

Presidents Message

A proposal to increase the membership fees will be tabled by the Board of Directors at the annual General Meeting (AGM) on June 16, 2007. It is proposed that the annual individual membership be increased from \$20 to \$25 and that the household membership (two adults living at the same address) be increased from \$25 to \$30.

The individual membership fee has not changed since 1995. The annual household membership was introduced in 2003 at \$25.

Why is the increase being proposed? The balance sheet for the past two years shows income from membership fees did not cover our operating expenses. The shortfall was \$33,230 in 2005 and \$8,380 in 2006. We need to address the deficit to ensure the long term financial health of our Association.

It should be noted that income from the sale of the RTA Guidebook is used to recover the cost of producing the next edition of the guidebook. These funds do not con-

tribute to our operating expenses. Also it is our current policy not to use funds from donations to cover operating expenses. Income from donations is used for major projects and trail preservation initiatives.

The cost of running the RTA over the past few years has been affected by inflation. There has been a 26% increase in the consumer price index (CPI) since 1995, affecting such things as printing, postage and insurance costs to name just a few of our expenses.

The annual individual membership fee in the Rideau Trail Assoc is lower than other trail associations of a similar size to ours. This will still be the case if the increase is approved.

I look forward to discussing this with you further at the AGM on June 16 at Jones Falls. In the meantime if you have any comments or suggestions to make on this issue, please do not hesitate to contact me or any of the other members of the Board of Directors. See you on the Trail.

The Rideau Canal -World Heritage Site?

I represented the RTA at the 2006 Rideau Waterway Symposium held at Codes Mill in Perth on Nov 22nd 2006. The purpose of the meeting was to launch the celebrations for the 175th Anniversary of the opening of the Rideau Canal and also to draw attention to its possible designation as a World Heritage Site. The main theme for the day was "Rideau Canal on the World Stage". The keynote speaker was Francois Bordry, President of Navigable Waterways of France who shared his experiences of managing the Canal Midi, a World Heritage Site.

Other guest speakers were from Parks Canada, The Rideau Canal, The Heritage Network, Rideau Heritage Route Tourism Association and the Heritage Planners Network. There was a packed audience consisting of personnel from Parks Canada, Rideau Canal, Chambers of Commerce, Travel Agencies, Heritage and Environmental organizations as well as politicians and representatives of the many businesses located along the Rideau Corridor. Discussion continued throughout most of the day.

The main idea that emerged from the meeting was that the Rideau Canal was a prime contender for recognition as a World Heritage Site and that the "Eyes of the World will be upon us". It was suggested that organizations within the corridor should be prepared to develop activities and provide accommodations that will attract visitors to the region.

The only reference to hiking during the day was when Francois Bordry mentioned that visitors enjoyed walking along the side of the Canal Midi.

The decision is to be made by an International Committee meeting in New Zealand. An announcement is to be made on June 30, 2007. If there is a positive result it will no doubt impact on the RTA as we too are part of the culture of the Rideau Corridor.

Membership Help Needed

The RTA requires one or more people to help with the work of maintaining memberships. Membership work is key to the association. It ensures an up-to-date list of members for newsletter mailings and for clubs.

The membership work is under review. This is an opportunity for you to participate in the re-engineering of the job.

Three major areas are involved:

- empty Kingston mailbox weekly and distribute mail to appropriate parties
- maintain the membership list on the computer and produce statistics as required
- pack and mail items ordered by members

The person handling the mailbox must reside in the Kingston area. The person maintaining the computer files must have experience working on computers and have their own computer with Windows 2000 or Windows XP or compatible software. The membership software is written in MS Access 2000. The packing and mailing of ordered items is a manual process. The person handling the computer work or the packing/mailing could reside anywhere.

Participants' Responsibilities

Participants should bring a lunch, drinking water, sun and insect protection and should wear appropriate footwear and clothing.

Participants are expected to choose a trip suitable to their physical abilities and skill level. They should inform their leader, at the start, of any health problems or of any existing or potential difficulties with their equipment. Each participant will respect all financial obligations. The volunteer leaders will expect the support and co-operation of each group member. Parents and guardians are expected to supervise their own children.

Levels of Difficulty

Hiking: Level 1 - Well defined trails, gentle inclines. Hiking boots not required, but trails may be wet. Suitable for beginners. Recommended for newcomers to Club activities.

Level 2 - Generally on trail. May be hilly, light bushwhacking, some rough spots or obstacles. Boots recommended.

Level 3 - Rough terrain. One or more of extensive bushwhacking, steep sections, long climbs and descents, beaver dams or other obstacles, rock scrambling. Boots, level 2 experience, and a high level of fitness essential. Long pants and sleeves recommended.

Cycling: Level 1 - Few hills, broad roads or bike paths, little traffic. Participants must be able to ride a bicycle.

Level 2 - Some hills, narrower roads, some traffic. Participants should be fit and experienced.

Level 3 - Long hills, narrow roads, excellent fitness and good cycling skills required.

ROBIN TURKINGTON

Kingston Club will be losing one of its premier volunteers when Robin Turkington and his wife Nancy move to the West Coast! For almost twelve years, as our Trail Maintenance Coordinator, Robin has been a constant presence on the 200 km. of Trail and blue loops in the Kingston section. He has organized and led the work parties for repairs and construction, recruited the maintainers and kept track of all the trail projects. If there's something that needs building or fixing or clearing, there you'll find Robin, usually with Tony Parfitt, Bill Murdoch and a posse of other volunteers. You seldom see Robin on the trail without a tool in his hand and a pocket full of markers. (Incidentally, Robin made those hundreds of markers you see on our trails, cut from large sheets of plastic using his "guillotine".)

Robin once described his truck as "well-worn". It was certainly a familiar "partner" on a hundred work parties. Over the years Robin must have covered thousands of km in it for the RTA, carrying tools, lumber and helpers to all sorts of sites, sometimes penetrating hard-to-reach locations. Just another contribution from this generous fellow.

A few years after Robin began as Maintenance Coordinator, the calamitous Ice Storm of 1998 devastated many sections of trail. Throughout the late winter and spring, Robin and others organized 36 work parties to clear and repair the damage, and had the trails ready for use by the time the rest of us came out of winter hibernation. For that and all his other hard labours, on the trails and with

Dorothy's "listen up you guys" got proceedings going at the parking lot. She announces where she is going, and then, when a second group was set up (by adherents of inside lunch), and then third and fourth groups, Dorothy called on each in turn to announce their intentions. The result was a number of hikes/skis/snowshoeing/canoeing outings, all level 2 or 3, maybe occasionally, maybe often, 3+ for Dorothy's group. (Paul called them character building. Paul was also the guy that said "the way women are taking over the world, if men didn't have duct tape, they wouldn't be anything).

In January of 2000, the Acting Chief Guide told Dorothy that he was concerned that periodically he would wander off trail, and when searching for a trail, cross it without seeing it, or find the trail and turn the wrong way. It was during that era that John Young answered the concerns of two new members who asked if we were lost. John said "let's say we are somewhat surprised by where we are". 
