Trail Reroutes

Map 1, 8.3 km. Sydenham Rd. south of Hwy 401 Turn left off Sydenham Rd. and follow the K&P Trail for 2.88 km. After crossing McIvor Rd., turn right off the K&P and continue on to the Bullen Rd. extension.

Then turn left to rejoin the Rideau Trail.



Black Ance Road—TEMPORARY REROUTE

Due to the washout of the Foot Bridge where the Trail crosses over Black Creek near the McParlan House in Murphys Point Provincial Park the following reroute is in effect until further notice: At km 141.7 the Trail joins a gravel road (Black Ance Point Rd.) in Murphys Point Provincial Park. Instead of turning right the temporary reroute turns left and proceeds along this gravel road crossing over Black Creek, up a short grade in the road a distance of approximately 150 metres to where this temporary trail turns left and reconnects with the permanent trail going to the Lally Homestead. The temporary resigning will be in place on Tuesday June 3rd.

End-to-End in 12 Days!

Mike Lush of Smiths Falls recently hiked the entire Rideau Trail in just twelve days, successfully raising funds for the Canadian Cancer Society. He wished to honour the memory of his aunt, Dorothy Virginia Williams, and other cancer sufferers as well as the work of many Cancer Society volunteers.

As would be expected, he encountered and overcame many challenges, and appreciated help from several well-wishers. His 304 km journey took 600,000 steps, raising funds at the rate of 3/4 cent per step.

Highlights of the 37^{th.} AGM June 21, 2008

Seventy-five people attended the Annual General Meeting of the Rideau Trail Association on June 21, 2008 at the Foley Mountain Conservation Area, Westport.

Our guest speaker was Don Ross, Executive Director of the Frontenac Arch Biosphere Reserve. This was an eyeopening topic for many, and Don drew attention to the common interests between the Rideau Trail Association and the Frontenac Arch Biosphere Reserve.

RTA President, Ron Hunt, summarized the achievements of the RTA over the past year as follows:

Progress has been made on Trail Quality Task Force work.

The operating deficit has been resolved.

The process for renewing the RTA Trademark has started.

Risk assessment of trail hazards and follow up action documented.

Guidelines were established for awarding the Volunteer Chevron.

Consolidated RTPF and RT Corridor Preservation Funds.

Experimented with new approaches to encourage membership renewals.

Board tried using an Action Register to track action items and commitments, and has found that this helps to avoid over-committing ourselves!

The Treasurer's report was presented and is summarized elsewhere in this Newsletter.

Membership Director, Sheila Menard, reported that she and Marie Warner have been very active in encouraging membership renewal. Through a multi approach using ads in the news letter, mailing reminders, and e-mail, there has been both a reduction in expenses and an increase in renewals. Sheila reported that there were 964 paid-up memberships in the RTA of which 184 are Life Members.

David Armitage then presented the Trail Coordinator's report, drawing special attention to the work of the Trail Quality Task Force and their meeting with Ross McLean of the Bruce Trail Conservancy. David also summarized the recent changes to the routing of the Rideau Trail.

The motion to approve the following changes to the bylaws was approved by the members:

Condensed Financial Report (as presented at the AGM)

My report this year contains some good news. First, we have reversed the operating deficits of the last two years and I am able to report a net surplus of \$12,130.16 for the Operating Fund. Secondly, this year will mark the first year of reporting to you on a segregated fund basis. Reports for the Operating Fund and the Rideau Trail Preservation Fund are presented separately. Third, our Commercial General Liability Insurance costs have been reduced by \$357.48 over last year, with no change in coverage and benefits.

As explained last year, the funds belonging to the Rideau Trail Preservation Fund and the Operating Fund were completely intermingled on our financial statements. While the reports are now separated, it will take up to two years to complete the required transfers between the accounts. This is due to the locked-in nature of the Certificates of Deposit that are held by the Operating Fund.

These changes to our financial statements coincide with the implementation of a new accounting program. Our present program - QuickBooks 2001 is obsolete and has ceased to function properly. In future I will use a program called "Simply Accounting" by Sage.

