The following notice has been placed at various trailheads by the Ministry of Natural Resources:

While the vast majority of Rideau Trail members do not smoke it may be helpful to be aware of the Act when accompanying a smoker on a hike.



Wanted Two Maintainers

A maintainer is required to take care of a 3 km, section of the Rideau Trail extending from the West side of Foley Mountain Conservation Area down to the beach just past the Interpretive Centre. In addition, the loop trails in the Foley Mountain Park, both for hiking and cross-country skiing are now to be maintained by a Rideau Trail volunteer and these trails will be identified with blue markers, as is the practice in Gould Lake Conservation Area. A second maintainer is required to cover all of these Foley Mountain blue loop trails, a total distance of about 5 km.

It should be noted that "work parties" have replaced just about all the markers in the park this past month, so maintainers will be starting with a well marked trail.

Waterfront Trail News From Quinte Conservation

Quinte Conervation has published information on the two arms of the Waterfront Trail being developed (a) via Belleville and Deseronto to Greater Napanee and (b) via Prince Edward County to Picton and Glenora.

Local authorities are considering routes, other than Highway #2 for route (a) with Deseronto taking the lead, having approved both Main Street and Water Street options; while things are looking good in Belleville, with a link to the Trans Canada Trail along the Moira River that has an approved budget of over \$1 million. City of Kingston please note.

In Prince Edward County the recently abandoned rail line to Picton looks as if it will become a core route for the Waterfront Trail, while the Loyalist Parkway is favoured between Hillier and Bloomfield and between Picton and Glenora.

Cataraqui Trail

The Cataraqui Trail is a new "End to End" challenge for hikers and cross-country skiers. The Trail is 104 km of abandoned railway right-of-way from Smiths Falls to Strathcona and eventually Napanee. This trail is suitable for four-season use with gentle grades and spectacular views. The section from Smiths Falls to Harrowsmith has been registered as part of the Trans-Canada Trail. In all there are 50 public road crossings that allow access to the Cataraqui Trail. Signs exist at most crossings. The trail is essentially open for use although it is still in the development stage.

The Trail is now owned in part by the Cataraqui Region Conservation Authority and managed by a volunteer Management Board with Rideau Trail representatives Don Coulter and Jim Blain and is wholly supported by private contributions and memberships. Annual Memberships are \$25.00/individual or family with a charitable donation tax receipt issued. Make cheques payable to Cataraqui Trail c/o CRCA, P.O Box 160, Glenburnie ON KOH 1SO. PARTICIPANTS' RESPONSIBILITIES

Participants must choose activities suitable to their physical capabilities and skill levels. They must inform the leader before the start about any health problems and of any existing or potential difficulties with their equipment. They must respect the leader's judgement and their own financial obligations for the activity. Parents and guardians must supervise their own children.

LEVELS OF DIFFICULTY

Hiking:

Level 1 - Well defined trails, gentle inclines. Hiking boots not required, but trails may be wet. Suitable for beginners. Recommended for newcomers to Club activities.

Level 2 - Generally on trail. May be hilly, light bushwacking, some rough spots or obstacles. Boots recommended.

Level 3 - Rough terrain. One or more of extensive bushwacking, steep sections, long climbs and descents, beaver dams or other obstacles, rock scrambling. Boots, level 2 experience, and a high fitness level essential. Long pants and sleeves recommended.

Cycling:

Level 1 - Few hills, broad roads or bike paths, little traffic. Participants must be able to ride a bicycle.

Level 2 - Some hills, narrower roads, some traffic.Participants should be fit and experienced.

Level 3 - Long hills, narrow roads, excellent fitness and good cycling skills required.

Skiing:

Level 0 - Flat terrain, variable length.

Level 1 - Gentle hills, may be distances to 15 km.

Level 2 - Variable terrain, some steep hills. Level 1 experience needed. (Green and blue trails in Gatineau Park)

Level 3 - Long, varied terrain, may be off trails. Level 2 experience essential. (Black trails in Gatineau Park).

