INCOMING PRESIDENTS REMARKS

 On The Occasion of The Annual General Meeting in Westport on 21st September, 1991.

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to serve on the Rideau Trail Association Board during this upcoming year.

When I look at the program for today I am overwhelmed with thoughts of how this Association has grown and matured over the past twenty years. In 1971, what existed as a dream, is now a reality. The Rideau Trail is today the second longest long distance trail in Ontario. Its membership has established and maintained positive working relationships with private and public landowners; it is an organization which , while not wealthy in monetary terms, has established a sound process for financial accountability and planning; it has significant depth in membership and in membership activities such as maintenance, hike organization, newsletter publication, communication, and social events. The Association had a beautiful fall day for its annual meeting. This year it was hosted by the Kingston Club and held at The Cove, in Westport. Lynn Nolan of the Kingston club put in a great deal of effort in organizing the day. Attendance was about 100 people which was very good.

The day began with the business Betty McIver stood in for meeting. Nanette Whitwam, last year's president, who was touring in Australia. The main issues of the last year have been the reincorporation (provincially) of Association, and the decision (again) not to belong to Hike Ontario. The Association continues in good financial health. Our membership as of Sept., 20 was 971. Awards were presented to retiring board members Ray Forester, Erwin Wendholt and Ron Beacock (in absentia). The second annual presentation of the Outstanding Service Award was made to Ray Forester and Peter Brebner. A large part of the meeting was taken up by the presentation of the End to End awards of which we had 23 this year. The slate of officers for the coming year was elected (see inside front cover for list). The meeting adjourned in time for lunch.

Before lunch a raffle was held for two pairs of binoculars donated by The Focus Centre, Ottawa. The binoculars were won by Catherine O'Keefe and by Betty McIver.

The highlight of the afternoon was the unveiling of a plaque on Foley Mountain near Spy Rock to commemorate the 20th anniversary of the Rideau Trail Association. It is a beautiful site, and a handsome plaque and was arranged for by Allan Tattersall of the Kingston Club.

The unveiling was followed by a choice of hikes. Pearl Peterkin led a historic walk of the village of Westport, and Ray Forester led a group in the Foley Mountain park. The day ended with dinner and speeches at The Cove. The past presidents of the Association had been invited to the dinner and were asked to say a few words.

OUTSTANDING SERVICE AWARD

OTTAWA CLUB

Peter Brebner of the Ottawa Trail Club was presented with an Outstanding Service Award at the Annual General Meeting of the Rideau Trail Association in September. This was in recognition of the valuable service he has provided both to the Club and to the Association since becoming a member in 1976.

For over ten years Peter has been Chairman of Routes and Negotiations for the Ottawa Club. He has talked with landowners regarding re-routing of the Trail, searched out and marked new routes, and worked diligently in trying to keep motorized vehicles off the Ottawa Club property in the Marlborough Forest. Peter's work with Routes and Negotiations has expanded to include representation on various government committees. He is the hiking representative on the Marlborough Forest Advisory Committee. He is a Rideàu Trail spokesman to the Ministry of Natural Resources and the National Capital Whenever he hears of a Commission. government plan that may affect the location or quality of the Rideau Trail, he makes it his business to investigate, and then to voice the views of the RTA.

Peter helps in other ways. When the Ottawa Publicity Committee expressed a need for a portable display board, he designed and built it. When someone was to make trail markers, volunteered, and is now cutting the orange triangle markers for the entire Rideau Trail. When the END-TO END certificates were redesigned last year, he volunteered to co-ordinate the lettering of the new When Ottawa began hand certificate. delivery of its newsletter, he encouraged the enterprise and volunteered to deliver those in the area of his home. member of the Board of Directors, when he heard there was a storage problem with a large quantity of historical papers, he volunteered to organize and maintain the archives of the Rideau Trail, and is now known as the "Keeper of the Archives".

Wild animals are also known to appreciate his concern. Apparently the Ottawa Club once discussed the elimination of a certain porcupine that was gnawing its way through outhouses and wheeled carts at the Club property in the Marlborough Forest. Peter stood up for the creature, even suggesting that he had as much right to the cabin property as we did. Needless to say, the porcupine was left undisturbed!

Peter has contributed in a wide variety of areas both to the Ottawa Club and to the Association over a period of years, and the Ottawa Club was pleased to have the opportunity to acknowledge his contributions.

CHANGES TO NEWSLETTER FORMAT

You may have noticed changes in the format of the Rideau Trail Association Newsletter. Previously we paid a postage rate of 80 cents per copy because of the size and weight of the Newsletter. With this issue we have reduced the number of pages so as to come within the weight limitation of 30 grams. We have also gone to an envelope, on recycled paper. We now conform to the Post Offices letter rate of 40 cents. As you will notice we are now making use of the top half of the back page for articles and/or photos. END TO END AWARDS - 1991

This year the list of End to End award winners was substantial. Twenty-three end to enders by the time of the AGM. (I have heard from two more, who will receive their awards next year). The deadline for submitting accomplishments to receive the award in any given year is August 15th. The certificates for the past few years have been hand coloured and lettered by a calligrapher, Hilary Fowler. This takes time, as does compiling the list of end to enders and contacting the Kingston and Ottawa clubs to arrange for presenters.

