



Highlights of the 33rd Annual General Meeting of the Rideau Trail Association Saturday, June 19th, 2004, Lion's Club, Perth

Sixty five members were present. The President, Peter Hawkins, opened the meeting by thanking the many volunteers who help the organization in so many ways. As a result of their collective efforts, support and goodwill, the Rideau Trail Association (RTA) is the second largest trail organization in Ontario.

The Treasurer, Rolf Calhoun, reported that the RTA Annual Meeting has reverted to the spring due to fact that the fiscal year of the RTA has been changed to end on 31 March. This corresponds with the Club year-ends, and reflects a recommendation last year by our "reviewer". The 2004 year-end financial statements were approved.

Peter congratulated Rolf on having been Treasurer for 10 years and thanked him for implementing many changes in the RTA accounting methods, notably introducing computerized accounting, and adopting standardized balance sheet and income statements for reporting financial results.

Bob Chadwick, Membership Director, reported that the RTA has 1215 paid up members as of June 17, 2004. The Central Club had a whopping 22% increase in members during the last twelve months.

The RTA Trail Coordinator, Bill Murdoch, reminded the assembly of a suggestion made some years earlier that the RTA participate in an Adopt-a-Roadway program. It was felt that this would be a good way to promote and enhance the profile of the RTA. The Ottawa Club has subsequently decided to pursue this idea in conjunction with the City of Ottawa. Ottawa Chair, Ron Hunt, reported that the proposed area of clean up is located on map #9 along Roger Stevens Drive between McKenna Road (location of the Schoolhouse) and east where the Trail crosses Roger Stevens Drive.

Bill identified that work will be done this summer on two bridges on the Tow Path along the Tay River, and the building of a boardwalk at the beaver dam south of Ferrier Road (map #6). The Trail has been temporarily re-routed to avoid a third bridge – the one over the Jock River – which was damaged during the spring runoff (map #10). Finally, some RTA members in Gananoque have created a system of trails in the Marble Rock Conservation Area with the blessing of the Cataraqui Region Conservation Authority. The RTA has agreed to maintain this new trail system.

Peter Hawkins reported that the RTA has a \$5 million Commercial General Liability policy – bodily injury and/or property damage with a \$500 deductible. This policy covers the following types of activities:

- Hikes published in the Rideau Trail Newsletter within Ontario (including Urban walks, Moonlighters and Wednesday Evening hikes).
- Hikes in the Gatineau Park, Quebec.
- Bicycle outings on roadways, and bike paths.
- "Adopt-a-Roadway" program.

The insurance policy does not cover the following:

- Hikes in the United States.
- Mountain biking.
- Canoe events.

Fall 2004 Hunting Season

The purpose of this notice is to inform users of the Rideau Trail about the primary hunting seasons in the area of the Trail.

The deer hunting season is scheduled for November 1-6 and November 15-20. Hunters are very active during the entire deer hunting season because it is so short.

The season for waterfowl begins September 11 and runs until December 18, 2004. The season for game birds (such as grouse, partridge, pheasant) begins September 20 and runs until December 31, 2004. Hunting activity is most prevalent in the first two or three weeks of these seasons.

Hikers (especially hike leaders) are advised to wear "hunter orange" hats and garments and to proceed with caution when venturing into areas where hunting could be taking place.

2005 End-to-End - Update

Planning of the 2005 End-to-End series of hikes is proceeding. It has been decided that the 2005 End-to-End will start in Ottawa and finish in Kingston. The intent is to limit the length of most of the hikes to 15-17 km. to make them more accessible. The first two hikes are scheduled for April 30 and May 1, 2005 and together will cover the Trail from the Richmond Landing to Fallowfield Road (maps # 11 & 12).

Once the schedule has been finalized we will publish it on the Rideau Trail website. Donald Cutts 1924 - 2004

It is with great sadness that we have to report that a pioneer of the Association passed away on Friday, August 6. Donald Cutts died as a result of an accident in Kingston the previous day. It happened while he was returning on his bicycle from one of his daily visits to his beloved Catherine who has been hospitalized for about three years.

Don was out with the Kingston Club's Wednesday walkers just the day before the accident. Cathy was a founder of the Group and for many years Don and Cathy led most of the Wednesday walks. In recent years Don has been the coordinator for this popular weekly event.

Don and Cathy also initiated and for many years organized the Kingston Club Mid-Week B&B trip.

Participants' Responsibilities

Participants should bring a lunch, drinking water, sun and insect protection and should wear appropriate footwear and clothing.

Participants are expected to choose a trip suitable to their physical abilities and skill level. They should inform their leader, at the start, of any health problems or of any existing or potential difficulties with their equipment. Each participant will respect all financial obligations. The volunteer leaders will expect the support and co-operation of each group member. Parents and guardians are expected to supervise their own children.

Levels of Difficulty

Hiking: Level 1 - Well defined trails, gentle inclines. Hiking boots not required, but trails may be wet. Suitable for beginners. Recommended for newcomers to Club activities.

Level 2 - Generally on trail. May be hilly, light bushwhacking, some rough spots or obstacles. Boots recommended.

