

The annual meeting of F.O.H.T.A. (The Federation of Ontario Hiking Trail Associations) is scheduled for February 12, 1983 in Toronto. That puts it after the deadline for this newsletter, but before the newsletter will be received by members.

Major items on the agenda include:

- 1. Go to Blazes Day. The Rideau Trail Association has agreed to co-operate with other trail associations in a province-wide trail maintenance day on May 14, 1983 which will be used to publicize hiking in Ontario and generate interest among new people. (More about this on page 11.)
- 2. Ontario Hiking Day. A thorough discussion of Ontario Hiking Day and how to make it a strong statement for hiking in the province.
- 3. A change in name from F.O.H.T.A. to Hike Ontario. The legal name would remain Federation of Ontario Hiking Trail Associations, but the logo for all public use would be Hike Ontario. It would immediately establish in the reader's or hearer's mind that it had something to do with hiking.
- 4. Discussion of a new brief to the Ministry of Natural Resources from the recently-appointed government relations committee.

F.O.H.T.A. has operated as a completely volunteer operation with delegates receiving just their expenses for attending five meetings a year (four in Toronto and one at one of the association areas). A suggestion that F.O.H.T.A. should have a full-time, paid executive director led to a discussion of F.O.H.T.A.'s role and a decision to have a that led to the Ministry "facilitator" from and Recreation he1p F.O.H.T.A. directors define that role and decide whether paid staff is the solution.

Doug Knapp and Al Gamble, who have represented the R.T.A. so long and so well on the F.O.H.T.A. board, both resigned last year. Henry Heald and Brian Lunergan were elected at the annual general meeting last September to replace them. So the annual meeting on February 12 will just be our second session with the F.O.H.T.A. board.

Although we are both from Ottawa, we want to serve the whole Rideau Trail Association and give all sectors the representation that you, the members, want. We would welcome any comments, suggestions or advice and we will report to the membership as fully and promptly as possible. # Cathy's Sticky Bread

Soak about 6 hours or overnight:

1 cup All-Bran

1 cup brown sugar

1 cup mixed dried fruit

1 cup milk

Stir in:

1 cup flour

1 tsp baking powder

1/2 tsp baking soda

# Highlights Board of Directors Meeting

On Saturday, January 22, 1983 seventeen members of the Board of the Rideau Trail Association met in Perth. Here are some of the decisions made at that meeting that may affect you.

- 1. You can now become a patron (lifetime) member of this illustrious organization for \$150.00. An income tax receipt will be issued. The new category will be added to the membership application form. (See the back cover).
- 2. The Rideau Trail financial books were not audited at the time of the annual meeting in September, but they have since been audited and found in good order. The auditor's report was read and accepted at this board meeting. Thanks to Al Gamble for so capably looking after the accounts of the R.T.A.!
- 3. Watch for these changes in the new Rideau Trail membership renewal forms and brochures. The new prices are effective April 1, 1983. Please discard old brochures after this date.
  - a) Maps will be sold for \$4.00 per set and the map cases sold separately for \$3.00. The cost of a map set plus a case is therefore \$7.00.
  - b) The Rideau Trail lapel pins are currently out of stock. New ones are being ordered and will be sold for \$3.00 each.
  - c) Rideau Trail decals for the car window will be available after April 1st at a cost of 50 cents. New members will receive one free.
- 4. Look for the article on "Go to Blazes" Day on page 11. This mighty maintenance day is scheduled for May 14.
- 5. Note that the trail will be closed to hikers (except in conservation areas and provincial parks) on Tuesday, March 8, 1983. See the official notice on page 7.




# Frontenac Park MAP 10


# Corrections to MAP 12

This section of trail through the Tay Marsh east of Perth has now been re-routed to Hwy 43 to avoid the virtually year-round impassible marsh.


# HOTICE





'he formerly pejorative expression "go to plazes" will take on a new significance in May when hiking trail groups all across Ontario participate in "Go To 3lazes" Day. On May 14 the Rideau Trail Association, in concert with the other member associations of F.O.H.T.A. (Feder-Hiking Trail Ontario of ation Associations), will be urging its members to celebrate "Go to Blazes" Day by getting out on the Rideau Trail to make it ready for the spring and summer seasons - in other words, a giant maintenance and clean up blitz!