We have sold a further 295 copies of the Guidebook, bringing our two year total sales to 693 units sold. We are now more than halfway to our breakeven point.

Participants' Responsibilities

Participants should bring a lunch, drinking water, sun and insect protection and should wear appropriate footwear and clothing.

Participants are expected to choose a trip suitable to their physical abilities and skill level. They should inform their leader, at the start, of any health problems or of any existing or potential difficulties with their equipment. Each participant will respect all financial obligations. The volunteer leaders will expect the support and co-operation of each group member. Parents and guardians are expected to supervise their own children.

Levels of Difficulty

Hiking: Level 1 - Well defined trails, gentle inclines. Hiking boots not required, but trails may be wet. Suitable for beginners. Recommended for newcomers to Club activities.

Level 2 - Generally on trail. May be hilly, light bushwhacking, some rough spots or obstacles. Boots recommended.

Level 3 - Rough terrain. One or more of extensive bushwhacking, steep sections, long climbs and descents, beaver dams or other obstacles, rock scrambling. Boots, level 2 experience, and a high level of fitness essential. Long pants and sleeves recommended.

Cycling: Level 1 - Few hills, broad roads or bike paths, little traffic. Participants must be able to ride a bicycle.

Level 2 - Some hills, narrower roads, some traffic. Participants should be fit and experienced.

Level 3 - Long hills, narrow roads, excellent fitness and good cycling skills required.

Hiking in Morocco Part 2 : The Mountain Experience

In May 2007, Najat Bhiry, a former colleague of Cécyle at the Geography Department of Université Laval in Québec City, invited us to join her for a hiking vacation in her home country, Morocco. She made all the arrangements. It was agreed to make this an experience in two parts, the first being a hike in the desert of southern Morocco (see The RTA Newsletter, Spring 2008) and the second a hike in the High Atlas Mountains, which cross central Morocco in a northeast-southwest axis.

Following a one week hike in the desert, we returned to Marrakech, leaving our two French companions to relax in a beautiful B & B in Ouarzazate, the movie center of

Morocco. Najat and we were tired, but ready for our next challenge. After a good rest, a sweet breakfast in a neigbouring pastry shop, a wash of essentials and a trip to the bank, we hailed a taxi to take us to Imlil, a small mountain village, 80 km south of Marrakech.

Imlil, at 1740 m (5700 ft), is one of the two trailheads to climb Mount Toubkal, at 4167 m (13670 ft), the highest peak in North Africa. Not surprisingly, the road from Marrakech to Imlil was at first level and then started to climb suddenly into the foothills of the High Atlas Mountains. After the dry landscape of the desert, it was a

relief to see running water and lush green vegetation in the valleys. The taxi took us to l'Auberge Lepiney, where Najat had stayed before and where our excursion was organized. After a walking tour of the village, we were served a traditionnal Moroccan dinner of vegetable and goat couscous. We then packed our luggage for a three day mountain adventure, leaving everything else at the inn.

The next morning greeted us with perfect weather: sunny and a clear blue sky. At 8:30, we were ready to leave, dressed lightly. Our guide Abrahim and his helper had loaded a mule with our luggage and provisions. For the first hour, the trail was wide as we walked on a local road leading to Aroumd, a small village where we crossed a large dry river bed. Once on the other side, the trail became narrow and rocky as it zigzagged steeply upwards. After two hours we came to Sidi Chamharouch, a shrine and hamlet with a few shops. Shortly after, we encountered a young entrepreneur who had built himself a lean-to beside the trail where he sold local crafts, refreshments and, best of all, freshly squeezed cold orange juice. He kept it cold by diverting the drips of cold water from the rocks over his oranges and drinks. It was the best orange juice we had ever tasted! Najat and Cécyle were also tempted by the beautiful silver bracelets and necklaces. Later on, we had another exciting meeting: a herd of mountain goats, old, young and very young, so cute, with no shepherd in sight. As we continued our climb, the vegetation changed. The cedars were replaced by small desert plants and flowers, even though we could always hear the noise of rushing water at the bottom of the valley. The snow was melting at higher altitudes. At 14:30, we finally reached the Toubkal Refuge at 3210 m (10530 ft). We had come up 1470 m (4820 ft) in six hours. The refuge consists of four stone buildings. The largest one provides lodging in several multi-bunk rooms for hikers. Our room had 36 bunk beds, but some were not occupied. The guides used the kitchen to cook breakfasts and evening meals for their own clients. There were only two regular toilets, the others were all of the scooter type. Showers were available, but during our visit only with cold water fed by a nearby glacier. Brrr! Abrahim was nice enough to heat some water for us. We all counted on a good night's sleep to attempt reaching the summit of Mount Toubkal the following day.

