, little traffic. Participants must be able to ride a bicycle.

Level 2 - Some hills, narrower roads, some traffic. Participants should be fit and experienced.

Level 3 - Long hills, narrow roads, excellent fitness and good cycling skills required.

Skiing:

Level () - Flat terrain, variable length.

Level 1 - Gentle hills, may be long distance (e.g. 15 km)

Level 2 - Variable terrain, some steep hills. Level 1 experience needed. Green and blue trails in Gatineau Park.

Level 3 - Long, varied terrain, may be off trails. Level 2 experience essential. Red trails in Gatineau Park...

Due to a change in ownership of Lot 4, Con. 9, North Burgess Township at the Ferrier Road end of this leg, and withdrawal of permission to hike across the land by the new owner, the following reroute has been implemented:

While hiking in the direction of Ottawa north of the Burgess Wood subdivision, the Trail now crosses one stile, picks up a wagon road in a northerly direction, and reaches a high bluff overlooking a broad swamp. 15K Rideau Trail trek no easy task

I like to think I'm in reasonably good shape for a 43year-old. Sure, the knees aren't in the best shape (football) the back is a bit wonky at times (hockey) and I still haven't managed to give up the pack or so a day habit (journalism).

So, when I met the Thursday hiking group at Frontenac Provincial Park, I figured I shouldn't have any trouble keeping up with them for a 15-kilometre trek around Arkon Lake. After all, out of the dozen people there, I was one of the youngest and many of my compatriots had 20 years on me. However, looks can be deceiving.

Peter Clarke, from Elgin was one of my comrades on this outing. He and Jim Blain from Chaffeys Lock have been getting together on Thursdays for some time now with a group Blain met while doing an endto-end of the Rideau Trail three years ago.

At any rate, I felt confident that this would be a piece of cake - slight miscalculation on my part. Trail boss Murray Henderson gave the signal and off we went, a line of stalwart trekkers disappearing into the bush.

"One woman told me, 'you have the option - to walk and talk or to walk in silence and enjoy Mother Nature,' " said Jim Blain. "For me, it's exercise, getting out and enjoying the people that are associated with the trail."

Indeed the company was pleasant. We talked sports, politics, you name it. At the first break, a cool marshy area where a makeshift bridge of logs crossed a black stream Henderson sought me out. "How's the pace?" he asked. "You OK?" "I'm fine," I said, although little beads of sweat had begun to trickle down my forehead.

We continued on. As the rest of the crew scampered

up a granite outcrop, I began to feel like this may not have been the best idea I've ever had. Talking became more difficult and I started to think about how far we'd come - and how far there was yet to go.

It wasn't long before we stopped for a sit-down break in a clearing. Henderson, as all good trail leaders do, checked on the condition of each of his charges. "Still OK?" he asked. "I'm fine," I said, lying like a cheap rug.

It was here that we broke out the water bottles. Henderson wasn't lying when he said to bring plenty of water. I watched as the hikers munched on granola bars and wished I'd caten a banana before setting out. Potassium, it seems, is lost during a hike and bananas have a lot of it.

I learned that freezing a two-thirds full water bottle the night before and then filling it up in the morning makes for cool water along the trail. At this point, anything wet was just fine.

As clouds started to form, the sun dipped behind them and the temperature became quite pleasant. Refreshed by water and chocolate, along with an escape from the sun, I felt ready to continue...remarkably, with a second wind, I began enjoying it again. By the time we stopped for lunch, I was famished. Never before had a ham sandwich tasted so good.

At the end of the 15 clicks, I felt like I could do another loop. Luckily, my compatriots had other ideas so I got into my van and left. On the way home, I stopped for some cranberry juice and getting out of the car, my knees, back and eyebrows began to tell me - 15 clicks is plenty for the first time. But I'll be back.

The Rideau Trail is 300 kilometres of varied terrain that runs from Ottawa to Kingston and is maintained entirely by volunteers. Kingston Club AGM 1998

This year the Kingston Club held its AGM on Saturday May 2 as usual at the Outdoor Centre of Little Cataraqui Conservation Authority. Forty members attended the meeting followed by a Brown Bag lunch and hikes under the energetic leadership of Carol and Alberta.

Retiring Chair, Bob Chadwick expressed sad regrets at the loss last winter of 27-year member and Club Treasurer Norman McLeod and life member, Ethan Hollingshead.

Bob mentioned a number of Club achievements over the past year. A Public Information Night in April arranged by Peck, Dale and Lynn attracted nearly 200 guests. The highlight of the evening was a fashion show presented by Trailhead in which several of our trimmest members modeled latest styles in hiking gear.

The single greatest achievement of the year was undoubtedly the clearance of extensive blockages to the Trail created by the January ice storm. Thanks to Robin Turkington and his hardworking maintenance teams, the Kingston section of the Trail was open by early April, except where it passed through provincial parks.

