PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

On October 29 the End-to-Enders arrived at the Kingston Trailhead to complete the journey that began on April 30 in Ottawa. They were greeted by Councilor Floyd Patterson representing Mayor Rosen. After some friendly repartee, the group departed to celebrate with dinner and entertainment.

Completing the distance between Ottawa and Kingston entailed 20 separate hikes of varying lengths. Since the dates were not always convenient for everyone, "make ups" for missing sections were required, sometimes on short notice. There were no major snags, and everyone maintained high spirits despite heat, rain, and occasional exhaustion. The group's friendliness, courage and determination contributed to the success. I hope we meet again on future hikes. Congratulations to all who parti-

cipated, and thanks to the organizers for their excellent planning.

Participating in the End to End hikes enabled me to see and compare the different sections of our trail and to develop a good perspective on its condition. Although the trail is in reasonably good shape, some areas do need attention to remove overgrowth and the effects of storm damage. Leaders or any hikers who notice a location badly in need of improvement should advise the Club Maintenance Coordinator or an executive or board member. We can then take prompt remedial action.

In September Bob Chadwick led his sixth fall trip. This year's destination was Spectacle Lake. ⇒

Once again the annual Vermont trip was a great success. Thanks to Watson and Josie for organizing it. Spectacular hiking opportunities, good weather, and time by the pool kept the participants happy.

During our after-dinner conversations in Vermont, someone suggested a spring trip to the Adirondacks. Because of the enthusiastic response, accommodation has been booked at the Adirondack Loj in the heart of the High Peaks Region. (See page 13 for details). The three-day trip, May 15 to 17, is designed to miss the bug season; unfortunately there will still be some snow on the peaks.

The Ontario Trails Strategy Report was recently released - the result of workshops and public meetings held across Ontario. The trails are for walking, hiking, nature activities, cycling, and use by ATV's and snowmobiles. The main purpose of the Trails Strategy is to successfully accommodate all of these diverse groups and to develop, promote and extend Ontario's trail system. This initiative is part of the provincial government's ACTIVE 2010, a long term plan to increase the level of physical activity among Ontarians as well as to take advantage of the economic benefits involved in the growth of trails and the development of tourism. It is estimated that 800,000 people use these trails including 25 hiking clubs with about 13,000 members. It is difficult to predict the effect the report will ultimately have on the RTA or other hiking clubs. This report appears to be the first step in a long process.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE FALL RTA BOARD MEETING

Ernie Trischuk provided the Board with a progress report on the preparation and printing of the seventh edition of *The Rideau Trail Guidebook*. The first-round comments on the map text have been received from the reviewers. The cut-off date for final comments on the text is January 1, 2006. Samples of the new maps have been made available

to the Board and map committee members for review and comments. There will be fifteen maps of the main Trail and two special maps to cover the Marble Rock, Gould Lake and Schoolhouse Trails. The project is on track for the June 1st, 2006 publication date.

In addition to handling regular business, the Board made the following decisions at the October meeting:

- Responsibility for public relations and membership development for Merrickville-Wolford township will be transferred to the Ottawa Rideau Trail Club.
- We will investigate the feasibility of re-routing the Trail to connect directly with the town of Merrickville in time for the 175th anniversary of the Rideau Canal in 2007.
- A written history of the Rideau Trail Association will be prepared in conjunction with the 35th Anniversary of the Association. (Interested parties should contact Peter Andrews at 613-728-3016)

The Kingston Club reported that they are in discussion with the City of Kingston regarding participation in the establishment of the K&P right-of-way as a hiking and walking trail in the vicinity of the city. The Central Club reported that they have received permission from the land owner and from Parks Canada and are now in the final stages of preparing to re-establish the tow-path bridge along the Tay Canal. The Ottawa Club reported on signage initiatives to raise the awareness of NCC Trail users to the location of the Rideau Trail in the Western Greenbelt area.

The total paid membership as of October was 545 Ottawa, 316 Kingston, 89 Central and 63 non-affiliated members. The total paid membership of 1013 is up by 55 (5.7%) members since July 2005 but down by 57 (5.3%) since October 2004 and down by 9.4% since September 2003.

The next regular meeting of the Board is scheduled for January, 14 2006. The Board will also be meeting on Saturday December 3 for a strategic planning meeting.

SPECTACLE LAKE AND ALGONOUIN PARK

Another successful Kingston Club outing! Twenty-two members (including a few from Ottawa and Central) participated in the September 2005 mid-week trip. Rather than the usual B&B accommodation, this year we chose Spectacle Lake Lodge. The setting was ideal with excellent views of the lake. Some of us took advantage of the sandy bathing beach and the canoes. The lodge's location was another advantage, just a thirty minute drive from Algonquin Park's east gate.