The Appalachian Trail Conference - 1999

The 32nd Biennial meeting of the Appalachian Trail Conference was held in Radford, Virginia, July 9-16, attended by approximately 1000 hikers, including at least six from the Kingston area. It was hosted by the maintaining clubs of the Appalachian Trail in Southwest Virginia. As usual, there was a wide variety of hikes, rated according to difficulty. The loop trails on the Blue Ridge offered many beautiful views but the more energetic hikers usually chose sections of the Appalachian Trail itself which often passed through densely wooded areas. There were also hikes in the nearby parks and recreational areas. We enjoyed walking a section of the popular Virginia Creeper Trail: Creeper referring to an old train, not a reference to hiker status.

However, it was possible to forsake the trails and enjoy excursions like tubing, caving, rafting - even shopping, or participation in the workshops such as "Utilitarian Gourd Vessels", "What every woman needs to know about hiking" and other offerings.

We were interested to learn that the Appalachian Trail's focus has changed from trail maintenance to trail management, as they struggle to gain adequate protection for the Saddleback Mountain section in Maine - following 15 years of negotiation between them, the National Park Service and the Saddleback ski area. Without careful management recreational activities along this Appalachian Trail section would be replaced by a highly developed recreational environment, supporting as many as 11,000 skiers at one time.

Perhaps of more interest to us is the proposed extension of the Appalachian Trail into New Brunswick and Quebec, with a spectacular finish on the Gaspé cliffs in Forillon Park. Negotiations are underway between Maine, New Brunswick, the Province of Quebec and Parks Canada. It will be completed, it is hoped, by 2000.

This was an enjoyable conference and we look forward to ATC 2000 at Shippensburg, Pa.

Highlights of RTA Board Meeting July 24 1999

Cataraqui Trails Alliance/K&P Trail Group

RTA is providing \$1500 to the K&P Trail Group as its share of the initial \$5000 seed money for full membership in the Cataraqui Trails Alliance, which is now pursuing acquisition of the former K&P ROW with the City of Kingston, soliciting corporate and other funding, and conducting public meetings with adjacent landowners and other affected parties regarding the development of this regional trails network. The City of Kingston deferred approval of the K&P proposal pending a decision whether it should be under City or Cataraqui Region Conservation Authority (CRCA) ownership. It is expected that this question will be resolved in August. The conversion of the former K&P ROW to a trail corridor is vital to the long term protection of the Rideau Trail from Kingston to Harrowsmith.

As the Cataraqui Trails Alliance has not had sufficient time in operation to acquire "charitable organization" status, a requirement for seeking Trillium Foundation funding, the Alliance has requested the RTA to accept the lead agency role for their submission, which is expected to be favourably received. The Board has formed an internal task group to look into this matter to ensure that the RTA would not be unduly liable should it accept this role.

Guidebook Revision

The task group reviewing options for future revision of the RTA guidebook presented a status report. It is expected that a presentation of options will be made to the AGM this October. A lot of hard work and research has been put into this project. Those attending the AGM can voice an opinion on the way ahead.

Millenium Projects

Clubs are developing Millenium projects regionally.

A "Capital to Capital" end to end series has been suggested. A show of hands will be sought at the AGM to determine if there is sufficient support to make it worthwhile.

Potential Reroute - Central

Investigation into a rerouting of the Trail from Murphys Point Park around the west end of Round Lake, thereby avoiding the long road march Elm Grove Road north Burgess No. 5 Road is underway. This project may require the expenditure of Corridor Protection Funds.

The End of the Trail

Well friends, I have done it. I have finished hiking the Appalachian Trail (AT), all 2160.2 miles of the scenic footpath along the Appalachian Mountains between Springer Mountain in Georgia and Mount Katahdin in Maine. I want to share with you how this came about and how my friends in the Rideau Trail Clubs helped me in this venture.