Level 3 - Rough terrain. One or more of extensive bushwhacking, steep sections, long climbs and descents, beaver dams or other obstacles, rock scrambling. Boots, level 2 experience, and a high level of fitness essential. Long pants and sleeves recommended.

Cycling: Level 1 - Few hills, broad roads or bike paths, little traffic. Participants must be able to ride a bicycle.

Level 2 - Some hills, narrower roads, some traffic. Participants should be fit and experienced.

Level 3 - Long hills, narrow roads, excellent fitness and good cycling skills required.

Skiing: Level 0 - Flat terrain, variable length.

Level 1 - Gentle hills, may be long distance (e.g. 15 km). Participants should know how to glide on skis and have elementary knowledge of techniques for going uphill and downhill.

Level 2 - Variable terrain, some steep hills. Level 1 experience needed. For example, green and blue trails in Gatineau Park.

Level 3 - Long, varied terrain, may be off trails. Level 2 experience essential. For example, black trails in Gatineau Park.

This year marks the 20th anniversary of the first B&B trip that they organized. We plan to publish a photograph and more information on Don's life in the next issue.



Wednesday Walker Annual Report 2004 (Ottawa Club)

Wednesday Walkers continue to have level 2 and level 3 outings every Wednesday. Most of the level 3 regulars have purchased high tech snowshoes complete with crampons. They are used late in the season when the snow has a hard, icy crust, character building for skiers and walkers. With these snowshoes, the all too short best season of the year is extended, this year by 2 weeks.

In the 53 Wednesdays April 16, 2003 to April 14, 2004, there were 49 Wednesday outings, 11 skiing, 36 walking and 2 snowshoeing. 102 people signed in. Average attendance 18, maximum 65 (the anniversary "outing"). For the level 3 group, average time on the trail 4.7 hours, longest 6.4 hours; average distance covered 10.8 km, longest 20.2 km.

There were four injuries reported: none skiing, two walking, one in the trail-head parking lot (resulting in 4 months off and 4 shoulder tendons reduced to 2 1/2), one at Lusk Falls involving a spectacular fall with some facial DNA left behind (she was always more than just a pretty face). Two resulted in damaged knees - one with snowshoes on, one carrying snowshoes.

Lyme Disease

Lyme disease has become a serious and growing health problem as it continues to spread across North America. It is now present in most Canadian provinces. Over 200 cases have been reported in Ontario. The disease has been a factor in other parts of the world including Europe for many years. It was first discovered on this continent in Lyme, Connecticut in 1975 when a cluster of children became mysteriously ill with arthritis.

Transmission: It is a bacterial infection primarily transmitted by deer ticks that inhabit wooded or grassy areas and have been infected by other animals. The disease resides in mice, deer, rats and birds. The tick can attach itself to the skin but since it is only about the size of a poppy seed it can easily be missed. Not all ticks are infected with Lyme Disease.

Symptoms: The incubation period for this disease may occur between 3 and 30 days after becoming infected. The most common sign is a red rash often in the shape of a bulls eye with the circle spreading outwards. In approximately 35% of cases no rash was reported. Lyme disease may resemble other diseases making it difficult to diagnose. It can manifest itself initially as flu like symptoms. If left untreated bouts of arthritis in the large joints may occur. Other associated illnesses include migraine or neurological disorders. Chronic conditions occur in about 10% of cases.

Treatment: Lyme disease can be treated successfully with antibiotics; however, complications can occur if not treated quickly. Prevention: Hikers should wear light clothing with long sleeves and pants, and a hat. Ideally the pants should be tucked into the socks. Repellents containing Deet may prevent ticks becoming attached to the skin. After an outing hikers should bathe or shower and check exposed areas for possible ticks.

Tick Removal: Use fine point tweezers. Do not squeeze the tick's body; grip it where its mouthparts enter the skin and gently tug at it until it releases itself.

"HELLO, uh, THERE"..... a discussion on RTA Name Tags

So, at the hike start-point, it goes round the circle. The hikers introduce themselves. Nice friendly touch, that. Five minutes later, ask anyone to tell you the names of the people they didn't already know. Hmmmm. Or the name of that fella you're sure you hiked with three weeks ago.... Personally, I've been there. How do the newer members or prospective members feel, knowing hardly anyone?

This summer I hiked with a group in SW Ontario. They all wore personalized club name-tags, hard plastic with metal clasps. Most had them attached to their hats or back-packs. Cost: The tag I have in mind is 1" X 3 ½", black rigid plastic with white lettering. Metal clasp. About \$5.00 for a permanent, personalized RTA tag; \$1.50 for a reusable/returnable non-member/new-member tag. There's a few logistics to work out for hike leaders, but nothing heavy.

Wearing a tag would, of course, be voluntary. Some people have said they don't feel good about wearing a label. Well, I guess one would really be doing it as a courtesy to others – as they're doing for you. I'm in favour of any step that might make some fellow hikers, new or old, feel better involved. Maybe we'd also attract more new members, and save some of the ones that don't renew.