The night, the building and Konrad were cold. Still struggling with his virus infection and having only a summer sleeping bag, he did not have a restful sleep.

All of us had to endure the odour of smelly socks and several variations of snorers. Nevertheless, we were all up before 5 and left at 6 o'clock to avoid the unpredictable afternoon weather for our descent from the summit back to the refuge. The climb was steep, the terrain rugged and challenging. We crossed gullies with waterfalls, large rock areas, snow fields and dangerous gravel sections. We now understood why a guide was needed as there was no definite trail. As we gained altitude, the temperature was below freezing, the wind blew ever harder, and breathing became increasingly difficult. Konrad started to fall behind. At 3800 m (12500 ft), he was experiencing symptoms of altitude sickness: chest pain, a rapidly beating heart and he was losing his balance. He decided to return on his own to the refuge while the others continued to the summit. His descent was precarious due to his lack of equilibrium. Guides of other groups following us made contact with him to ensure that he was able to manage alone.

At the pass, at 3900 m, Najat, Cécyle and Abrahim were ready for a rest stop to replenish their energy with a snack of dates to face the final assault on the summit. The last section was extremely steep, but when Cécyle was almost ready to give up, we were there! Alone on the summit for 15 minutes, we enjoyed the breathtaking views, the silence and took photos, before being joined by other hikers who brought us news of Konrad. We ate some bread, cheese and fruit before starting our return trip. We took some time to play in the snow on our way down having sweet thoughts about Canada's winter. We

arrived back at the refuge around 14:00 with wobbly legs but happy to see Konrad welcoming us with a big smile. He was feeling better. He had also checked the compulsory official government registry of the refuge and discovered that the oldest hiker in the previous 12 months was six years younger than he.

The next morning, Konrad's 71st birthday and another beautiful sunny day, we started the long trek down to Imlil. We were ready for a ride back to Marrakech with a beautiful Berber rug bought on the trail. Konrad left with some regrets, but we all agreed to return for more hiking adventures. For now, we were dreaming of a visit to a hamman (public bath) where we would be deluged with hot water, soaped up and scrubbed from head to toe! Inch' Allah!





Hotel L'Estérel, Laurentians — January 30 - February 1, 2009

Hotel L'Estérel is a cross-country ski resort north of Montreal. Groomed cross-country trails, leading from the door, are available at all levels of difficulty. Expert trails access the Laurentian trail network. If requested, other trails may be accessed by bus or van for all-day skiing on Saturday. Other outdoor activities such as skating, snowshoeing, and dog-sledding are also available at the hotel.

The hotel's indoor facilities include track, courts, pool, whirlpool, and sauna. Facilities are available for group activities such as bridge and scrabble. A "get-acquainted program" on Friday (before supper) and a Saturday evening program will be planned. Evening program proposals welcomed.

Gourmet meals are fixed table d'hote dinners on Friday and Saturday evenings, full breakfasts Saturday and Sunday mornings, and a buffet supper Sunday (3 to 4 p.m.). Gratuities are included. Bag lunches may be ordered. Cost for the weekend is \$330 per person double occupancy or \$430 single.

Departure from Cataraqui Town Centre at 9:00 a.m. Friday January 30 with arrival at about 1:00 p.m. Since all rooms may not be available upon arrival, dress for your preferred activity. Bring a lunch, but lunches may be purchased at the hotel. We return to Kingston about 9:00 p.m. on Sunday.