Of great benefit to the Club was the establishment of the multipurpose Cataraqui Trail, a former rail line. This has facilitated the development of a long new off-road section of the main Rideau Trail in the Opinicon area. This new section incorporates an entirely new rugged and scenic route close to Stonehouse Lake as well as most of the original off-road portion of the Opinicon Loop, all thanks to local landowners and Club volunteers. A second major off-road improvement is the reinstatement of a scenic pastureland routing north of Westport Sand Lake, thanks to the generous coooperation of the landowner. Meanwhile, inside Kingston city limits we have a new route through the Railway station to the Cataraqui Cemetery which largely avoids Princess Street, thanks again to helpful landowners and the persistent efforts of enthusiastic members.

All these recent route improvements plus those of the preceding year in the vicinity of Gould Lake and Knowlton
Lake appear in the 1998 edition of the Guidebook. Other
improvements made to the Kingston Section of the
Guidebook include more names of main streets in Kingston
(special request from Ottawa members) and the addition of
the new names for rural roads. Greater accuracy was
achieved in the identification of the Trail on the existing
outline maps, thanks to input from the Cataraqui Region
Conservation Authority, the Friends of Frontenac Park and
others. The completely new detailed map 2A for Gould
Lake is derived from the new CRCA map for this conservation area. The CRCA used the Global Positioning

System (GPS) technique with Kingston Club members helping with the fieldwork.

New initiatives in the past year's activity program included Tuesday morning level 2 hikes last summer, hostelling weekends in the Gatineau Hills for hiking in September and cross-country skiing in January, a lodge based hiking week on the Appalachian Trail in June and a camping weekend for hikers and canoeists in Bon Echo Provincial Park in August.

Coming events include a repeat of the camping, hiking, and canoeing weekend at Bon Echo next September, and Kingston's annual cross-country ski weekend in February.

Robin Turkington reported on the ice storm cleanup. This included a photographic display of the work in progress and a roll of honour of those who participated, with special mention of the efforts of Cookie Cartwright, Don Coulter, Bob Janik, Bill Murdoch and Paul Smith.

Allan Tattersall outlined the development of the Cataraqui Trail as a link in the Trans Canada Trail. It has been taken over by the CRCA with Jim Blain and Don Coulter of the Kingston Club on the Board of Management. Doug Knapp, our Association founder, represents hiking interests on the inner executive. Another former rail route, the "Kick and Push" Railway, now owned by Bell Canada, runs from Kingston to Sharbot Lake. The CRCA would like to take it over as another link in the Trans Canada Trail. We are urged to contact our MPs, MLAs, and municipal authorities on their behalf.

In turning over the meeting to Allan Tattersall for nominations for the 1998-9 Executive, Bob acknowledged the tremendous efforts of the executive and other volunteers and the generous support of landowners during his 2-year term of office.

Wild Animals in Gatineau Park By Art Campbell

Hearing a siren in Gatineau Park is most unusual. Hearing sirens on the Masham Eardley Road was a great surprise.

We were one part of the June 24th Wednesday Walkers - for that day, the swimmers. The other group were the berry pickers. We had our swim and lunch (with a beaver swimming in front of us), bushwhacked through woods, bored ourselves on an old road, recovered at the Water Tank lookout, and by walking through open bush to a lookout over the Masham Eardley Valley.

Sirens, very loud, were heard to the south west. One siren was moving north, while the others appeared to be stopped. We strained, trying to see the vehicles. A dust cloud near Ramsay Lake revealed the presence of the moving vehicle. The other sirens sounded different. We realized it was howling - wolves. Beautiful. Their notes rose and fell, almost with the siren, then suddenly stopped.

The area was close to where we had heard wolves before. About 5 years ago, Ida and I were just completing a short ski trip late afternoon in February, when Ida heard the first howl. We stopped and listened, leaving only when we were about to run out of light. The next day wolf tracks, converging in the middle of a pond, were visible.

Two years ago, Paul and I were in the same general area skiing. Suddenly, near the start of our trip, there was one wolf call, very close, then a much more numerous response and then, quiet. We noted wolf tracks in the area.

Only once before had I encountered a wolf, and that was a lone animal coming down a trail that I was walking up. The wolf's reactions were somewhat faster than mine; it was gone before I had even stopped.

That was a great day - a little later I saw a moose, a female, which simply looked in my direction and scented her location. That is the only moose that I have sighted in the park, although we regularly see their droppings; in fact, there is Moose Poop Trail leading to Moose Poop Hill.

Deer are our most frequent sighting. The biggest group was 14 deer crossing the road, with one full sized animal standing, like a crossing guard, until all the deer has crossed. On another day, we followed their trail, which proved to provide very good access, better than we previously used, to that section of the park.

We have seen many bears. Most turned and ran, like the small bear working a berry patch just yesterday, July 10th. One went back to raiding the garbage can in which it was buried when we interrupted it. Pairs of bears, presumably mother and youngster, invariably looked at us and continued on their way. The biggest thrill without doubt was the sight of three cubs up a tree, about four years ago. And we were not far from the base of that tree, where, lore would tell us, mother should be perched. That does get the heart rate up.

However, besides all those pluses to walking or skiing in the park, there is a downside - blueberries. A blueberry patch invariably slows down the group; frequently walkers come to a standstill.

Blueberries do have a useful feature. As you no doubt know, grabbing a handful of berries results in some leaves and white or red unripened berries mixed in with the delicious fruit. When I find myself throwing away the blueberries and retaining the white and red ones, I know it is time to go home.
