

A HUNT FOR MUSHROOMS

For our first outing of the season we were lucky to have one of few pleasant days of a Fall that has been somewhat unpredictable from a weather point of view. This walk in the G. H. Ferguson Forestry Reserve, near Kemptville, was led by Diana Brebner who, with the help of Harry and Mildred Saunders, was able to identify the weird and wonderful mushrooms that were discovered.

After an interesting talk by Diana on the do's and don'ts of mushroom collecting - and eating - twenty-five of us spent a most enjoyable morning wandering along the trails and through the forest of this very pleasant reserve. Some lucky people even saw a deer and others watched a ruffed grouse at very close range as it stood on the road. Open areas between the trees were gay with golden rod and purple asters while along the road side we found fringed and bottle gentians and fringed ladies' tresses.

At lunch time we returned to the cars to spread out the treasures garnered during the morning, among which were various examples of boletus, lactarius deliciosus (with it characteristic orange 'milk'), deer mushroom (pluteus cervinus), blewit (lepista nuda), and the deadly poisonous fly agaric (amanita muscaria).

Thank you, Diana, for all the time and effort you put into making this a most interesting and informative day.



Although there is no charge for use of the cabin, those using it overnight are asked to contribute to its upkeep by providing either some minor needed service or supplies.

REPORT OF ANNUAL MEETING OF THE RIDEAU TRAIL ASSOCIATION

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 19, 1980, PERTH

How many pairs of running shoes do you wear out walking 200 miles? Ask Pearl Peterkin of the Ottawa Rideau Trail Club. She started her trek from Ottawa to Kingston in May 1979. It ended $1\frac{1}{2}$ years later in plenty of time for her to receive the 200 Award at the Annual Meeting. Congratulations Pearl! (The 200 award certificate is presented to R.T.A. members who hike the trail end to end).

This year's annual meeting was held in Perth. Here are some of the other things of note from that meeting.

--Our bank balance, as of August 31, 1980 was \$6,497.87. Watch for a big change in that with the cost of reprinting maps this fiscal year.

--The Corridor Preservation fund contained \$2,253.53 as of August 31, 1980. Donations to this fund are tax deductible. That will give you an idea of what to do with any surplus income you may have this year.

--We're 779 members strong according to Mary Jane Bowes, membership secretary. Where do we come from? Three hundred members live at the Kingston end of the trail. Three hundred and six members live at the Ottawa end of the trail. One hundred and sixty three members are from "out-of-town".

--Doug Knapp, one of our representatives to F.O.H.T.A., brought us a report from that organization. The Hike Ontario conference in May was a very successful F.O.H.T.A. venture.

As part of the report we had a film and discussion on the new Ontario trespass legislation. Every hiker and landowner should be aware of the implications of this new legislation.

--Who's who in the R.T.A.? A new slate of officers was elected. Here they are. Let them know your ideas, dreams and pet peeves regarding the trail.

KINGSTON RIDEAU TRAIL CLUB WINTER OUTINGS
