ROBBERY ON THE RIDEAU TRAIL PRECAUTIONS RECOMMENDED

Kingston Wednesday Walkers were victims recently at a popular parking spot on the Rideau Trail. Entry was forced into four cars. Purses and other personal property were stolen. Some items were later recovered by police and returned to their owners.

It is suspected that members' cars were followed from the Kingston meeting place to the trailhead. The police advise constant vigilance about suspicious vehicles following ours. Another lesson for the future is to leave nothing of value in a parked car even if locked in a trunk.

RIDEAU TRAIL GUIDEBOOK CHANGES

The following changes refer to the Fifth Edition of The Rideau Trail Guidebook, published in 1998. Please be aware that the Fifth Edition of the Guidebook supercedes all previous editions which should no longer be relied upon for current information.

OTTAWA SECTION

The major proposed route change outlined on Page 118 and shown by a red dashed line on Map 12 has been completed. The Trail no longer goes through suburban Nepean, but goes north to Britannia Bay.

Consequently, the Trail description on pages 118 to 119 between Cedarview Road and Westboro Beach should be replaced by the following:

"The Trail turns left and proceeds north along Cedarview Road to Baseline Road, which it crosses and enters the grounds of the Queensway-Carleton Hospital. From here the Trail is on recreational pathways all the way to Richmond Landing.

"Leaving the hospital grounds, the Trail crosses
Richmond Road, proceeds along a large, high berm
overlooking Highway 416, and then crosses Acres Road.
Turning left, the Trail goes north along the east side of
Acres Road to the Watts Creek Recreational Pathway,
where it turns right (opposite Aero Drive). Crossing
Watts Creek and Carling Avenue, the Trail joins the
Ottawa River Pathway which leads past Britannia Park
and Mud Lake and eventually to Richmond Landing."

Distances are changed as follows:
Map 12, 82.3 should be changed to 76.0.
Page 119, Westboro Beach distance should now be 83.2.
Page 122 and Map 12, the End of Trail at Richmond
Landing should now be 86.8.

Page 63, between lines 1 and 2, add the sentence: "The main Trail continues straight ahead to another junction."

Page 63, line 8, delete "2.7 km".

Page 63, the sentence starting in line 12 and ending at line 16 should be replaced by:

"Here it turns right to parallel Perth Road for 600 metres and crosses Perth Road at the northern end of a guard rail. Thanks to the generosity of two landowners, there are two signed parking areas at the ends of this guard rail — a small one to the north and a larger one to the south."

Page 65, lines 1 to 5 should be replaced by: "The Trail turns right and follows Perth Road south for 400 metres. It then turns left off the road and winds".

Page 80. The distance at the end of the text should be "141.9 km", as shown on Map 5.

Page 81. Insert under Campsites between Frontenac Provincial Park and Mosquito Lake: "Primitive campsite, Lindsay Lake Commercial campsites, Skycroft Family Campgrounds, Opinicon Road"

Map 3. The distance of 59.3 in red should point to South Slide Junction.

ATTENTION ALL OTTAWA CLUB MEMBERS CHANGE OF MEETING PLACE


Effective on December 12, 1998 the meeting place for all Ottawa Club activities, except Wednesday Walkers and unless otherwise specified, will be the PARKING LOT OF THE R. H. COATS BUILDING (STATS CANADA) on PARKDALE AVE, A HALF BLOCK NORTH OF THE PARKDALE AVE. AND SCOTT ST. INTERSECTION.

From our previous Booth and Albert location, this new location is a short drive west along Scott Street (continuation of Albert St.). Signs in the parking lot indicate reserved parking, but cars may be parked there after hours (i.e. after 17:00 on weekdays and all day on weekends). These lots are not patrolled after hours and we have been assured by Parking and Administration at Tunney's Pasture that there are no restrictions to parking in the evenings and weekends.

The new meeting place is one block east and a half block north of the Tunney's Pasture Transitway Station which is serviced by OC Transpo buses # 6, 16, 18, 86, 95, 96, 97, 121, and 176.

The change of meeting place is due to a very recent change in Allpark's policy at its Booth and Albert lots. They no longer allow parking at any time without a monthly permit. In choosing this new location we considered factors such as security of vehicles, ease of access by bus users, proximity to frequent destinations, and free parking. Tunney's Pasture was considered to be the most viable solution. Over the next 3 months, the Ottawa Club Executive would appreciate feedback from members on the merits or disadvantages of this meeting place. We are also interested in suggestions for parking lots in a more central location. Please contact a member

of the Executive with any comments or questions. Because we are not yet fully familiar with operations in this area, we would caution members against leaving vehicles in this meeting place when there has been significant snowfall and snowplowing may be required.


