Farming Trees

The section of the Rideau Trail that I maintain contains a section of pine trees planted in long, straight rows. This was one of my favourite walks. Even on the hottest day, a cool breeze seemed to blow through the trees. The fresh scent of pine was worth taking deep breaths to enjoy.

But this past winter the Ministry of Natural Resources took a swipe at my section-they started thinning my trees! I was horrified. Not only did they cut the trees but they left the trimmed branches behind ... right on the Rideau Trail! Jean and I quickly learned that a routine maintenance job was going to take more time than we had planned.

Why did the Ministry do it? I wondered. The answer to that question was provided, unexpectedly, in June, on our biking weekend. Near Middleville we chanced to stop at a lovely picnic area - the Baird property - a managed forest. A short self-guided hike provided the answer to my question.

Stands of pine were planted by the Ministry in the mid 1960's to produce high quality lumber and utility poles. The trees were sown just like crops, in rows 1.8 metres When these farmed trees receive a first thinning, every third row is removed. My grove has now received a first thinning. Then, some of the trees are pruned to create valuable knot-free wood. trees are marked with a blue ring. unmarked trees will be cut in two future harvests for lumber and utility poles. Branches and tops are left on the site since they provide valuable nutrients for the remaining trees.

Now when I hike my section of the Trail, I'll be watching for the pruned trees and shall try to remember that the scarred forest is just a step in managed tree farming.

Those out there who think you cannot do it. Try it. If Rebecca can, so can you!

Hungry Hiker's Log

2 lbs lean ground beef 2/3 cup oatmeal 2 eggs

1-1/2 tsp Worcestershire Sauce 1 tsp onion powder

Mix well. Roll onto wax paper in an 8" wide rectangle shape. Firm and chill.

3/4 cup finely chopped celery 1-1/4 cups sliced fresh mushrooms Slices of cheddar, Swiss or creamy Havarti cheese (about six slices)

Spread celery and mushrooms over chilled meat. Cover with cheese slices. Roll into log shape. Bake at 350 degrees for about 1 hour. Or, chill the rolled log and cut it into rounds. Freeze the rounds then fry the frozen rounds like hamburgers, and serve over a bed of rice.

- * Respect the privacy of people living along the trail.
- * Leave the trail cleaner than you found it carry out all litter.

- * Keep dogs on a leash, especially on or near farmland.
- * Protect and do not disturb wildlife.
- * Light cooking fires at official camp sites only and drench fires after use. (Better still, carry a lightweight R stove.)

The Second Hike Ontario Conference by Moira Drummond

The conference took place at Guelph University, May 16-19, 1986. The theme, Broadening Horizons, did just that, as participants found there were more places to hike than most of us realized.

We shared ideas and experiences. We talked about existing trails and made plans for new trails. We took part in early morning bird-watching and jogging, and in a full program of hiking on the area trails. We made use of the Nature Centre and Arboretum of the University, and took in the displays set up by the trail clubs and commercial enterprises.

Entertainment was varied and had something for everyone - slide shows, music, square dancing. The highlight for us all was Janet and John Fosters' slide presentation "North to the Top of the World".

We ate very well. The Friday evening early arrivals enjoyed a wine and cheese party, on Saturday there was an outdoor barbecue lunch, on Sunday a pancake breakfast outdoors - the weather being reasonably co-operative! The banquet was held on Sunday night, at which time the Merit Awards were given out. It was good to see our nominees, Helen and Arne Henrickson, receive theirs.

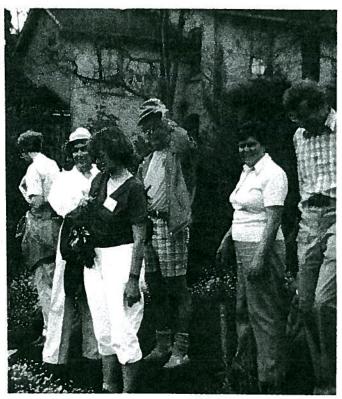
The Ministry of Natural Resources' representative, Norman Richards, gave us some insight into the evolving role of the Government in Ontario hiking trails. The focus was on management plans and the possibility of resurrecting a committee of landowners, trail associations and Government.

