#### GROUP LOBBYS GOVERNMENT TO PRESERVE ABANDONED RAILWAY LINES

The Southeastern Ontario Rails-to-Trails Association (SEORTTA) has launched a major effort to get groups in Southeastern Ontario to lobby the provincial government in an effort to preserve over 400 km of abandoned railway rights-of-way. These abandoned lines run for 200 km from Kingston to Pembroke (the old "Kick & Push" line). 100 km from Napanee to Smith Falls, and 100 km from Tweed to Perth.

Although most of the members of the provincial government have verbally supported the concept of converting abandoned railroad lines to recreational trails, the government is unprepared to take concrete action towards the aquisition of these valuable resources at this time. Support from the interested public is needed.

#### OUTSTANDING SERVICE AWARD

#### Kingston Club

The recipient of this award for 1991 was Ray Forester. Few have done more for the Association and are as well-liked as Ray.

Ray has been a member of the Association since 1981. He has been an active member of the Board of Directors serving first as the Kingston Club representative to Hike Ontario, then as Vice-President, President and Past President. A notable contribution during this time was the revision of the RTA Constitution. Ray felt strongly that volunteers should receive recognition in some form for their contribution to the club. This became a reality when the Association established the three badges that volunteers are eligible to receive and it was under his guidance that the Association established the Outstanding Service Award.

Ray finds time to participate in Kingston Club activities and has assisted the Kingston Club in various capacities. He has served on the Kingston Club Executive as Construction Co-ordinator. He has maintained a section of the Opinicon Loop trail ever since he joined the Club. He belongs to the core group who undertake re-routings and major construction projects such as the building of bridges, boardwalks etc. He was involved with the preparation of the first-ever audiovisual presentation of the RTA. Ray has been involved with educational activities as well. Many have found his presentation on "Essential Equipment for Day Hiking", to be very useful.

He regularly leads hikes and special trips. Many of us are regulars on the annual snow-shoe trip he leads. In the years gone by, he led many special trips which greatly enhanced the Outings Program, such as the overnight trips to the Slide Lake Cabin, the Gould Lake Barn and the Canoe trips in August. Those of us who went on these trips were impressed by the planning and leg-work that he undertook prior to the trip. Alas! The one thing beyond his control was the weather. I can remember pouring rain and high winds which made paddling a real chore.

On a personal note I would like to thank Ray for his support and help during the period I served as Hike Co-ordinator and Chairman of the Kingston Club. My appreciation and love of the outdoors, and that of many other people was nurtured and steadily grew during those trips in the early 80's led by Ray and Tom.

Highlights of the Board of Directors Meeting

Regular quarterly meetings of the new Board of Directors for the Rideau Trail Association were held in McMartin House, Smiths Falls, on October 26th, 1991 and January 11th, 1992. Items of particular interest which were covered in these meetings are:

- the estimated total membership of the Association is now 1066
- a new format for printing and mailing of the Newsletter has been adopted, which will result in savings in the cost of mailing
- the Central Club now has a phone number in Perth, 264-8338
- a 5-year plan will be developed for route improvement and other concerns affecting the Rideau Trail. It was agreed that, in order to develop issues and priorities, a long term planning workshop would be held on April 11th. This will involve the Board of Directors and representatives from the Kingston, Ottawa and Central Clubs. The report from this workshop will be presented and discussed at the RTA Annual General Meeting, to be held on September 26th
- the Association has taken out membership in the National Trail Association of Canada, whose ultimate objective is the development of a National Trail from coast-to-coast.

# ROUTE CHANGE ON MAP 4 - Opinicon Loop

Page 64 to be amended as follows:

18.7 The trail continues along the ridge, through a woods and reaches a stile not now in use. (The fence runs along the Frontenac County and Leeds Grenville County line. The old trail branches to the right and goes downhill to the Opinicon road with a branch to the left leading to the crest of Mount Marvin). The trail continues through woods and areas of sumac passing an old stone building and a nearby well. It then runs along a ridge for 0.2 km. and descends past a swamp going through a wooded area where it meets a cart track.

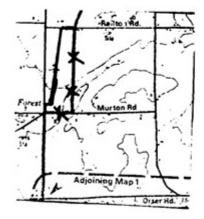
#### **ROUTE CHANGE ON MAP 2**

Page 45 - amend as follows:

22.1 Orser Road-beginning at sentence 2 ...

After 1.7 km the Trail crosses Murton Road continuing along Boundary Road for 0.2 km. It then turns right into a field and heads north. The trail continues through fields crossing the owner's private road, through scrub trees and more fields to the Railton Road. The Trail continues North ...

Note: This change was made at the request of a new land owner and the Trail now crosses property belonging to Mr. Gary Little.



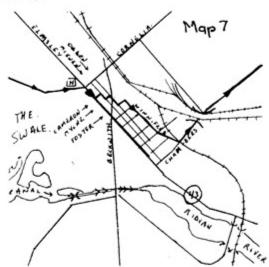
#### TRAIL RE-ROUTING

Extensive re-routing has been necessary between Narrow's Lock and the Three Buoy's Marina. The Trail has been well signed but the map has not yet been re-drawn. The description, now incorrect, is on pages 72 and 73 of The Rideau Trail Guidebook. As soon as weather conditions permit the re-routing will be measured and mapped.

