Highlights of the RTA Board of Directors Meeting – January 19, 2002

Present at the meeting in Perth were 13 directors as well as guest Marilyn Levitan from the Ottawa Club. Marilyn presented her ideas on the introduction of a Bi-weekly E-Mail letter to be sent out to members. Such a letter, it was suggested, would contain up-to-date news and information. It would also improve internal communication within the Association. It was agreed that the Ottawa Club would set up a pilot project to assess the plan and report back to the Board at a later date. This idea is not meant in any way to replace the Newsletter.

Insurance companies have not finalised their rate setting procedures at this date. Rates are expected to rise significantly. Our RT Association insurance expires soon and negotiations are continuing with some urgency.

Amalgamation has extended the borders of the City of Kingston to Orser Rd. Concern has been expressed over projected urbanisation in this area as this could jeopardize the future of the Rideau Trail. It is vital that this situation be addressed as soon as possible. The K&P Trail could provide a possible solution. The former rail-bed property is owned by Bell and they are prepared to sell should a suitable purchaser be found. Apparently some Kingston City councilors have reacted positively to the idea of a linear park. Allan Tattersall is representing the RTA on a K&P Trail committee to promote and monitor this proposal.

The membership directors are negotiating to upgrade their computer system so that software can be used to integrate the membership with related bookkeeping records. A sum of \$500 has been allocated to cover this expense and a contract is expected soon.

It has been adopted that memberships have to be renewed in order to receive a Summer newsletter. A follow up letter is to be sent out in early May as a reminder. Total membership is up 7% from Feb. 2001 making a total of 973 as of Jan. 13, 2002. There are now 149 life members.

The 2001 edition of the RTA Guidebook has been selling well and is also available at several retail book stores.

The RTA AGM is to be held on Saturday Oct 19 at the Lombardy Golf Club, Smith Falls.

Allan Bonwill

Allan Bonwill died on January 19, 2002. We will always remember him as a man who loved this land and had done his best to conserve the property we know as Skycroft. Part of our Trail system runs through Skycroft property, which has since been sold to Queen's Biology Station. As far as we know these trails will remain part of our system, as long as we maintain them.

Allan and his wife Ellen (previously deceased) came from the USA. Allan had been in the area on camping trips as a Boy Scout, and grew to love this land. He wanted to impart his knowledge to others, especially to children. So he and Ellen decided to establish an Outdoor Centre in 1973. Land was acquired on Lake Opinicon and thus Skycroft was born. Now it is a Family Campground, where learning continues. Anne, their daughter, and her husband, Jim, will continue this tradition. Allan liked nothing better than to go with you on a hike on one of his trails, as long as he was able.

Some of us have camped at Skycroft with our families. I have stayed at "The Little House" where Allan and Ellen lived while they built "The Big House". My first solar shower was taken there — leaves at my feet, spiders crawling up the wall and birds flying overhead! The RTA has held meetings in the Barn. One, I remember in particular, as I watched a tiny brown bat attend the meeting by hanging under the clock on the wall, asleep and swaying gently in the breeze. This was the meeting that Allan had put a slide show together on the history of the area, and as he was our guest speaker, gave us a very enjoyable talk that evening.

The shelter on our Trail there was built as a memorial to Allan and Ellen Bonwill. We hope it will do just that. We will think of you as we use the trails, and we will miss you both, Allan.

The Barrow Boys

The most southerly section of the Trail, between Bath Road and the Trailhead on Front Road in Kingston, known as the Wetlands Trail, crosses woodland and marshes belonging to the Cataraqui Region Conservation Authority. It incorporates two lengthy boardwalks, constructed by the RTA about ten years ago.

At times the Trail has become almost impassable due to mudholes, fed by runoff from the adjacent golf course. Using gravel provided by the C.R.C.A., a team of RTA volunteers with wheelbarrows have carried about 40 loads of gravel across the south boardwalk and filled in the mudholes. The worst hole has been bypassed, and while the Trail is much improved, there is more to be done next year.

Ski Weekend at L'Estérel



The Rideau Trail Ski Weekend, initiated thirteen seasons ago by members (Bull, Fox, and Wolf) was another success. There was snow in the Laurentians — not as much as other years but more than in Kingston and its hinterlands.

Over seventy animals skied, some skated, others swam — all gourmandised. The founding animals contributed: Wolf (Konrad) did the driving again; Bull (Keith) gave the slide presentation and talk (rafting the Horton River in the N.W.T.); and Fox (Arthur) operated the projector in support of Bull and asked the best questions.

According to questionable archival sources, this year was our thirteenth venture and our fourth at L'Estérel. The Laurentians have never failed us for snow and hospitality. From the opinions expressed by old and new participants, at our bargain rate (under \$300 for two nights' accommodation, five meals, bus/van, ski, skate, swim, and amenities) many would go again.

While the two served meals were leisurely, the cuisine again received high marks. The evening programs began after nine, a wee bit late for some of us. That, too, can be corrected. The Friday afternoon (5 to 6) mixer was endorsed as a good way to match sayings and names, for both old and new. Several participants were from faraway places like Toronto and Belleville — but none from Ottawa this year. Over twenty new people joined us this year.

The bus (56 seats) was filled before the end of September. With over twenty on the waiting list, we gambled that a van (14 seats) would not seriously jeopardize our waiting list. (Yes, we need a waiting -continued on page 11

Levels of Difficulty

Hiking:

Level 3 - Rough terrain. One or more of extensive bushwhacking, steep sections, long climbs and descents, beaver dams or other obstacles, rock scrambling. Boots, level 2 experience, and a high level of fitness essential. Long pants and sleeves recommended.

Cycling:

Level 1 - Few hills, broad roads or bike paths, little traffic. Participants must be able to ride a bicycle.

Level 2 - Some hills, narrower roads, some traffic. Participants should be fit and experienced.

Level 3 - Long hills, narrow roads, excellent fitness and good cycling skills required.

Skiing:

Level 0 - Flat terrain, variable length.

Level 1 - Gentle hills, may be long distance (eg 15 km).

Level 2 - Variable terrain, some steep hills. Level 1 experience needed. Green and blue trails in Gatineau Park.

Level 3 - Long, varied terrain, may be off trails. Level 2 experience essential. Black trails in Gatineau Park.



Rerouted Trails and Changes to the Trail Guide


Closed portions of the trail are marked by xxx. New portions are marked or ____.

The Trail continues north and east around fields and through wooded country for 3 km until it reaches Stagecoach Road at Lambert Road, where it turns left (north) into Sydenham.