WHAT'S NEW AT MURPHY'S POINT?

Yet another busy camping season has gone by here at Murphy's Point Provincial Park. Thanks to a massive ice storm clean-up effort, the campground was open just in time to accommodate record-breaking numbers of campers and day-users. Our trail system, however, was another story. To the dismay of some campers, our point trail system was not open until part way through the summer. The 'storm-of-the-century' also put a snag, literally, into our Millennium Trail plans. We now hope that the proposed trail, including four hike-in campsites, will be officially open in the year 2000. The Millennium Trail will be a 12 kilometre, figure-8 loop trail that will start at the Lally Homestead. It will cross the Rideau Trail, thereby giving Rideau Trail hikers access to the Lally Homestead and Silver Queen Mine site and the opportunity to hike a rugged trail through the south end of the Park, which will include some spectacular viewpoints over Big Rideau Lake as well as interesting terrain through pine-oak forest and a large wetland complex.

About 30 km of ski trails will be maintained again in cooperation with the Tay Valley Cross-Country Ski Club, who have coordinated volunteers for a much-needed clean-up effort, thanks again to 'ice-storm' 98'.

As an extension of our Natural Heritage Education program, our Loon Lake Lodge and Education Centre is now available to groups for overnight accommodation and educational programming. Open from September until the end of April, the Lodge can comfortably accommodate 20 people with room for groups of up to 30. Amenities include a fully equipped central kitchen/dining area, small TV lounge, central washrooms, laundry facilities, and meeting facilities with slide/overhead projectors, flip chart and video projection unit. Groups can cook their own meals or opt for our nutritious

meal plan. Recreational facilities include snowshoes, volleyball, and access to hiking and cross-country ski trails. Our interpretative staff offer indoor and outdoor program packages, e.g. our Weekend Nature Retreat. Clients have included scout groups, youth groups, companies and other clubs. CATARAQUI TRAIL UPDATE

The 104 km Cataraqui Trail which uses the abandoned CNR right of way (ROW) between Smiths Falls and Napanee is not yet officially opened on any section, although some sections are already well used, including about 6 km which is now part of the Rideau Trail.

The Board of Management has been meeting monthly since March 1998, as has the Executive Committee of the Board. Progress has been continuous but slow. Jim Blain and Don Coulter most ably represent the interests of hikers as well as the RTA on the Board along with representatives of the snowmobiling fraternity, cycling (Doug Knapp), nordic skiing (Cookie Cartwright) and horseback riding (Paul Dean). In addition, the Board has representatives of farming, adjacent landowners, municipalities, the owner (the Cataraqui Region Conservation Authority, or CRCA) and the Southeastern Ontario Rails to Trails Association (SEORTTA).

Progress in readying the Trail for use is slow, primarily because of a lack of funding. The CRCA owns the ROW, but on the condition that it not incur any financial responsibility. This falls instead on the voluntary Board of Management which must raise the necessary base of close to \$1,000,000 required to develop the ROW to a condition appropriate to a four-season, multiple-use trail.

Before any section can be officially opened it must have a smooth, level surface, secure barriers to motor vehicles, and signs identifying the trail and advising of permitted uses, at all road intersections, all problems such as drainage (related to beavers and collapsed culverts) solved, fencing between the trail and adjacent properties repaired or replaced, and numerous other details attended to, some large (such as dismantling the wooden bridge over the Opinicon Road and its replacement by a ramp) and some small (such as trimming back encroaching vegetation). As well, some of the thirteen bridges along the trail have to be structurally upgraded, and all need handrails and decking before they are safely useable.

On the financial front, approximately \$40,000 has already been raised by the various proponents (RTA, SEORTTA and the two snowmobile clubs), and Friends of the Environment (Canada Trust) has donated \$5,000. As well, we have received \$56,000 from the Trans Canada Trail Foundation, with follow-ups of \$104,000 promised. Collectively these are a good start, but only about 25% of the anticipated total cost of development. Our Finance Committee (which badly needs more volunteers) has its work cut out for it.

On October 10, a work crew of mostly stalwart RTA volunteers focussed its attention on the stretch of trail between Sydenham and Harrowsmith, trimming trees and small stuff crowding the rail bed, and constructing a dry limestone retaining wall where the bed threatened to collapse into the valley below. Unfortunately, only one team (of four) was able to complete its assigned section due to time constraints, so a second effort will be mounted in November. This is all a prerequisite to grading and rolling the surface, which is itself a prerequisite to the official opening of this section hoped for next spring.

At a recent meeting of the Board two very significant decisions of interest to RTA members were made. The first is that the trail will be restricted to non-motorized use with the exception of snowmobiles. The five designated uses are therefore bicycling, hiking, crosscountry (nordic) skiing, horseback riding, and snowmobiling.