#### ROUTE CHANGE ON MAP 7 - Smiths Falls P.86

# This reroute will be in place early in April of 1992.

The trail follows Highway #43 though the town for 2.2 km. to the traffic signals at the corner of Cornelia and Elmsley Streets. Turn right on to Elmsley Street for one block and left on to Cameron Street. One block on Cameron and right on to McEwen for one block. Left on to Mylne and across Beckwith Street North to Ogden Street. At this intersection you will observe a building decorated on all three sides with a clever trompe d'oeil mural "Waiting for the Train." Go one block on Ogden, turn left on to Foster, one block and the right on to Winnifred. Continue southeast down this street for a number of blocks. Turn left at Chambers Street East, then crossing a single line of railway tracks. Proceed through the Chambers Street underpass and reach the T intersection at Rideau Avenue (Return to Page 87 for directions.)



#### **HIGHWAY 416 UPDATE**

Construction of the 416/417 interchange (Map 12) is proceeding faster than expected. The Acres Road Bridge may be closed sometime this summer as a result. It is expected that the closure will be for two or three months and not the six to eight months as originally expected. In the event of this bridge being closed the following will be the detour until the realigned Acres Road is open.

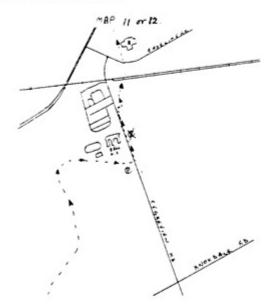
## MAP 12 OTTAWA Page 108

km. 73.8 Richmond and Acres Road.

The Trail continues north east along Richmond Road. crossing over highway #417 to the signal lights at Richmond and Bayshore Drive. Turn left on to Bayshore Drive and continue north to Carling Avenue. At Carling and Bayshore cross to the north side of Carling and turn left and continue along Carling in a westerly direction to reach the recreational path that goes along the shore of the Ottawa River.

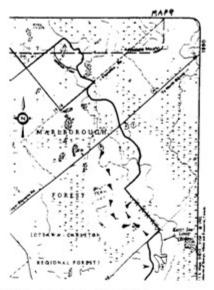
## BRUCE PIT DETOUR MAP 11 OR 12 P.108

The Trail turns left after meeting Cedarview Road at Nordic Nook parking lot and continues along the road, down the hill to turn right into NCC property at an access gate. The Trail goes eastwards for a distance in the woods, turns left, passing through a field before crossing a railway line and crossing a stile at Baseline Road.



# FLOOD ROAD REROUTE MAP 9

Heading north from Flood Road across meadow/field. Passing though cedar post fence follow track to Ducks Unlimited dyke. Cross over top of dyke and enter cedar wood. Trail meanders through the cedar to reach farm land now planted with seedlings. The trail continues along the edge of the farm land in an easterly direction to reach Flood Road to the south of farm buildings.



## Violet Trail (Blue) Map 9

This blue trail starts at the parking lot west of where the Main Trail crosses Rogers Stevens Road. It is about 4.5 km. and connects with the Main Trail north of the Ducks Unlimited dyke. Used with the Main Trail or with the Main Trail and a forest road it provides a couple of loops for hiking. Special thanks to Bill Grant and Peter de Lepper for their efforts in making this trail.

# The West Highland Way

(Reprinted from a longer text by Stanley Douglas)

It is a foregone conclusion that hiking in Scotland means journeying in wet conditions. I kept my fingers crossed and hoped the rains between Glasgow and Fort William would be relatively light in May-June, but I took care to pack ample wet weather gear for the ensuing seven day hike. Imagine my surprise finding this first day on the trail sunny and warm with only faint whisps of high cirrus in a clear blue sky.

The West Highland Way was first conceived eleven years ago and established by the Countryside Commission for Scotland. Local rangers oversee its maintenance. It is marked throughout with brown posts sporting a stylized thistle. The Way is Scotland's best known footpath and attracts 100,000 hikers each year.

The Highland influence could be felt with the association of the distant mountain ranges, notably among them Ben Lomond, but closer to hand was the bulk of Conic Hill, our first steep climb. It came into clear view after we had walked through Garadhban Forest. Even though I was wearing heavy hiking boots, the pasture towards the hill felt and looked like velvet. Countless sheep with their new-born lambs nudging alongside, making no attempt to move away from our path as we closed in on them. The climb was steady to begin but became a we bit of a slog as I came near to the summit's 350m peak. The wind was strong and cold, happily at my back. The view from the top outstanding. Here was the meeting place of North and South, the Highlands and the Lowlands.

The serene beauty of Loch Lomond and the profuse variety of flora, said to contain a quarter of all that grows in Britain, from orchids to snowdrops, demands one's whole attention. Enormous areas of bluebells stretching as far as the eye could see, huge rhododendron bushes complementing smaller adjoining azaleas presented a glory of colour that would appear impertinent to nature if attempted by man: whin and gorse, resplendently brilliant yellow and so on.

Much of the trail passes through Forestry Commission land. Here are large stands of pine. spruce and larch with oaks, native birch and alder providing variety as well as housing and food for a host of birds. In their season the rowan and holly, too, would be brilliant with red berries.

The hike was very worthwhile and may well be one

of Britain's best, however, some forward planning is essential. The official guide "The West Highland Way" by Robert Aitken, contains a separate official route map. It is published by the Countryside Commission for Scotland and is available through HMSO Bookshops, there is a Scottish one at 71 Lothian Road, Edinburgh, Scotland EH3 9AZ. The pamphlet, "West Highland Way, Long Distance Route", gives general details and lists accommodations. It may be had, free, from the Countryside Commission for Scotland, Battleby, Redgorton, Perth, Scotland PH1 3EW

Be advised you will need good waterproof clothing and possibly gloves. Boots should be well broken in and dependable. Be ruthless and reduce your packs. B & B costs about 20-30 pounds. Lunch supplies and dinners are available on route. Do take a lightweight camera.
