

OUTSTANDING SERVICE AWARDS

Ottawa Club - Graham Creedy

Graham is happy in untracked bush with only a compass to guide him, usually in the wild parts of Gatineau Park.

While he was Club Chair, Graham often expressed frustration with the Trail between Richmond and the Marlborough Forest being all on highways, when the Guidebook showed a great deal of uncharted swamp and bush (mainly swamp), that generations of Routes and Negotiations Committees had shaken their heads over but had never been able to find a way through.

After stepping down as Chair, Graham put his bushwhacking skills to good account. He single-handedly set about finding a way off Kettles, Munster, Greens, Franktown and Joy's Roads. All one summer and fall he explored, following old paths, snowmobile tracks, and bushwhacking, talking to farmers, snowmobilers, and others who might know that part of Old Marlborough Township. With a possible way through, he contacted landowners and negotiated for us to run the Rideau Trail over their properties, in one case calling at the Toronto office of an absentee landowner, where he found the person with the authority to say OK.

Graham faced one more major hurdle: the Jock River. He spoke to a landowner and got permission to build a crossing that could be taken out over the winter. He then designed a crossing and got a work crew together. They moved several tons of limestone rocks to fill wire baskets (gabions) in the river and fastened twelve foot planks to them so that the rest of us could cross the notorious Jock dryshod. By fall 1999 the Trail was complete.

This year's end-to-enders all walked on these trails and used the crossing. They know what a great improvement to the Trail Graham provided.

RTA Executive Handbook Outstanding Service Award Guidelines

HIKE ACTIVITY LEVELS

Hikes are graded with the following Levels

- 1 Well defined trails, gentle inclines. Hiking boots not required, but trails may be very wet. Suitable for beginners and recommended for newcomers.
- 2 Generally on trail. May include hills, light bushwhacking, some rough spots or obstacles. Boots recommended.
- 3 May include one or more of rough terrain, long climbs and descents, rock scrambling, extensive bushwhacking. Boots, level 2 experience, and a high level of fitness essential. Long pants and sleeves recommended.

KINGSTON CLUB - LOON LAKE, MARCH 3-4

Enjoy another great get-away weekend at Loon Lake Lodge, Murphy's Point Provincial Park, March 3-4, 2001. On Saturday a Park Naturalist will lead guests on a guided Ski or Snowshoe tour of about 2-3 hours. In the evening, dinner will be provided followed by a slide presentation. Other evening activities may include a skate on the shores of Loon Lake, Coyote Howling, or a Singalong by the outdoor fireplace, or indoors in the rustic pine atmosphere of the interior of the Lodge.

JUST ANOTHER WALK IN THE WOODS

In October I completed a final section of the Appalachian Trail (AT) with a ten-day hike in Connecticut and New York. The end-to-end marathon involved 190 days of hiking over 10 years, with 21 trips to various trailheads from Geogia to Maine. Not a record-setting pace to cover 3,500 km., but one which can perhaps be forgiven as I am only five years younger than the AT itself.

Completing the AT would have been unlikely without Don Mitchell's company, experience and encouragement. Don more than finished his end-to-end of the AT in 1996 and I was happy, at least in retrospect, to have been with him while struggling through Maine's Mahoosuc Notch in October that year. Since then Don continued with me most of the time but often was content to do car shuttling, locate camp sites and meet me as I slackpacked the day's distance. Although more than half of my trail days were spent backpacking, the day hikes covered considerably more distance. With countless relocations over the years the AT now traverses wilderness 99% protected from private encroachment. Very little road walking remains but, except in Maine, road crossings are frequent.

Parts of the AT I hope to revisit include the northern lake wilderness in Maine and its terminus atop 5,200 foot Katahdin, the high grassy Balds of Tennessee-North Carolina, the White Mountains of New Hampshire with their full-service mountain-top huts, and the Smokies which seeemed remarkably easy once you got up to the 5,000-6,000 foot ridge. In Virginia switchbacks ease the climb and you will come across the gorgeous Virginia Creeper, a 16 km. optional rail trail criss-crossing a winding, shaded river but, alas, lacking tea rooms.

My absolutely slowest progress was last year when backpacking a 50 km. section in Maine where Bill Bryson and his pal finally bailed out, 135 km. from Katahdin. There were also over-ambitious day hikes never to be repeated: in New Hampshire south of Franconia Notch where Don and I needed 12 hours to scramble and stumble over 26 km. of high precipitous ridges; and in Maine with a normally fast hiking partner—21 km. in 11 hours.

Despite many difficult challenges of the AT, over 5,000 hikers have recorded end-to-ends, including 550 in 1999. These dedicated individuals and countless others owe much to the Trail founders' vision and to continuing work of staff and volunteers. Most recent statistics record that the latter, 4,400 in number, provided, in one year, 174,000 hours of donated labour and skills.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE RTA BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING OCT. 21, 2000

The President reviewed preparations for the AGM and announced that the Association is still looking for someone to fill the position of Corresponding Secretary.

The Trail Coordinator announced that a new improved Rideau Trail Guidebook should be ready to go to press in the spring of 2001. The Board approved expenditure up to \$25,000 for preparation and printing. This will result in a deficit for the coming fiscal year, but reserves amply cover the loss and sales of the Guidebook will eventually recover the costs. Funding to cover part of the costs may be sought if it will not delay publication.