Our journey to Spectacle Lake included scenic views of Mazinaw Lake and the Madawaska River, as well as heritage stops at Crooked Slide Park and the Polish-Canadian monument commemorating the 1944 Warsaw Uprising. We had a picnic lunch at the Wilno Shrine Hill Lookout.

Spectacle Lake Lodge offers a challenging hiking trail system developed and maintained by the Ottawa Rambling Club. Shortly after our arrival, we all completed one of these trails - a short but steep ascent to Bear Mountain. Although most of the Ramblers' trails were too demanding for our group, a few energetic members rose before breakfast and hiked the trail behind and above the lodge. They were rewarded with a dazzling view of the lake in the early morning sunlight.

The second day, devoted to Algonquin Park, was gloriously sunny. Most of us began the morning visiting the extensive logging exhibit, followed by an easy boardwalk introduction to the park's trail system. We had lunch close to the main museum so that those who wished could spend some time inside. In the afternoon we completed the Booth Rock Trail. A few members chose an easier route. An even smaller group of hardy hikers conquered some of the peaks on Centennial Ridges and other nearby trails.

On the final day we hiked on the rail trail in Barry's Bay and visited the tourist centre in the former railway station. With this year's trip fresh in our minds, we should begin thinking about our preferences for next September.

Questions for 2006

What would best suit next year's midweek B&B group? Should we revert to B&B's or use a resort/lodge? Should we hike the Rideau Trail or trails in Algonquin Park or somewhere else? One suggestion is an inn in Hudson, Quebec with hiking in nearby Rigaud just east of the Ontario border.

IF YOU GO DOWN IN THE WOODS AT NIGHT...

Last October I went hiking alone – and was in for a big surprise!

It was the day of the Central Club hike, led by my husband Dave, on a network of wilderness trails around Crotch Lake. This popular hike is followed by a potluck supper at the cottage of our American members. Linda and Bruce. Although I was attending an all-day workshop, I had arranged to meet the group at the cottage for the social event.

The cottage is accessible only by boat or by foot on a one kilometre trail. Because the workshop finished late, I knew I had to drive fast to begin the short hike before dark. On arrival I parked my car, quickly put on my boots, grabbed my backpack and hiking stick, and set out on an unfamiliar trail. I assumed this would be a brief, straightforward journey with no confusing secondary trails. How wrong I was! In the now-fading light, I missed the turn-off to the cottage. I walked what seemed to be a very long kilometre, but I was still sure that over the next ridge ..or.. just around the corner ..or.. on the other side of that inlet I would see the lights of the cottage and would soon be inside enjoying delicious food, good wine and congenial company.

So I kept going and going and going... Finally I had to admit that I was on the wrong trail. I was completely lost and it was rapidly getting dark. I calmly resigned myself to spending the night where I was - alone on the trail. Fortunately I hadn't left all my brains behind! I did have a flashlight, a jacket, gloves, large garbage bag, snacks and water. But I had left my emergency pack, containing blanket, matches, whistle, etc., at home. After all, I was only taking a short walk to a cottage! Although it was relatively mild for October, I knew it would get colder and that I was facing a long, uncomfortable night. I also considered the possibility of a bear encounter.

Luckily it was a bright moonlit night and I had a flashlight. I knew that I should stay on the trail, but I noticed a nearby open area on an inlet of Crotch Lake. Before heading in this direction I found an unusual looking tree root to mark the place where I

could find the trail again. Slowly I made my way over the rocks to the shore. It was my lucky night! I saw the lights of a small boat coming towards me. As soon as I heard the voices of the occupants I started shouting and waving my flashlight. Two very surprised young men, out for an evening of fishing, welcomed me on-board and delivered me to a lodge near the cottage.

When we arrived, there were my husband, friends, and two police officers. The expression on each face as I stepped off the boat was priceless! The two young fishermen announced, "She is the biggest catch we have made in a long time!" And I was relieved that I had not been on the menu at a (teddy) bears' picnic!

THE JOHN BENNETT BOARDWALK

Rideau Trail hikers and the public at large can now keep their feet dry on a brand-new boardwalk in the Stoney Swamp area of the Greenbelt. A joint project of the Ottawa Rideau Trail Club and the NCC, the boardwalk was proposed by the section maintainer, Dr. John Bennett, and the Ottawa Club Maintenance Coordinator, Ron Maybury. Ottawa Club volunteers constructed it over several weeks during the hot summer. Named the "John Bennett Boardwalk", it was officially opened on October 20 by Councillor Jan Harder in a ceremony emceed by Ottawa Club Chair, Ron Hunt, and attended by Ottawa Club members, NCC officials and a local reporter. Dr. John Bennett, the section maintainer and an enthusiastic participant in previous construction and maintenance projects, is a retired medical doctor, an accomplished wood-worker, and a former WWII Spitfire pilot.

