

Our Annual Bed & Breakfast Outing

A group of Kingston Club members headed for historic Merrickville to walk some of the Ottawa section of the Trail. Cathy and Moira had already completed that section and Moira was heard to comment whilst swatting some winged wildlife, "Oh, the things we do for fun!" Jean and Diane were new to the hiking holiday idea but were happy to have companions and extra cars to help with the logistics.

The weather was hot and humid with some showers and at certain spots wading was required. We have probably all got memories of being scolded in our younger days for getting wet feet and being admonished to keep out of puddles. There was no one there to monitor us so with damp footwear anyway we all proceeded to wade rather than tussle with the growth at the edges. It helped to know we had a change of socks and shoes at the other end. In the woods the trees gave some shade, but shade was sparse on the road section. Jim produced his rope as an aid when we reached the "ditch". It was near there where Winnie fell backwards, Moira fell forwards and both were pleased that Diane was too slow with the camera. Anyone in the stockmarket should consider buying shares in insect repellents as we used a lot over the four days.

The woods were all shades of green and the brilliant coloured wild flowers were profuse. Winnie was generous sharing her expertise in identification of a wide variety of plants. We were not alone on the trails as we met some young people working on an environmental survey for Goulbourn Township and two men in their truck not far from their hunting camp. We lost track of how many abandoned vehicles we passed. One use of these appeared to be for target practice.

We celebrated Moira's birthday one evening. Donald led the singing. We enjoyed a choice of Chinese, Mexican, Italian, and Canadian food in various restaurants. In Merrickville we visited the tea rooms, bakery, antique shops and other stores and found the service good and the atmosphere very friendly.

We also had time to view the historical areas and enjoyed the interesting buildings and well kept gardens. The texts of the two plaques follows:

Founding of Merrickville

"In 1793 William Merrick, a Loyalist from Massachusetts, acquired from Roger Stevens a sawmill at the Great Falls on the Rideau River. Here he built new mills which formed the nucleus of a small community that grew up before 1816 and was known as Merrick's Mills. The establishment of new settlements on the Rideau and the building of the canal from 1826-1832 stimulated the growth of the village. Streets were laid out and a post office named Merrickville was opened in 1829. By 1850 the community contained about 700 persons, two flour mills, a cloth factory and other industries and was incorporated as a village in 1860."

Merrickville Blockhouse 1832

"This is one of four blockhouses which, with some twelve other defensible buildings, were constructed along the Rideau Canal. The canal, built by Lieutenant-Colonel John By, Royal Engineers, was designed to serve as an alternative military supply route from Montreal to Kingston in the event of war. The Merrickville blockhouse was completed in 1832 to accommodate some fifty men. It was never the scene of military action, but has served as lockmaster's quarters, a church and a canal maintenance building. Restoration of this fine example of early military architecture was completed in 1965, and it is one of the two remaining blockhouses on the canal which retain their original forms."

Other blockhouses are in Kingston Mills, Newboro and Narrows Locks.

Summer Wild Flowers on the Merrickville Outing

As we drove up to the starting place on the first morning, Dwyer Hill Road, there were many pink flowers with a slight purplish tint. The flowers had globular heads and on examination the stems were square and the leaves had an aroma suggesting a herb to those who are knowledgeable. The leaf arrangement was distinctive. When we got back to our B&B and a range of plant books, it was soon found that the plant was Basil, a well known plant to cooks. There were thousands of plants on that stretch of trail but less prevalent as the days wore on.

The summer flower beds on the trail were magnificent this year. The purple spikes of Loosestrife wherever there is damp ground or water make a patch of colour. Unfortunately, this plant is an alien that has moved in and is pushing out our native plants.

On the water there were many kidney shaped leaves with a flower stem often 1-3 inches above the water with their white petals. This is another alien that is also pushing out thee water plants. This plant, called Frogbit, is very prevalent in Eastern Ontario waters such as the stream running into Charleston Lake. It is disappointing that we are losing some of the lovely plants by the invasion of intruders such as these.

End-To-End for the Ottawa Club by Bill Grant

On a hot humid Sunday in June about 30 members of the Ottawa club hiked the section of trail west of Gould Lake to finally complete the series of end-to-end hikes. One of the highlights of this landmark hike was the discovery of a six foot long black rat snake! A refreshing swim in Gould Lake was another highlight of the day.

The end-to-end hikes started more than two years ago, with little expectation of the kind of attention they would receive. From the first, they proved very popular and remained so, even when the practice of two outings per weekend was introduced. Most end-to-end hikes attracted at least 25 people and often there were thirty or more.

Many members who joined after the start of the series were inspired to "fill in the gaps" by organizing small group hikes on their own. A number are still doing so.

Probably the roughest hike was the very long one along Maple Leaf Road last year. A close second was the hike this June into the southern end of Frontenac Park and back on a very hot day! These more recent hikes towards the southern end of the trail stand out in the memory, of course, compared to the earlier hikes near the Ottawa end. All those who participated (about 40) will certainly remember the Kingston weekend in early June, when the southern most end of the trail was hiked on two successive days and a group dinner was arranged by the Kingston Club at Gananoque.

Appreciation must be expressed to the many Ottawa Club hike leaders who did their share in making this a success. Thanks are also due to Ray Forester who led two of the hikes and to other Kingston Club officers who helped arrange the Kingston weekend.

Does the completion of the end-to-end series leave a gap in the Ottawa Club's future programs? Yes and no. For one thing, we are now hiking all the loop trails one by one and this program will be completed next spring. After that, who knows? We are constantly looking for new ideas, new trails and new places to go.



Some friendships begin in our childhood and continue through life's stages into our autumn years. Other friendships are brief, almost fleeting, barely begun and suddenly over.

When I first met Ingeborg two years ago on one of my early hikes with the RTA, my first impression was of a slim, almost fragile-looking lady who just loved hiking, and who knew how to use her walking stick, pointing at trees, poking in the ground, balancing across a beaver dam, or gracefully leaning on it.

During following hikes, our conversations would turn to our childhood memories in Germany, early experiences in our new homeland, Canada, our travels to other parts of the world.

Hiking through the woods one sunny afternoon, Ingeborg told me she has cancer, that it is too late to operate, nothing can be done. I was perplexed by her calm, almost matter-of-fact approach to her fate.

During the following months, I was particularly happy to see Ingeborg on our hikes. Her continuous energy seemed to belie her progressing illness, though her inner battles must have been tremendous. Twelve, fifteen, even eighteen kilometres over sometimes rough terrain did not deter her; she never complained. She was happy to have celebrated another birthday; she did not think she would make it.

By last fall the illness began to reflect on her face, the expression in her eyes, though her vigour and spirit had not abated.

During the long winter months I greatly missed her on our skiing trips and wondered how she spent Christmas and the New Year. When, in early spring, I learned of Ingeborg's death, the news, though not unexpected, felt like a stab.. Why do bad things happen to good people?

Yet, somehow I know that, in the years to come, as I continue on my journey, my brief friendship with Ingeborg will always be cherished; it will never be forgotten. Auf Wiederschen! Your friend, Irma.