The opening panel discussed opportunities for Ontario hiking and the proposed National Trail. Trail managers were asked to look ahead and plan to achieve their goals. Workshops covered most pertinent areas. Ron Hunt participated in "The Elements of Trail Management", and I took part in "Designing An Exciting Program For Your Club". We had a good response to our I also found myself a panel efforts. member at the Town Hall Meeting on Sunday morning where twenty-five resolutions came under discussion. Two of those approved pertained to leadership training

for hike leaders, and a skills program for trail maintainers, that these be taught to volunteers as part of on-going programs. Also approved was a resolution that work on trail expansions be developed by interested Clubs to link and form a trail network in Ontario, to become part of the National Trail. It was also resolved that the principal follow-up activity of the Conference should be a Ten Year Management Plan for Hike Ontario with specific goals and objectives and input from the executives of member trail clubs.

As I was involved in several meetings, including a Board meeting on Monday, I only managed one hike, a "Walkabout" in Old Guelph, a great way to learn of the history and people who settled in the area.

There were 230 registrants, somewhat fewer than expected. However, the Conference did not lose money. Compliments should go to the hosts, the Guelph Trail Club, for a well organized meeting. If the interest aroused and the enthusiasm carries on, Hike Ontario should have a lively and productive future.

recreational potential of our provincial trails; to Broaden the Horizons of our existing hiking trails, linking them into a continuous footpath

Partnership is the basis on which we must build the opportunities for tomorrow's hiker. From our past success and our present endeavours, I am very optimistic about the challenges to come.

Working together, we can apply our imaginations and experiences to meet these challenges.

There is a bright future for trails development and for hikers in Ontario. Together we can accomplish a great deal.

From opening remarks by Norm Richards, Director of Parks and Recreational Areas Branch, Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources. stretching from Quebec to Manitoba; to face the increasingly complex realities of trail building; to address and resolve issues such as trail right-of-way designations, trail management, land-owner relations and negotiations, and educating the public in trail etiquette and enjoyment.

You have constructed and maintained nearly 2000 km of trails and rendered a service of inestimable value to your fellow citzens. And yet, despite a now thirty-year old tradition of hiking in Ontario, this recreation still remains virtually unknown to the public at large.

And so another challenge and opportunity for the future: to establish recognition and links, operating partnerships and on-going cooperation with government agencies. In addition, we must appreciate the value of communication with other likeminded community organizations.

More liaison, more co-operation

Some 30 resolutions were tabled at the Sunday morning Town Meeting, chaired by Henry Graupner. Henry was the first president and guiding light of what was FOHTA and is now Hike Ontario!

Although not all resolutions were discussed, all but two were approved for in general every resolution tabled reflected a consensus that there should be greater liaison between the clubs and the various arms of government. The strongest to reflect this latter view was that of Doug Robertson, executive director of the Bruce Trail Association. Doug urged that Hike Ontario! "recommend to the Ontario government the immediate establishment of a permanent Provincial Trails Advisory Council."

Doug's Trail Council would "provide advice", "foster cooperative development" and eventually bring about "the construction of new and expanded trail corridors for public use."

Defeated was a motion that "Hike

Ontario! should make its priority activity the encouraging of development of the National Trail in Ontario." From the discussion, though, it was clear that the defeat was because of the single-mindedness of the resolution rather than its intent. All present were caught up in the conference's enthusiasm for Doug Campbell's dream of a hiking path to rival the Trans-Canada highway, but the majority also felt that Hike Ontario! and Ontario's trail associations have many other urgent problems that need to be tackled.

Defeated, too, was a motion by Jim Pierce of the Guelph Trail Club. Jim proposed that Hike Ontario! and the Bruce Trail Association amalgamate. His reasoning was that both play much the same role in Ontario hiking and that in very many cases there is a duplication of effort, particularly when it comes to dealing with government. Attractive was that many of the BTA services could be expanded to aid other clubs.

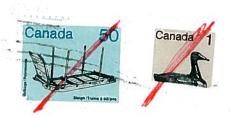