The second decision concerns the ongoing financing of the trail. Rather than compulsory trail passes which had been proposed (along with the headache of enforcement), the Board decided that voluntary memberships of \$20 per adult and \$30 per family would be a better plan. The Board is optimistic that most trail users will recognize their responsibility to help pay for the trail.

As mentioned above, our Finance Committee has the greatest and most urgent need for public support. If you have any interest in perhaps getting involved in this committee or just questions about this new trail, please contact either Don Coulter (542-9998) or Jim Blain (359-6282). IN MEMORIAM - TONY HYAM 1932-1998

Tony passed away unexpectedly in Ottawa last summer after enjoying energetic vacations in Greece and British Columbia. He was a life member of the Rideau Trail Association and a proud holder of a Rideau Trail end-to-end certificate awarded at the 20th anniversary AGM in Westport in 1991.

Tony was born in Hull, Yorkshire, in which large English county he became the top sprinter. Before joining the RTA, Tony had been a leading member of the Ottawa Outdoor Club (Civil Service Recreational Association) since 1962 and of the Ottawa Ramblers which succeeded it. He led weekend hikes in the Gatineau Park and twice yearly expeditions in the Adirondack Mountains.

Building upon his experience on the Rideau Trail, Tony made good use of his retirement years to cover long stretches of the Appalachian Trail (over 1,000 miles or about half of it) and the Bruce Trail (550 km or about two-thirds of it). He had planned to complete the remainder of the Bruce Trail in the Fall of 1998.

A number of us from both Kingston and Ottawa were fortunate to benefit from Tony's infectious enthusiasm and cheerful company by joining him on some of his many expeditions. Our sympathy and condolences go to Grace, devoted spouse of 22 years and keen hiking partner since they met as members of the Outdoor Club.

HIKING IN THE EASTERN TOWNSHIPS OF QUEBEC

In mid-October, 22 RTA members from the Central and Ottawa Clubs journeyed to Mt. Orford Provincial Park, just west of Sherbrooke, Quebec, to hike in this glorious corner of L'Estrie in La Belle Province. We stayed at the Centre d'Arts within the park boundaries, host to musicians during the summer months, including, in the past, the illustrious Orford String Quartet. During the week, we had the Centre to ourselves, staying in the excellent and economical hostel accommodations (Auberge La Grande Fugue) usually occupied by purveyors of classical music. On the weekend, we were joined by a delightful and friendly group of choral singers and chamber musicians.

For four days in glorious late fall weather, we hiked much of the 65 km network of trails wihin the park, which were suited to hikers of all levels, including some challenging climbs to the four main mountain peaks. Several of the group hiked most of Les Sentiers de L'Estrie traversing the park from south to north, crossing Mt. Orford (853 m) and Mt. Chauve (600 m), which dominate the area. This trail demonstrated the fury of last winter's ice-storm, with the deciduous trees above 400 m in elevation showing much devastation.

Our trip was augmented by excursions to some of the charming and historic villages in the area, including Magog, North Hatley and Knowlton, practicing our French, sampling the very reasonable restaurant fare, and window-shopping (hikers are too frugal to actually buy anything!). We also visited the Benedictine Abbey of Saint-Benoit-du-Lac, on the shores of beautiful Lake Memphremagog (near the home of Mordecai Richler), where we were treated to the singing of Gregorian chants by the monks during Vespers. On one special evening, we were entertained with gusto by a talented member of our group, George Pancyr, on the flamenco guitar.

It was a very successful trip, thanks to organization by Wanda Pelletier and coordination of the hikes by Ken Parkes, both of the Central Club. Vraiment, un beau voyage de randonnee.

HIKING IN B.C. —JUAN DE FUCA TRAIL

A chance week in B.C. How best to enjoy — hike, bike, kayak? And how best to pack? We set off with backpacking gear for maximum flexibility, but included bike helmets and locks.

The economics of rental were interesting. If we had not taken our own, full hiking gear would set each person back the price of a luxury hotel room per day. Two bikes equaled a rental car, and kayaks were \$20/hour. Value improved with weekly rates, but still required a wealthy masochist!

Away from the tourist area in downtown Vancouver we were lucky to find good mountain bikes at \$20 for the weekend. The perfect vehicle for Stanley Park and environs. Vancouver is quite bicycle friendly, but we were glad to make the downtown tour on Sunday.

The only day with a sprinkle of rain found us admiring misty waterscapes en route to Vancouver Island. We had heard of the Juan de Fuca Trail, opened in 1995 to relieve pressure on the over popular West Coast Trail of the Island's Pacific Rim. This trail, stretching 47 km along the Juan de Fuca Straight from China Beach to Port Renfrew, unlike its famous Northern neighbour, does have some car access points. Not exactly car camping, since beach camps (to avoid forest degradation) are a steep kilometre below car parks, but this does provide opportunity to hike from base camps. An enterprising first nations group runs a bus shuttle between sections.