At the Hike Ontario meeting in Kingston on Oct. 13-15 the RTA formally rejoined Hike Ontario. The President advised that while savings in costs of insurance coverage were less than anticipated, there was no additional cost burden on the RTA. Further, Hike Ontario membership may provide an effective lobby to promote the interests of hikers with government. The Treasurer advised that he will be insisting that Hike Ontario maintain financial reporting requirements of high quality, and noted that there has been considerable improvement recently.

The President advised that there has been little progress in the development of the K&P Trail, primarily due to opposition from neighbouring landowners.

On an issue of whether non-members should be entitled to obtain end-to-end awards, the Board decided that effective on publication of the new Guidebook end-to-end awards will only be available to members of the RTA.

RTA membership remains relatively constant.

Several Board members have become aware of websites suggesting that dirtbikes may use the Rideau Trail. Comments were made to the operators of these sites stating that the Trail is reserved for hikers, with requests that the information be corrected.

With respect at least partly to the last item above, the Board has been notified of a proposed motion for the next Board meeting, to **change the name** of the Association to Rideau Hiking Trail Association, Inc., i.e. to add the word Hiking in the name of the Association. **Members are asked to provide comments** on this proposal to their local Club Chair or Club Representative (see page 2), by the end of December, so that all views can be taken into account in considering such a motion as proposed.

RTA HISTORY

An enthusiastic and hard-working couple who have made an outstanding contribution to the RTA are Ed and Shirley Simpson. Founding members in Ottawa, they were two of the five people from Ottawa who attended the original meeting in Kingston in 1971.

During that summer Ed and Shirley served on the Routes and Negotiations Committee. Ed, who worked in the Surveys and Mapping Branch of Energy, Mines and Resources, was a natural to this committee. When the students finished any given part of the Trail, they asked the committee where they should go next, and the committee would quickly decide on the next section. Ed and Shirley and the other committee members went every weekend, scouting out the Trail. They greatly enjoyed this experience and the contact with the students.

When the Trail ran across private land, it was necessary to get the permission of the landowners, usually farmers. The committee was pleased that the initial response was usually positive and enthusiastic. Sadly, some farmers later withdrew their support because of vandalism and hazards such as broken glass that appeared on the path.

Ed was in charge of Trail Maintenance for the Ottawa Club for several years. In early days, work parties and outings were combined. Families came out to hike and work on the Trail at the same time. The Simpsons had three children, Tom, Debbie and Donna; the youngest, Donna, sometimes came with them on these outings.

When indoor meetings were required, they often took place in the Simpsons' basement. The Simpsons' phone number served as the information number for the Ottawa Club for many years.

Ed and Shirley remember many enjoyable outings, including backpacking trips to the Kingston area every fall, some winter camping, and ski trips to Merrickville.

Perhaps their greatest single project was the building of the cabin. In 1974 a man named Peter Cameron donated 4.6 acres of land to the Club. The Simpsons formed a committee to develop the land. First they planted trees, 100 small maples and firs. Then somebody offered some black walnut seedlings, and the Simpsons remember digging these up, in pouring rain, and transplanting them to the site.

Next the group decided to build a log cabin on the site. None of them had ever built such a cabin before, so they got books out and read up on how to do this. They applied for a Wintario grant, hoping to raise \$10,000. Wintario eventually gave them roughly half that amount, \$4,531.23 to be exact. They raised the rest themselves.

Many people provided volunteer labour to work on the cabin. Shirley kept a list of all the names and attributed an hourly rate to their time. This amount of money was officially recorded as a donation of the person concerned.

They were given some wood from a building on Richmond Road that was going to be demolished, and with this wood they built an outhouse. By all accounts, this outhouse was very elegant.

Building the cabin was hard work, but this was a happy time for the Simpsons. Many people pitched in to help. Early in 1977 the group purchased the necessary logs, for \$272.00. Unfortunately, when the logs were delivered to the site, they were dumped in the wrong place and had to be carried some distance by hand over the rough terrain. Next the group had to strip the bark off the logs before it dried on. All the work had to be done by hand because there was no electricity at the site.

Ed and Shirley laugh as they recall the 'chinking', smoothing the cement between the logs. Everyone had an individual style for doing this.

Although a few details remained to be finished, the cabin was in usable condition by the end of 1977 - a remarkable achievement.

The group put up a bird feeder, and Shirley established a roster of people willing to trek in with bags of birdseed, in winter, to keep this feeder filled. They collected discarded bottles along the Trail and took these in for a refund; this money was used to buy the birdseed.

The cabin became a focal point for the Ottawa Club. People who loved the outdoors appreciated it very much. For more than ten years, it provided shelter and enjoyment for countless hikers, skiers, birdwatchers and others. Even snowmobilers treated it with respect. Unfortunately, though, after a while problems did arise. Some wild parties were held there, and eventually the cabin was destroyed by fire. This was devastating for all the people who had worked on it. "So many memories went with it," said Shirley.

Nevertheless, Ed and Shirley Simpson retain their optimism and most of their memories of the Rideau Trail are happy. They have kept in touch with the RTA and have carefully preserved all the bulletins, in order, from 1971 to the present. We owe them heartfelt thanks for all their contributions to the Club over many years.
