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FALL B&B TRIP

There were 25 of us on this annual RTA event, 19 from Kingston, 2 from Perth and 4 from Ottawa. Coordinator Bob Chadwick and friends had researched and prepared for our varied skills, and Bob provided detailed instructions.

After lunch in Granby QC we gathered at Lac Boivin for a scenic hike. I particularly enjoyed walking along the boardwalk, seeing a family of beautiful wood ducks, as well as other waterfowl. A quick look in the park shop and we headed for our destination, Centre d'Arts Orford, next to Parc national du Mont-Orford.

Driving through the gates, I noticed that the huge logs were shaped like 2 hands, the fingers positioned on one side as though holding the strings of a cello and on the other side as though holding a bow. I wondered if they intertwined to close the entrance! The buildings, in a woodland setting, are in musical shapes; for example, a grand piano and a bass clef. We were in the same building as the administrative offices, whose lower level holds a kitchen and a meeting room, where we gathered for drinks and chats before dinner and during free time.

The weather forecast was not promising for our first day, so itineraries were switched. After a hearty breakfast we drove south about 20 km, with views of Lac Memphrémagog, to Abbaye Saint-Benoitdu-Lac, a massive, elegant, modern monastery whose interior and gardens we explored. Some stayed for Morning Prayer, sung in Gregorian chant in the modern and beautiful chapel. It was a moving experience. We then headed west about 30 km through rich farmlands and wild countryside on gravel roads, through the Boltons to the historic tourist town of Knowlton, with its museum, attractive restaurants, and upscale gift and antique shops. A few of us took advantage of end-of-season sales! After lunch we walked the 4-km Knowlton Trail, which follows a stream and then a former rail line to the beach at Lac Brome. We drove back to the Centre along the scenic eastern shore of Lac Brome and Cherry River. Dinner (slow service but delicious food) was at La Merise, a small gourmet

restaurant in the village of Cherry River, about 3 km south of the Centre.

Next morning, after breakfast, we drove 5 minutes north to Mont Orford Park and, after paying our fee, set off on the first of 3 walks planned for that day. The most adventurous among us climbed the rocky trail to the top of 2800-ft Mont Orford, then descended a ski hill. Most of us opted for a level 1, 4-km circuit with pretty pond lookouts. Leaves were just beginning to turn. Although we saw beaver lodges, the only wildlife we spotted were a few crows, blue jays and squirrels. Some then drove 35 km to Valcourt, home of Bombardier, to visit a wonderful museum about the history of the snowmobile. Others chose a level 2 hike of 2 to 3 km a little north; halfway around we had a picnic lunch at a beautiful mountain and lake viewpoint. Those with more stamina then went on a 20-min scenic drive outside the park for a level 2+ hike on a 3-km circuit; the narrow hilly, rocky trails in dense woodland had unusual plants and fungi.

Dinner that night was at L'Expresso, another gourmet restaurant in Cherry River. We were all a bit merry after happy hour and fun with old and new friends and celebrated our last dinner together!

The final morning, after another fine breakfast, some visited the Bombardier Museum or Parc national de la Yamaska before heading home through rain and temperatures that exceeded 30°C.

Thanks again for a job well done, Bob. What can you possibly come up with next? The standard gets higher every year!

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE OCTOBER RTA BOARD MEETING

A sample map for the new RTA guidebook was previewed by Roger Bird and discussed by the Board. The model Chris Heap and Roger are developing is along the lines of that for the East Coast Trail: a map for a day's hike on the front and a navigational description on the back. Inclusion of points of interest along the trail is not contemplated at present. The RTA is looking at electronic distribution for the maps: this will allow for trail reroutes to be easily obtained. A proposal from Michael Haynes (our speaker at the last AGM) to write an accompanying book was considered, but many difficulties were raised. The Board voted not to proceed with this project.

The topic of online payment for memberships was introduced. It was felt that this idea should be pursued, as it could provide an easier way for many members to pay their annual dues and could become a way to pay for the trail guide. A small group of Board members will research this topic and report at the next meeting.

Treasurer Joy Webster noted that year-to-date receipts and expenditures are comparable to those of last year, which is as it should be since management of the RTA and the programs offered are similar each year. The independent review by Wilf Lamb presented at the AGM was briefly discussed and thought to be of

good value in terms of both cost and reassurance; a similar review in a few years would be prudent.

The report by Membership Director Sheila Menard showed a modest increase in our numbers and a fairly steady "churn rate" in the last several years. Some of the churn represents members of other clubs joining the RTA for 1 year after completing the end-to-end to receive a badge.

The Board approved a motion from the Kingston Club to cover 50% of the cost for up to 9 RTA members to take a wilderness first aid course, provided they have led 3 hikes in the last 12 months and have completed hike leader training. The cost to the RTA would be capped at \$1000.


The Board discussed the first 3 planned projects for the 40th anniversary developed at a special meeting held in Perth September 18 and a few additional projects. The Board would like to have some projects take place during the year rather than all being bunched.

Reports were given by each club about various concerns in their sections. The next meeting has been scheduled for January 22, 2011.

ADOPT-A-TRAIL IN GATINEAU PARK

More demanding than Adopt-a-Road is a program whereby individuals or small teams adopt a trail from a list provided by the Friends of Gatineau Park (friendsofgatineaupark@myexcel.ca) for May through October. Participants are asked to visit their trail at least once a month and perform routine maintenance to keep it free of branches and other debris, collect litter, wipe interpretive panels (if needed), check the supply of materials in information boxes, note broken handrails, planks or signs, report blockages from windfall or erosion, fire pits and hazardous conditions, and record numbers of cars in the parking lot and users (distinguishing bikers).