The new boardwalk is built on a section of the Greenbelt Blue Loop. The full Loop, approximately seven kilometres long, is described on pages 90 to 92 of the Sixth Edition of the Guidebook. Access is from the east side of Moodie Drive opposite parking lot 8 and south of Hunt Club Road. The trail starts on an alvar (limestone) surface and then enters cedar bush - an area that is always wet and becomes impassable in spring.

The NCC supplied lumber for the boardwalk. A group of ten volunteers built the thirty-five ⇒

sections in two days. Commission staff then transported these sections to the site. It was hot, heavy work requiring as many as eight men to carry and place each of the sections. By mid-July the job was completed. Built to NCC standards, it is part of a well used hiking and ski trail.

Our thanks go to the volunteers whose hard work made this possible. Projects such as this one are not undertaken lightly by the Club. We hope the boardwalk will be used by both members and the general public.

WINTER YURTING IN THE GATINEAU

It was early March. Our destination was Taylor Lake Yurt - six kilometres from our starting point. Upon arrival we had lunch, then stoked the fire, left our packs and headed out for an afternoon ski in an area of the Park that few people sec. The sun was strong and the weather almost, but not quite, too warm for cross-country skiing. I enjoyed the unfamiliar trails and the new experience. We returned for a pre-dinner happy hour followed by a potluck feast with impressive variety, generous portions and gourmet quality.

Those of us in the top bunks had a warm and comfortable night. We were most grateful to our friends in the lower bunks who kept the fire stoked! During the night, the Easter bunny paid an early visit and left treats - chocolate eggs for everyone. After eating a shared breakfast, we went out for one more ski. Then it was time to don the packs and head home. Winter camping in the park is a treat worth repeating.

Gatineau Park offers four cabins and two yurts for winter sleepovers. Most shelters hold six people, except Philippe cabin which accommodates ten, and Brown Lake Cabin which holds sixteen. The shelters are well equipped with stove, wood, bunks, and cooking pots. An outhouse is nearby. Although drinking water is generally not available, it can be brought in by park staff for an additional cost.

FLOOD ROAD TRAIL RE-ROUTING

KM 229.8: FLOOD ROAD




About 0.3 km along Flood Road, the Trail turns left (north) leaving the Earth Star Loop. Soon it traverses a Ducks Unlimited control dam beside a large, open wetland. Crossing the dam, the Trail leaves the old road to the right, passes through mixed bush (mostly cedar) where the ground can be wet, turns right at an old fence line, and meanders through a partly forested field to reach the north

extension of the Flood Road. Here it turns left (north) on a forest road for about 500 metres. passing a farmstead which is now a hunt camp. Upon reaching an intersection the Trail turns right (east) then after 300 metres proceeds left (north) along another forest road for 500 metres. Just before reaching yet another forest road intersection the Trail turns right (east) into the forest for a short distance until it intersects with the Pond Trail, which is indicated by yellow markers. This is a nature trail established by Marlborough Forest Management, which circumnavigates Roger's Pond - a Ducks Unlimited installation. Turning left (north) at this point the Trail passes through pine forest until it reaches some open grassy land immediately beside the large swampy Roger's Pond on the right (south), which it skirts until it reaches a metal bridge over a dam. Shortly after, the Trail then emerges onto a rough stony road which, taken to the left (north), leads to the Cedar Grove parking lot on Roger Stevens Drive.

Note: The Pond Trail, if taken to the right at the point where the main Trail joins it, crosses a wooden bridge and within a kilometre passes a three-sided shelter overlooking the end of the pond. It then joins an earth road which leads left (north) to Roger Stevens Drive.

TWIN ELM TRAIL RE-ROUTING

KM 262.7: EAGLESON ROAD



The Trail turns right (south) on Eagleson Road, crosses a creck and turns left on Barnsdale Road. The Trail follows this road for 2 km and turns left (west) onto Twin Elm Road which it follows for 2 km. The trail passes through Twin Elm and continues along a farm road for 1.4 km along the right (east) bank of the Jock River then crosses the river over a seasonal farm bridge onto Steeplehill Crescent. When the bridge is not in place, follow the blue winter loop which turns left over the Twin Elm bridge and proceeds along the Richmond Road to the intersection with Steeplehill Crescent.

SUMMARY OF TRAIL CHANGES

January 2004 to October 2005

Maps 2 - 3 Gould Lake

This re-routing would modify the Guidebook text at the top of p.32. Approximately 250 metres north of the north junction of the main trail and Ridgewalk, the trail makes a sharp left turn. Travel about 0.6 km, then turn right to reach Bedford Road. Turn right. Salmon Lake Road is reached after about 2 km.

