HIGHLIGHTS OF THE OCTOBER RTA BOARD MEETING

Progress is being made towards the implementation of a financial oversight mechanism. This has two parts: creation of a "financial oversight committee" to work with the Treasurer on maintaining sound financial practices; and the appointment of a professional accountant to carry out an annual review of the RTA financial records and statements. To date, Pat Archer and Suzanne Brown have indicated their willingness to serve on the committee. The Board is still searching for a reviewer.

A separate committee has also been established with the goal of developing a plan for eliminating the operating deficit. The plan will be ready for presentation at the 2008 RTA Annual General Meeting. Sheila Menard, Elizabeth Mason and Ron Hunt have volunteered to serve on this committee and presented their charter and project plan for this work at the October Board meeting.

Paul Jean has been recruited as the new RTA Webmaster. Paul is a software developer with previous experience as a volunteer webmaster. He has been a member of the RTA since 2006. Paul has begun the process of taking over the webmaster role from Peter Hawkins. This will offload Peter and make it easier for him to meet his commitments as the RTA Treasurer.

The total paid membership in the RTA as of September 30, 2007 was 1,036 which is comprised of 552 individual, 302 household and 182 life memberships. The Board discussed methods for improving the effectiveness of membership renewal efforts.

The next meeting of the Board is scheduled for January 19, 2008.

SKIING BIRTHDAY IN BANFF

"I'd like to go skiing on my birthday - in Banff."

That was a year ago January, during a ski in Gatineau Park with Dorothy Belter. She was going to have a 'significant' anniversary next year and wanted a special celebration. Having previously hiked in the Rockies with her, the opportunity to see the mountains in winter was especially appealing.

Because we wanted to ski to a backcountry cabin, we made the focus of our trip the historic Skoki Lodge, built in the 1930s in Banff National Park. Our base was the Canadian Alpine Centre in Lake Louise - spartan, but comfortable accommodation. Each night we took turns preparing group meals, dining quite well.

One of the prettiest skiing areas was along the Pipestone River, across the highway from the village - a landscape of snow-laden evergreens, meadows, and mountain views.

Before skiing into backcountry, Paradise Valley was a perfect choice for a full day on mountain trails. Our trip into the valley followed the summer trail: ski-tracked, and un-groomed. After half an hour of awkward climbing through the trees, the trail moderated. Tantalizing glimpses of the mountains pulled us along. Emerging from the trees, we were awed by the splendour of Paradise Valley. We skied about 14 km, surrounded by meadows, clouds, and snow-capped Mt. Temple.

We knew the distance to Skoki Lodge, since I had been there in the summer, but that was all. The route climbed two mountain passes and crossed a high elevation lake. Reaching the first pass, it would be wide open for about 4 km, but would it be wind-blown? Icy? Cold? Would our Ottawa skis be OK?

A day on the trail provided the answers. The snow was good up to Deception Pass - the high point. However, the ski tracks were not very deep or well-defined, so we experienced some side-slipping. The 11 km route was marked with tall, red poles (slalom gates?) which helped our navigation under the heavy cloud cover.

Coming down from Deception Pass to Skoki – "I don't think I've ever gone so fast on skis." - Dorothy.

Lack of shadows and sparse tree cover affected our speed perception, making it difficult to recognize how fast we were going! On the other hand, this terrain and the new snow from recent days combined to make conditions perfect for powder skiing. The next morning, three of us returned to those ideal conditions.

We had two more days of skiing at Skoki Lodge before our ski out. Our accommodation was two small cabins, separate from the main lodge. We had carried in only clothes and equipment. The remaining necessities were provided by Skoki - food, bedding, towels, etc. Naturally, they served birthday cake our first night.

Skoki's location and topography offer crosscountry skiers a variety of opportunities. The valleys between the mountains are generally deep and fairly wide, so the ups and downs are usually gentle. The scenery combines forest, meadows and peaks.

Our day trips included visits to two backcountry campgrounds and a park warden's patrol cabin. One group skied a circle around Skoki Mountain, while others ventured up a creek bed into a pass that provided some of the trip's most spectacular scenery. That coincided with our one day of clear weather. There's nothing like blue sky and sunshine to improve the view.

So Dorothy celebrated her special birthday in fine style, enjoying a taste of skiing in the Rockies, and surviving to tell the tale.

ORIENTEERING ANYONE

We have just done a "brochure exchange" with the Ottawa Orienteering Club to introduce their members to the RTA and ourselves to their activities.

The first thing I learned is that "orienteering" is not necessarily "bushwhacking" as each of their events consists of three levels:

- One where you use a map alone to find control points on a trail;
- One where a compass is also needed but the control points are close to a trail, and
- · One where you would be well off trail.

The other thing I learned is that you do not have to be a runner to enjoy orienteering as you can "walk the course" and enjoy the scenery. Rather than thinking of it as a competition, think of it as a way of improving your use and understanding of a map, sense of direction and use of a compass – all of which will give you a better feeling of confidence in the woods and thus benefit you as a hiker. The Ottawa Orienteering Club offers basic instruction courses periodically. Many of their events are at different locations in Gatineau Park.

Whereas our slogan may be "see you on the trail", theirs is "see you in the woods", but remember, these are not mutually exclusive.

Participants can expect to be on the trail a minimum of 5 hours. If snowshoes are needed, they are fun, easy, and you can expect lots of help. Skiers are welcome but must arrange their own transportation.

RIDEAU TRAIL ASSOCIATION - OTTAWA CLUB ACTIVITIES WINTER 2007

The meeting place for Ottawa Club activities can be one of three main locations along the OC Transpo transitway. Although traditionally, the meeting place has been at the R.H. Coats Building (Statistics Canada), now two other meeting locations along the OC Transpo transitway are frequently used. As a result, hike descriptions include the meeting place as one of the following three start locations.

Tunney's Pasture

The parking lot of the R.H. Coats Building (Statistics Canada) on the west side of Parkdale Avenue just north of where it intersects with Scott Street. The Tunney's pasture OC Transpo stop is one block away.

Fallowfield Park & Ride

The northwest parking lot of the OC Transpo Fallowfield Park & Ride station located at Fallowfield and Woodroffe. If you travel by car take the first left after you enter the Park & Ride facility, turn right into the lot and go across the parking lot to the far side.

Baseline Park & Ride

The parking lot at the OC
Transpo Baseline Park & Ride
station on Woodroffe Avenue
south of Baseline Road. Meet at
the south-east corner of the
parking lot. All cars must
proceed to the trailhead and must
not remain in the parking lot.

Transportation for hikes is by car-pooling of private cars; passengers contribute to the driver's costs. Fees for parking and entry to parks and conservation areas are shared between the driver and the passengers. Scheduled activities take place regardless of weather.