My early hiking experiences were with members of the Rideau Trail Clubs in the early 80's. My asthma was bad in those days and I can still remember that day at Lemoines' Point when Cathy and Moira walked with me as I struggled to keep up with the group due to sudden onset of cold-induced asthma. My asthma improved as the years went by and I progressed into more challenging terrains but to my chagrin my speed has not improved much and I remain a slow hiker. Contributing to my slowness is the fact that I am an avid photographer and my 3500 slides of the AT should help me relive my experiences when I am no longer able to hike.

My interest in the AT started after talking with a group from the Potomac AT Club during a hike I was leading along the west side of Gould Lake. This encounter led to our Spring hikes in Shenandoah National Park. I would lead a group of Rideau Trail Club hikers for circuit hikes during which we would walk on short sections of the AT which as I discovered later were some of the easiest sections of the Trail. In Fall of 1989, I was hiking with the Ottawa Ramblers in the Adirondack National Park and Tony and Grace Hyam mentioned that they may start hiking the AT. I was delighted when Tony said I could join. Allie and I started at Springer Mtn, Georgia in April 1990. We loved it even as we struggled up some of those knolls in Georgia.

In the early days I used to arrange small group hikes and there would be 3 or 4 of us doing day hikes with overnight stays at motels or cabins. In retrospect, this was luxury! We enjoyed each trip with no thoughts of hiking the entire trail. Then the trail worked its magic and I became obsessed with wanting to walk more and more of the trail.

When the terrain become rough and we encountered sections with no roads, backpacking became a necessity. The skills that I had picked up during the backpacking trips that Arne Henrikson led in Fall, helped me.

Our first backpacking trip was in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. An easy backpack in retrospect since despite the height of these mountains the trail was not difficult.

The backpacking increased my freedom and it was easy to pack my gear and leave for a hiking trip without spending time on the myriad of tasks involved in arranging a group hike. Nonetheless, I am grateful to Nanette Whitwam for accompanying me on the backpacking trip from Crawford Notch to Franconia Notch, part of the Presidential Range in New Hampshire. We experienced the whole spectrum of weather changes from bright sunny days to that day with howling winds, rain and dense mist as we walked along Franconia Ridge. I found the latter to be a little daunting but Nanette seemed unperturbed and this helped to dispel my uneasiness. This experience and others including the bushwacking trips with Terry and Don prepared me for hiking alone.

I hiked the rest of the trail in the White Mountains, Massachusetts, Connecticut, parts of Virginia and parts of Maine by myself including walking through the famed and dreaded Mahoosuc Notch in Maine, in pouring rain. For Stan, Bev and myself, Maine remains "the jewel in the crown". The lush greenery, rugged mountains and beautiful lakes, in this wilderness section of the Trail, are truly spectacular. I now understand the sentiments expressed by Harry Gardner, many years ago, regarding hiking in Maine.

Last, but in no way the least, I would like to acknowledge the help and support provided by Stanley Douglas, my hiking buddy for about 20 years. Stan walked at least half the AT with me and together we walked through it all, the sunshine, pouring rain, ice storms, thunderstorms, windstorms and snowstorms and whatever else nature threw at us.

I walked the last mile of the AT in April this year and now that it is over, I feel a great sense of loss as the AT was a source of great enjoyment for about a decade. I enjoyed the planning and the challenges and believe me every section had its own set of challenges. I now understand why those who having reached the end of the Trail, turn and walk the AT in the opposite direction and continue on until their energy or money runs out.

Hotel L'Esterel, Laurentians - Feb. 4 - 6, 2000

Thanks again to our favourite travel agent, Joan Patterson of Marlin Travel, we will be returning to the scene of last year's most successful Winter Get-Away Weekend. Same place, same price!

Hotel L'Esterel is an excellent 5-star cross-country ski resort located one hour north of Montreal. With its high elevation we are almost assured of prime skiing conditions. The hotel is among 5000 acres of lakes and forests and has 85 km of cross-country trails which are groomed and track-set daily, leading right from the door. Trails are available at all levels of difficulty, most being at the easy and intermediate level. Expert trails access the Laurentian trail network. Other outdoor activities include snowshoeing, skating (a track is cleared along lakes for several kilometres), downhill skiing, dog sledding with Siberian huskies, and sleigh rides.