Map 5 - 6 Murphy's Point

Guidebook pages 57-58. The Trail turns left onto Murphy's Point Park winter ski trail to Lally Homestead, crossing Black Ance Point Road and continuing along a rocky ridge with Black Creek on the left before reaching the Lally Homestead. It then crosses Lally Road, and proceeds along the toteroad to the Silver Queen Mine for 10 metres before turning left onto the Beaver Pond Trail. It follows this to its intersection with the winter ski trail, turns sharply left, and proceeds through hardwood forest and scrub land to intersect the group camping area access road about 30 metres in from Lally Road. Turning right and following this road to its end at the Round Lake Group Campsite, the Trail continues along the ski trail for another 400 metres, then veers off to the left into hardwood forest. The Trail soon leaves Murphy's Point Provincial Park and enters onto private land, passing several beaver ponds. It eventually exits the forest onto an old logging road, turns right and proceeds along this road. The Trail then crosses a wetland on the logging road and emerges onto the property owners' laneway to the residence on the right, then a short distance down the laneway to Long Lake Road about 30 metres from its intersection with Narrows Lock Road. It turns right along Long Lake Road for 100 metres before turning left at a stile.

Map 6 Tay River Tow Path

Temporary change April 2005

Guidebook page 64. There is a temporary re-route due to ice damage of the Tay River bridge. At km 172.0 the Trail crosses Lanark Road°#43, heading south-east along the east side of the Tay Canal on Riverside Drive, turning left°and following°Canal Bank Road to its end. The Trail continues via an unopened road allowance to Evans Road.

At Lanark Road #43 the Trail turns right and proceeds in an easterly direction along Lanark Road #43 for 1.0 km turning south onto Rathwell Road. At the end of Rathwell Road the Trail turns right following a private driveway for approximately 100 metres where the Trail reroute reconnects with the permanent Trail turning left into a field heading east towards Ottawa.

Map 6 - 7 Frizell Road

Guidebook page 65. When heading towards Ottawa, instead of turning from Hwy 43 on to Frizell Road the Trail now continues a further 250 metres on Hwy 43 then turns right over a style.

Map 10 Soldiers Line to Jock Trail

Guidebook page 84. The Jock River Crossing has been discontinued as the main trail due to continuing ice damage. Instead, the Trail now follows the previous winter route from Soldiers Line - turn left at Soldiers Line then right at Munster Road and right again at Jock Trail.

Level 2 Generally on trail. May be hilly, light bushwhacking, some rough spots or obstacles. Boots recommended.

Level 3 Rough terrain. One or more of extensive bushwhacking, steep sections, long climbs and descents, beaver dams or other obstacles, rock climbing. Boots, level 2 experience and a high level of fitness essential. Long pants and sleeves recommended.

SAVING ROCK DUNDER

Rock Dunder is a familiar landmark in the Kingston region to many Rideau Trail Club members. Rising 275 feet above Morton Bay in Whitefish Lake, Rock Dunder provides spectacular views of the surrounding Rideau Lakes and woodlands. Owned by the Boy Scouts, its network of trails has provided many enjoyable Rideau Trail hikes over the years. The Kingston club's fall hike to Rock Dunder has become a club tradition.


With declining membership, the Kingston area Scouts have had to reduce the number of properties they operate, and the Rock Dunder camp location was declared surplus and put up for sale in September of 2004. Fearing that sale of the property for development would see this special place lost to the community forever, the Rideau Waterway Land Trust has stepped forward to secure this unique property for public use in perpetuity.

The Rideau Waterway Land Trust (RWLT) was formed in 1996 with a mandate to acquire and preserve lands of ecological value in the Rideau Waterway Corridor. They have already demonstrated a strong track record, acquiring or preserving 12 properties along the Rideau. Acquisitions have included islands on the Rideau Lakes, woodlands, wildlife habitat, and special scenic properties, such as the "Red Rock" of Big Rideau Lake. All acquisitions are carefully evaluated, and a management plan put into place to ensure that the properties will be maintained in their natural state in perpetuity.

Rock Dunder is a natural fit for the RWLT. From its location on Morton Bay, it encompasses 283 scenic acres, 7000 feet of shoreline, and two historic cabins. In addition to its hiking trails and scenic lookouts, Rock Dunder provides a low-impact camping area for canocists, a sheltered cove and swimming spot, and access to the Gananoque River system. Rock Dunder lies within the internationally recognized Thousand Islands Frontenac Arch Biosphere Reserve. An area of considerable ecological importance, it has

been designated as a Provincially Significant Area of Natural and Scientific Interest and has been identified as habitat for a number of Species at Risk and several locally rare species.

The RWLT was able to negotiate an Agreement with Scouts Canada to purchase the property. The purchase is scheduled to be completed in March 2006. RWLT must raise \$170,000 to complete the transaction. They have begun a fund-raising campaign and are approaching various government and non-governmental agencies as well as private corporations for support.

A key element of their plan is fund-raising from the community and individuals. The RWLT is hoping to find motivated donors amongst the membership of the Rideau Trail Club.