Information received from F.O.H.T.A. stresses "the purposes of such an intensive one-day event":

- a) to improve the quality of our trails
- b) to generate membership involvement and thereby a greater commitment to the concept of hiking trails in Ontario
- c) to publicize hiking and trail associations and F.O.H.T.A. in the province.
- I think you will agree these are all worthwhile goals.

The impetus for "Go To Blazes" Day comes from the Bruce Trail Association, which last year sponsored a highly successful clean up day on its entire 700 Kilometres of Trail from Queenston to Tobermory. The Rideau Trail Association would like to have people out on every section of the Rideau Trail. Groups will be organized and, after the big day, a social event is planned. What could be better than a day spent in the fresh air accomplishing a worthwhile goal and a party afterwards?

So mark May 14 on your calendar and get out your clippers and saws and garbage bags. Everyone is welcome. You do not even have to be a member to join this giant version of the famous Rideau Trail Work Party! # Rideau Trail Run - May 21, 1983

The spring clean up and maintenance of the Rideau Trail scheduled for May 14 comes at an opportune time because the Trail should then be in tip-top shape the Saturday after "Go To Blazes" Day when Bob Tysen starts his Rideau Trail Run. Sponsored by Goolak Backwoods Co-op of Kingston, Eganville, and Kitchener to highlight some new lightweight hiking gear, Bob plans to run the entire trail in just four days - that averages out to fifty miles a day! Through Frontenac Park?!

In addition, following rules developed for a similar run on the John Muir Trail in California, Bob will have to carry his own sleeping bag and much of his equipment. Goolak has developed an extremely light and compact sleeping bag for him. He will be accompanied, however, by a support team of hikers.

It is hoped that RTA President Cathy Cutts will meet Bob on Tuesday, May 24, when he crosses the finish line at Elevator Bay in Kingston to present him with a 200 Certificate for completing the trail end-to-end. It ought to be the fastest time the entire Rideau Trail has been "hiked".

#### Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

A landowner on the Rideau Trail contacted me expressing concern over hikers taking dogs on her property. One of her wishes was that the newsletter carry a notice of her concern. Her feelings are, I believe, shared by other landowners along the trail and this is something we as hikers can stand to be reminded of.

Our hiking code states that dogs must be kept on a leash on or near farm property. Conscientious hikers know and follow this code to the letter but look at if from the viewpoint of a farmer. Instead of a "family pet" he may see your dog as an animal capable of running cattle or deer, killing sheep or creating havoc in the farmyard. Even a dog on a leash is a potential threat. The landowners usually do not know the people who hike on their property or that the dog will stay on a leash once the hiker and dog are out of sight of the farm buildings.

Our continued good relationship with landowners is of vital importance to us all. It is up to us to do everything in our power to insure this good relationship continues.

Please reconsider before taking your pet out on the trail. If you do need to take "Fido" be sure to remember and practice the hiker's code.

- \* Do not leave the trail.
- \* Do not climb fences or open gates.
- \* Carry out all garbage and litter.
- \* Protect all trees and shrubs and leave flowers and plants for other people to enjoy.
- \* Keep dogs on a leash on or near farmland.
- \* Walk around the edge of fields, not across them, and do not disturb farm animals.
- \* Protect and do not disturb wildlife.
- \* Do not make a campfire, except at officially designated and posted campsites.
- \* No motorized vehicles.
- \* Leave only your thanks and take only photographs.
- \* Use the trail at your own risk.

#### Your Corridor Preservation Fund

As one of its low-key but important programs, the Rideau Trail Association maintains a "Corridor Preservation Fund". Supported by donations and by the allocation of bank interest from our operating account, the goal is to establish a fund of \$10,000 by 1986.

Since its inception in 1976, the fund has made three grants totaling \$1750 which stimulated funding from other sources to preserve areas of land for hiking and allied uses. The most recent grant was \$500 donated towards the purchase of the John L. Smith property. This land bordering the western boundary of the City of Kingston, will now be maintained by the Cataraqui Region Conservation Auth-The Authority is planning to ority. undertake the job of rebuilding the burned out board walk in the area where the Rideau Trail passes through the Cataraqui marsh.

A delegation from the Kingston Club attended a Township Council meeting to express our thanks for their part in purchasing this land. A letter was received from Major John Gerretson expressing the City's thanks for the Rideau Trail donation.

As of January 19, 1983 the Corridor Preservation Fund stands at \$3778. If you would like to make a donation to help attain the goal of \$10,000, just include it with your membership renewal. Income tax receipts are provided.