This years award recipients included some who took the slower approach such as Don Cutts, who was on the first Rideau Trail hike in July 1971. Several started in 1988 with the end to end hikes arranged by Bill Grant; Alex Bissett, Gerry Schut, George Anderson, Janet Anderson, Tony Hyam, Grace Hyam, Jim Dee, Hilda Dee, and Marg Lafrance, who led that first 1980 hike. Those who took the faster approach included a group of Venturers from Barrhaven, the 133rd Venture Company: Peter Gordon, James MacCrostie, Jeff Greenall, Ken Wilson and Duane Goodwin, who hiked the trail from Aug 17th to Aug 31st, and Mel Goddard from Brampton who hiked the trail July 10th to 20th, The others were Moira Drummond, Marion Dunning, Ann Bolster, Geoff Berry, Mary Williams from Hamilton, Betty McIver and Bud Masse.

This year's hikes are starting the End to End all over again so we may have a good crop next year as well.

RICHMOND LANDING PLAQUE RENEWED.

This year has seen the installation of a new plague marking the Kingston end of the Rideau Trail at Elevator Bay. At the same time, the plaque which was placed by the NCC at Richmond Landing in 1983, marking the Ottawa end of the Trail, has been restored. The NCC marker originally painted brass. However, the paint had been flaking off for some time and the NCC no longer had the resources to restore it. Tom Bach, the former Trail Maintenance Chairman of the Ottawa Club took this on as a personal project and spent long hours scraping the remaining

paint off the marker by hand. The original brass is now exposed. The plan is to let it weather down to match to match the metal which has been exposed over the years by the flaking paint. The Ottawa Club would like to thank Tom for taking on this task and to remind our members that all the work on the Clubs is done by volunteers like Tom, who give their time and expertise.



SECRET CEMETERY IN THE FOREST?

For some time, certain members of the Ottawa Club who frequent the Marlborough Forest have known of the existence of a strange pioneer cemetery hidden in the woods. The only written reference to this cemetery of about twenty graves is in Walker's "Carleton Saga".

In our last summer hike, near the Earth Star Loop, I discovered what looks very much like a second, smaller cemetery consisting of half a dozen graves very similar to those in the cemetery mentioned by Walker. The graves have longitudinal piles of limestone rocks about 6" high.

According to Walker's book, such cemeteries are evidence of the settlement of the area in the early part of the last century. He theorizes that these "vanguard pioneers, may well have died of the fever or of starvation". As there is virtually no soil above the limestone, they are buried in shallow troughs and then covered with stones. Headstones have disappeared.

This show includes slides, all taken by members, synchronized with a script and background music. The script was written, and the slides selected, by Michal Ann Crosley; narration was done by Christian Hackbusch. The background music was provided by Larry Crosley, who also did the synchronization of slides and tape. The Association thanks all these professional friends for a superb job.

Based on the original set of slides assembled by Moira Drummond and updated by the Ottawa Club, the show traces the Rideau Trail from the Kingston end in the spring through to the Ottawa end in the fall, and also shows some winter scenes. It portrays the various activities of the Clubs, including hiking, skiing, canoeing and even trail maintenance, as well as natural and historic scenes along the Trail.

Copies of the show have been made for both the Kingston and Ottawa Clubs. It is ideal for presentations to exhibitions, shows, and fairs, or to any sort of group club, whether recreational, of environmental, or service oriented. TRAIL MAINTENANCE.

Having enjoyed many hours hiking along the Rideau Trail, I felt a mild obligation to assist in trail maintenance, So when volunteers where asked for, I requested "my own" section of the trail. To my great surprise I was assigned an 18 km section of blue markers in the Merrickville - Burritts Rapids area.


I was looking forward to this new venture, and on the first day arrived early with markers, paint and clippers. Starting down the Dwyer Hill road I soon realized the primary ingredient for the new venture would by garbage bags. As I turned into Burritts Rapids I saw no markers for two intersections, so I got out the stencil and four thumb tacks. Unfortunately the poles at the critical corners were cement. So much for the thumb tacks, I thought. I tried to hold the stencil against the pole with one hand and spray with the other. Modest success, however I now had a blue hand, this wont look very good walking through Burritts Rapids with a blue hand, I thought.

The next section of the trail was much easier and I had time to contemplate the cement poles. What I needed was a large artificial hand which could be held at a safe distance from the spray.

After a little experimentation, I formed a four fingered device out of black farming wire on which the stencil was suspended on light elastic bands. This assembly was then mounted at about 45 degrees on the end of a 2 foot pole. The mounting head is rotatable to allow angled painting. This device I found to be very satisfactory, and I am now completely rid of the blue hand disease.