Again economics factored. Bus fare for two from Victoria exceeded the cost of car rental - we squelched masochist tendencies and rented. Despite Robert's complaints about my 3.5 lb tent (he would have been glad if he had had to carry it!), day hiking enabled us to enjoy this magnificent area to its fullest. The Trail is visually stunning but has no easy sections. Each foothold is up or down the fiord-like valleys, on loose peat moss or mud, and over gargantuan tree trunks and beach boulders. It is 12 km between camps on the most difficult section. Knowledge of tide tables is essential to avoid being marooned at high tide. Orange balls denote exits from beach to forest, and the Trail is excellently marked and maintained. Sturdy (if unstable) suspension bridges span rivers and serendipitous logs span chasms as well as forming incredibly long stairs to climb gullies.

Also known as the Marine Trail, every turn reveals the startling beauty of beaches and bays meeting dramatic waterfalls with lush vegetation of temperate rain forest, and old growth trees towering hundreds of feet. We discovered some of the blobs floating in the sea were not seaweed or logs, but frolicking seals. Killer whales too, are frequently sighted. On the Trail, very large fresh droppings witnessed overindulgence in the prolific berries. Surely no human would be so indelicate? Answering growls came from the beach. We practiced backing slowly, speaking softly, as recommended. One should drop articles to distract, a camera would be fine! Bears do not climb as well as humans — not really an option with those tree trunks anyway. If actually attacked, scream and struggle for all your might! Cougars are present, but rarely seen, so no advice was offered in an encounter.

We did not reach the epitome of the Trail known as Botanical Beach — said to be the most spectacular and have the most amazing rock pools filled with marine life. In a sense we are glad; this was quite the most glorious hiking we have encountered, and definitely unfinished business!

HIGHLIGHTS OF RTA BOARD MEETING OCTOBER 17, 1998

K&P Right of Way (ROW) - Bell Property

Municipalities through which the K&P ROW passes have not shown much initiative in pursuing acquisition for trail development. This inaction could well result in the loss of this valuable resource both to the Rideau Trail and to the Trans Canada Trail. The RTA Board will lend its weight to ongoing efforts to acquire the K&P ROW.

The Rideau Trail Guidebook

The Task Force reviewing the Guidebook has been authorized to produce as a trial a limited number of text supplements of a reverse-direction description of the Trail, with a view to possible recommendations of such a reverse-direction description in a future edition of the Guidebook. The Task Force is continuing its review of all aspects of the Guidebook, and RTA Members are again being encouraged to express their views either directly to the Task Force members (see Fall Newsletter, page 4) or through their Club Executives.

Insurance Coverage

Insurance will be renewed through the RTA's existing broker with the inclusion of Directors' and Officers' Liability, in accordance with the Constitution and By-Laws of the RTA, and adequate coverage for inventory.

RTA Membership

The Board is concerned with a decline in membership in the RTA. This past summer letters were sent to 278 Members who had not renewed. Some 40% of addressees responded by renewing their memberships. Nevertheless membership has continued to decline.

Investigation of means to actively recruit new members, including non-members who turn up for activities, is to be pursued. All Members can aid in this endeavour by spreading the word amongst their acquaintances and expressing their ideas to Club Executives.

Jock River Crossing

The Board has authorized the Ottawa Club to spend up to \$1500 to construct a seasonal crossing south of Jock Trail (see map 10 of the Guidebook, Fifth Edition).

Initiatives for the Millenium

Clubs have been encouraged to consider and develop ideas for Millenium Projects for review by the Board at its meeting in April 1999.

Owners of land crossed by the Trail have all been identified and permission ensured. Plastic Trail markers are being tried by the Kingston Club.

Allan Tattersall reported on Rail-to-Trail developments, notably the Cataraqui Trail (see page 12). Bill Grant discussed activities of the Guidebook Review Task Force, and invited comments on this from all interested Members. He expected the reverse-direction Trail description to be available in December at a cost of \$4.

The proposed Board of Directors (see page 2) was elected for the coming year. Presentations included three Outstanding Service Awards (see page 3), five End-to-End Awards (see page 5), and a Certificate of Appreciation for retiring Secretary Caroline Meyer.

Corresponding members of the respective Clubs were encouraged to meet and exchange ideas during lunch following the meeting, and this was followed by enjoyable activities led by Don Cutts, Bob Bradley, and Bob Chadwick during the sunny afternoon, and well-earned drinks and dinner to round off the day.