LEARNING TO LOVE THE LIME KILN TRAIL (AGAIN)

In 2005 Ottawa was horrified by the news of the abduction, assault and murder of teenager Jennifer Teague. Jennifer was taken not far from her home in the suburb of Barrhaven while walking home from work late at night. Days later her body was discovered near the parking lot of the Lime Kiln Blue Loop Trail, a bit down the trail, in the side brush. It was a tragic end to an 18-year-old's life, and it shook parents like me to their core.

That's about when I stopped hiking on the Lime Kiln Trail. It didn't matter that this is a beautiful trail, full of hardwood trees, cedar swamps, geologic interest points, history, and birds so tame and trusting that they land unbidden on your arms, hoping to be fed. It didn't matter that I had spent so many happy hours on this trail, running alone with my dog or hiking with my then-young son, feeding the birds, gazing out across the swamps, spotting ducks, otters and beaver. It had now become a haunted place of infinite sadness. I simply stopped visiting it.

Then, in 2009, after volunteering with the RTA to be a trail maintainer, which trail was I given to maintain? You guessed it. No matter my hints at how close I live to Fallowfield or how often I was on the Robertson Road section, the Lime Kiln Blue Loop Trail was in need of a maintainer after the retirement of John Bennett.


On my first few rounds of maintenance I wouldn't go alone. My son accompanied me, accruing his volunteer hours for high school graduation.

As I got to know the trail again, I started to make new discoveries. The foundations of the Lenahan farmstead are easy to miss if you are in a hurry. In spring and summer, an out-of-place lilac tree is a clue that the foundations are nearby. I wonder if Mr. Lenahan cursed or despaired as he tried to farm this rocky, unforgiving land. How did Mrs. Lenahan soothe her children's poison ivy rashes and bug bites? Not far away, in a clearing, grow wild thyme

and oregano. Could these be remnants of the kitchen garden?

On another part of the trail, rows of stones run across the trail and go far into the woods. Old fences? Or is this where the poor farmer piled rocks when the plow brought up yet another one?

Stand at the old lime kiln itself, tune your ears and listen to the current quarry works of Tomlinson off in the distance. There's enough limestone under your feet to keep the quarries going for a long time yet. Appreciate the industrial history of our area. Try to imagine the sound of dynamite blasting 100 years ago.

You never lose the sounds of car traffic on the Lime Kiln Trail. If you take a herd path (and there are many) off the marked trail toward the sounds, more often than not you will encounter a wet area or swamp, full of ducks and geese.

On the boardwalk lookout near the Wild Bird Care Centre, take a look out across Stony Swamp. Be careful when you start to leave, or you may step on a nuthatch sitting at your feet, hoping you will drop some seeds. Nuthatches are easy to miss when the show-stealing chickadees have your rapt attention.

The John Bennett Boardwalk takes you through a wet area full of cedars. It's always dark and cool in there, with black earth and a tangle of roots underfoot. Nothing else can grow here.

Just beyond the Moodie Drive parking area for the trail, a bench has been placed, with a memorial plaque for Jennifer affixed to the side. The bench remains remarkably free of vandalism but for a couple of initials scratched into it, probably by an infatuated pair of lovers who have never heard of Jennifer. It always makes me sad to see this bench because it makes me think of the tragedy of this young woman's loss of life. But it also reminds me to cherish my life and to be grateful that I am able to walk, run, ski, snowshoe and maintain this trail that I am growing to love again.

Thanks, RTA, for giving me this trail to maintain.

PARTICIPANTS' RESPONSIBILITIES

Participants are expected to choose a trip suited to their physical abilities and skills. They should inform the trip leader, at the start, of any health problem or potential difficulty with equipment. Each participant will respect all financial obligations. The leader will expect support and cooperation by each participant. Parents and guardians must supervise their children.

Hiking/Snowshoeing Levels of Difficulty

Level 1: Well-defined trails, gentle inclines. Level 2: Generally on trail. May be hilly, with light bushwhacking, rough spots or obstacles.

Level 3: Rough terrain. One or more of extensive bushwhacking, steep sections, long climbs and descents, rock climbing and beaver dams or other obstacles. Level 2 experience and high level of fitness are essential.

Cross-Country Skiing Levels of Difficulty

Level 0: Easy, short, slow. Other levels require experience and may be long (more than 15 km).

Level 1: Easy. Small hills, wide trails (green).

Level 2: Intermediate. Narrower, steeper trails (blue).

Level 3: Expert. Steep, narrow trails (red/black) and/or bushwhacking.



ALONG THE TRAIL

At the corner of Richmond Road and Steeplehill Crescent south of Fallowfield is a monument to Charles Lennox, 4th Duke of Richmond. In 1818 he was appointed Commander-in-Chief of the British North America colonies and Governor-in-Chief of Lower Canada. In 1819 he made his first official visit to the military posts under his control. Before leaving home he rescued his dog from a mad fox and was bitten on the hand. He then proceeded on his trip by boat, horse and foot. By late August he was in Perth and feeling quite ill but insisted on continuing through swamp, swale and bush to the town of Richmond. He died of rabies at the Chapman homestead, just outside Richmond. The town, Richmond Road and Richmond Landing, where the Rideau Trail ends in Ottawa, are named for the Duke.
